This is how Paul begins his letter to the Ephesians—count how many times the word "bless" appears in that *short excerpt!*

No wonder the gospel is called Good News, it is news of blessing upon blessing.

We will start a short six-week study of Ephesians, <u>beginning on January 6, 2026</u>. We meet by Zoom (on your computer, tablet or phone) every Tuesday at 7:00 pm. (This study will finish the week before before Ash Wednesday and will not conflict with our popular Lenten small groups.)

The Nativity in 'No Man's Land' Christmas Reflection by John Mastalski, Pastoral Assistant

recently watched the French film *Joyeux Noel* (2005) which tells the moving story of a Christmas truce during World War I. The events in the film, based on various true accounts, took place a little over 100 years ago when hand-to-hand combat and trench warfare were the norm.

Soldiers from Germany, France, and Scotland discover their common humanity—and shared faith traditions—in those trenches.

Music and food brought warring enemies together for a brief time as they celebrated the birth of the Prince of Peace—and discovered in that celebrating their kinship beyond country.

Of course, I sob during such films, especially ones so well-made. My tears betray my deepest longings for kinship and existential connection—and especially for an end to the gun-related violence that

terrorizes us today.



But my tears are also joyfilled—evidence of my deep faith in the healing powers of kindness and compassion as shown by the enemies who became neighbors in the 'no man's land' between the trenches.

And my eyes well-up for the Christmas Baby whom the magi visit and who is the source of all kinship and kindness.

hinking about the soldiers from the different countries reminds me of the two distinct Christmas stories told in the Bible. Most everything we celebrate about Christmas—except for Santa and the tree—comes from either the gospels of Luke or Matthew.

Of course, both writers tell of Mary and Joseph and the baby Jesus—but that's about where their

similarities cease. Indeed, each gospel writer focuses on wildly differing elements of the Nativity scene.

rom Luke, we get the tired family traveling to Bethlehem and finding every hotel and Airbnb overbooked. So they find a barn with its food trough, the manger, which serves as their shelter and as Jesus' first crib.

Luke also gives us the poor sheep herders who were in their fields and who were summoned by angels—it took more than one angel for them to pay attention—to "be not afraid" of the "good news" that they were heralding.

These angels were so persuasive that the shepherds left their only source of income—the sheep—and went into town to find this "infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger."

Luke's version of the child's birth includes multitudes of supporting characters from the heavens (angels) and from poor members of the tribe (shepherds).

or Matthew, unlike Luke, the birth itself is not the focus of his story. Instead, his telling targets the juicy gossip around Mary's pregnancy and the party that happens a week or so after the birth.

Matthew gives us a dreamy Joseph who hears a single angel telling him of the true nature of his girlfriend's mysterious pregnancy. Joseph hears how his child—yes, his child, even though he had "no relations" with Mary—will be called *Emmanuel* and shall be named *Jesus*.

Then Matthew skips ahead to the story of the magi who are astrologers "from the east" with access to King Herod. Clearly, they have college degrees and enough frequent-flier miles to travel long distances "following a star."

And, even though they were wealthy enough to

offer expensive gifts to the newborn baby, they were humble enough to bow down and "do him homage."

Matthew places Jesus' birth in Bethlehem, too, but these gift-bearing out-of-towners find the Holy Family in a "house" rather than in a manger.

Matthew's version of Jesus' birth includes only one angel, an important "star" in the sky, various wealthy visitors, and three intriguing gifts (which are not very baby-friendly).

n the 'no man's land' outside of the sanctuary in our churches, we have erected typical Nativity scenes to celebrate this Christmas story. Like most Nativity scenes, the angels, shepherds, magi, and star are joined by various animals lingering on the edge of the scene.

Over the centuries, our telling and celebrating of this Baby's birth have led to the mingling of the characters—rich and poor—from Matthew and Luke.

hether we have come from a distance (like the magi) or have to travel only a few miles (like the shepherds), there is always room for us in the Nativity scene. The shepherds and magi have found kinship in our church's 'no man's land' and, just by being there, invite us

to join them, sit awhile, and ponder the Baby whose birth promises good news and freedom from fear.

O come let us show kindness to one another and to our newborn King and Redeemer!
