With COVID-19, social media drama, and a plethora of unpleasant news, I am reminded of a neat book by James Moore, entitled, "Attitude Is Your Paintbrush: It Colors Every Situation." I was initially drawn to the book by its catchy title, but the many possible consequences of both our good and bad attitudes on those around and even ourselves are what ultimately reeled me in. With that direction in mind, I had my message all ready to go. In essence, it was a message about how our attitudes can either build each other up or tear each other down. But the longer I thought about this notion, the more I felt moved by the Holy Spirit to consider our attitudes toward God and our relationship Jesus His as disciples. I believe that our attitudes toward our relationship with God Himself can also positively or negatively affect the way we treat each other. Call it trickle-down spiritual economics, if you will, but our attitudes toward God can also have a powerful effect on our interpersonal relationships in the here and now! Oh, and by the way, I'd hate to disappoint you, so we will consider our own attitudes in the coming week or weeks!

So rather than consider the entire eight verses, we will tighten our focus onto only the first two verses of Romans 12. In *verse 1*, we read, *"I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that you present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable to God, which is your reasonable service."* Paul begins with an appeal using the very *"King Jamesey"* word, *"beseech,"* which means to ask someone urgently and fervently to do something! Paul is fervently urging us to live out a special course of action in our lives. In case you hadn't noticed, the entire New Testament urges us toward living a certain way. Truth be told, we live out some of those highly recommended ways of living, but we occasionally fall short of actually doing many of them. As in our daily lives, we are more motivated to follow a course of action when we have some good reasons to do so! Like when your doctor tells you to cut back on highly processed junk food for your health or else some bad medical malady will befall you! I believe the Apostle Paul understood this notion quite well! Please re-read the first verse listed above before you read on.

A few words immediately stand out to me: (1) Present your bodies as a *"living sacrifice"* — In the old sacrificial system, the sacrifice started off alive and, as you probably guessed, ended up dead. Luckily, that is not what Paul literally meant in this passage. We are to present ourselves as living sacrifices. That's what makes it a challenge, at least to me. A living sacrifice has the ability to squirm off of the sacrificial altar. Jesus is the supreme example of one who stayed on the sacrificial altar of Calvary's Cross as the prefect sacrifice for sin.

We can sacrifice ourselves to God and walk away with our blue jeans and flannel shirts intact! Yes, we are called to die to own selfish desires, but it is not physical death that Paul means.(2) Did you notice that little word "therefore" gently resting at the beginning of the sentence? That connecting word "therefore" connects us with the previous eleven chapters! So why should we offer ourselves as living sacrifices? (a) Because we are now free from the penalty of sin — "For the wages sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." Romans 6:23 (b) Because we are now free from the power of sin — in Romans 6:6 Paul tells us, "We know that our old sinful selves were crucified with Christ so that sin might lose its power in our lives. We are no longer slaves to sin." (c) Because you have been adopted — Romans 8:15 "So you have not received a spirit that makes you fearful slaves. Instead, you received God's Spirit when he adopted you as his own children." (d) Romans 8:38-39 "And I am convinced that nothing can ever separate us from God's love."

Do you get the idea? We have been blessed beyond compare, <u>therefore</u> give/sacrifice your life to God! Paul then tells us how we are to offer ourselves up to God as *living sacrifices*. (a) <u>Holy</u> — which means that the person or thing is separated for God's special use or purpose. Think about the Bible as being holy. It's often listed that way on the cover, as in, *The Holy Bible*. It is a book, or more accurately, a compilation of books spanning some 2,000 years and penned by numerous authors that we set apart for God's special use to lay out God's plan of redemption for humankind. (b) <u>Acceptable</u> — *What's all about*? In common usage, that word acceptable can mean that something is not terrible but not great either. Like when you order a used book from Amazon, and it's listed as being in acceptable condition, which means it might have some marks, folded pages, and so forth. However, the Old Testament can give us some clues as to what God finds acceptable instead of being unacceptable. And believe me, there is a world of difference. Think about Cain and Abel from the Book of Genesis. Cain offered up an unacceptable sacrifice, and Abel brought an acceptable sacrifice to God. Neither thing was terrible in and of itself of either item sacrificed, but only one of them was acceptable to God's directions.

So, "Is God asking too much for us to make such a sacrifice? No, when God commands something, He gives us the power and authority <u>so that</u> we can live out that command in our lives. By the way, the last thing mentioned in this verse is that this <u>holy and acceptable sacrifice</u> is our reasonable service to God. That word "**reasonable**" comes to us from the Greek word, $\lambda o\gamma \iota \kappa o_{\zeta}$ (logikos — Strong's #3050). We get our word logic from that word. In other words, based on the blessings we have received and God's command, our logical response is to present ourselves totally to God for His service and Kingdom. Is this how we are to worship and serve God? After all, you might be thinking, "I come to church or watch online each week. I sing all the hymns and give God's tithes and my offerings and gifts! Is there more?" Yes, there is an aspect of worship beyond the externals and ventures into the interior of our souls and spirits. In John 4:24, we read, "God is Spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth." All the external things we do are expressions of worship, but true worship comes from our innermost beings!

Real worship comes as we give ourselves fully to God as an acceptable and pleasing sacrifice. So, as we continue on in our Lenten Journey, let's remember to pray, fast, meditate on God's Word, and give ourselves totally to the King of kings and the Lord of Glory!

And remember that you have been blessed to be a blessing. So be one!
