Questions for Reflection

- When Isaiah says God judges "more than what meets the eye," where in your life would you actually want God to look beneath—not to expose you, but to name the truth you've avoided?
- The carols claim we will become "the peace to come." If Christ is born in us, not just for us, what small act of courage might be the first sign of that new life taking shape in you?
- Mary's annunciation wonders: What if God waits for your honest "yes"? If you were as brave as Mary, what ordinary part of your life might become the place where God takes flesh?
- Isaiah's peace is disruptive—predators changing habits, enemies becoming kin. What fear would need to loosen its grip before you could imagine that peace beginning in your home or your patterns?
- Our hymns plead: "Comfort," "Reconcile," "Ransom," "Shine." If you prayed those words without pretending, which feels like a true hope—and which feels like confessing what you cannot fix alone?

It can help us be attentive while driving down the highway.

It can alert us to possible accidents.

It can motivate us to do our best.

However, fear can also be harmful.

For so many of us, fear of the other, fear of failure, or fear of the unknown

has led us to make sinful choices in our lives-

choices such as building walls or tearing others down.

Today, in confession, we ask for mercy and pray for guidance.

As we confess, we come before an entirely merciful and loving God who says to us, "Do not be afraid." Let us pray:

Patient God, you know just how often

we make decisions from a place of fear rather than love.

You know just how often we allow fear to take the place of logic, fanning unhealthy fires in our lives.

You know just how often we tuck your words, "Do not be afraid" on dusty shelves and in the back of closets, stubbornly holding onto our own point of view.

Forgive us for giving fear the microphone.

Silence the voices of scarcity, shame, and rejection, which spark and feed so much of our fear, to recenter us in love.

With hope we pray the silent thoughts that are on our hearts.

Time for Silent Confession

Family of faith, even when we forget God's words, God does not forget us.

Even when we lose our way, God does not lose us.

Even when we fall short or make mistakes, God forgives and holds onto us.

We are known.

We are forgiven.

We are loved.







Although the early copies of this 15th-century German text include many more stanzas than are printed here, this simpler, shorter form has much to commend it. This early 17th-century harmonization of the traditional chorale melody invites and rewards singing in parts.

God meets us in our fear



MARY'S GOLDEN ANNUNCIATION

Mary's Golden Annunciation explores the moment of encounter between Mary and the angelic messenger. This unusual encounter may have been startling to young Mary-a soon-to-be teen bride turned, possibly, unwed mother. Yet, with holy bravery in the face of communal isolation, she accepts the call to be a surrogate mother to a

son who is to be the savior of her people and the son of God.

There is not much commentary regarding Mary's consent to motherhood. She is often portrayed as a humble, yet passive, "accepter" of a fate predestined for her. But I wonder, what if the angel had appeared to Mary and she had declined? Would her name be erased from historic and religious memory in favor of another willing young virgin?

Mary's Golden Annunciation depicts not only a remarkable encounter, but also the moment that divinity in human form was conceived. It is my speculation that the divinity of God entered Mary's body no sooner than Mary's "yes" went out from her mouth. In a time when women had few options other than marriage, Mary's consent to a potentially unwed motherhood is a brave act of subversive agency. In Mary's "yes," uttered in her Magnificat, we see the transformation of a young teenage girl from fearful to determined, from simply accepting to deciding, from passivity to agency, from betrothed to surrogate mother of God—an honor rarer than gold. Perhaps the most remarkable annunciation in this passage is not the messenger's revelation to Mary, but Mary's "yes" to the call.
