Advent Reflection

He did not wait till the world was ready, till men and nations were at peace. He came when the Heavens were unsteady, and prisoners cried out for release. He did not wait for the perfect time. He came when the need was deep and great. - Madeleine L'Engle, "First Coming"

hen the calendar reaches December, we begin thinking about the end of the year. How many shopping days until Christmas? Am I ready for final exams? To what charity shall I donate? Are my taxes in good order? What to serve my holiday guests for dinner? Do I have a date for New Year's Eve?

December is the month to wrap things up—not only gifts but loose ends. We rush to finish every project before the calendar turns.

The Christian year, however, does something else. It begins. Most contemporary people, including many Christians, have forgotten that the Christian year starts with Advent on a day at the end of November or the beginning of December.

The new year arrives a month early.

Even though Advent begins a new liturgical year, it also anticipates endings. Oppression and war will end—the angels sing of peace on earth. The long wait for Messiah is coming to an end—Mary is heavily pregnant with child. Joy to the world! The ancient promises of God are about to be fulfilled. The first of the year anticipates the ending of our waiting for God to show up.

Despite the angels and birth and the baby, however, the world would go on as muddled and conflicted and violent as before. Why? Isn't Advent the end of this wretched beginning of human history?

Advent raises questions. Jesus's first followers found this as confusing as we do today. As they ruminated on his life and death and the continued dreadful circumstances of the world, they wondered if sacred time was the same as human time. If, perhaps, God's commonwealth arrived not in a single act of history but in some other more mysterious fashion, stretched out

through time in ways hard to apprehend. There would be two Advents—the birth of Jesus that has happened and the fulfillment of the promise that is still to come.

Advent is about both: waiting for a birth and more waiting for peace. And even after you think the gift has arrived, there's still more waiting. When you read, several of the reflections are about the mystery of time, one of the most elusive of all spiritual enigmas with which we humans wrestle.

Thus, Advent, the beginning of things, isn't like a New Year's Eve party with a ball drop and fireworks. This is a monthlong journey in deepening ambiguity of waiting. In the Northern Hemisphere, Advent is twinned with the winter solstice. We are exiles in time, wandering still in the wilderness, and following stars toward dreams of a better world that we can never quite reach.

a s night lengthens, Christians light a single candle every week against the shadows of fear, doubt, despair, and hatred. Advent offers four Sundays to reflect on the journey ahead—unpredictable, unknowable—at the beginning of our year. Only candlelight guides the way. This is the season of poetry more than answers, of mystery more than conclusions. It is existentially unsettling. And perhaps the most honest season of the year.

We just don't know. We wait in the dark.

- In Gaza, 66 CRS staff continue delivering food, water, clothing, and hygiene kits despite losing their own homes and, for many, family members. Their courage keeps hope alive for others.
- Since 2022, CRS has reached 3.6 million people in war-torn Ukraine with food, shelter, farming and business support, and counseling to help families, especially children, heal from loss.
- About 35% of CRS work begins with emergency relief—meeting urgent needs for food, water, and shelter—then shifts to rebuilding lives after conflict or disaster. In 2024 alone, CRS responded to crises in 68 countries.
- Through projects in sustainable farming, microfinancing, and financial literacy, CRS helps families build independence and stability. Last year, these efforts spanned 113 projects in 47 countries.
