Watching & Waiting Rev. Jonathan Jonas

My childhood home was on a hill just across a valley from "the main road" on the facing hill. So, from a point just above my house, I could see vehicles approaching before they turned down the street toward our house.

I distinctly remember standing and watching one day when I knew my grandparents were coming to visit. It was a big deal that they were coming to our house, because we most often went to visit them! I knew about what time they had left their house, I knew about how long the trip would take, and so I knew approximately when they would arrive.



I stood, I watched, and I waited.

I feel a similar excitement now when one of my children comes home from college, even though the vigil is much different. Instead of watching the road, I watch my phone to see where they are or to know how much longer until they arrive. I still watch and wait.




For about 1,600 years now, we Christians have practiced a holy season of watching and waiting. Knowing that the celebration of Jesus' birth and incarnation is on the way, we keep four weeks of holy vigil. We call this season Advent from the Latin verb *advenire*, which means "to come to" or "to come toward."

It's no accident that we squint into the darkness as we await the celebration of Jesus' arrival. Our ancestors in the

faith chose the darkest time of the year, the winter solstice, to celebrate Jesus' birth. As John the gospel writer wrote so long ago, "The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into (advenire!) the world" (John 1:9).

So, light is an important part of our vigil. Just as ancient grandsons and fathers might have placed a lamp or candle in the window so that their grandparents and children might see home in the darkness, we light candles of the Advent wreath to celebrate the arrival of Jesus' light into the world.





Still, though, if we find that *just right* vantage point, this can be a meaningful season of watching and waiting for the one coming into our world to reveal God's love, grace, and mercy.

Do Not Be Afraid

The world at the time Jesus was born was not that different than the world we live in today. Whether it's oppression, economic disparity or just uncertainty about what lies ahead, there are times people are afraid.

During this time of year, the Christmas Story reminds us that even in times when fear seems to be dominant, Christ's birth gives us reason to "not be afraid" and to insist on hope, no matter the degree of our despair.

Starting **November 30th** during regular worship services, step into the conversation of how to look for

- God to break in during times of fear;
- that God is at work even when we run out of hope;
- that in our fear, we are called forward;
- that in times when others are afraid, reach out your hand;
- and that Good News is louder than fear!

At the Sycamore Tree campus, there is a strong collaboration between the organizations that are housed there. Compassion Counseling and DayBreak have been sharing resources. CCC intern, Beth provide several weeks of valuable art therapy sessions for DayBreak groups. This helped enrich the program while fulfilling her professional and educational requirements.



Since the start of DayBreak many improvements have been made to the space at Sycamore Tree. Recently, the program acquired 67 FREE upholstered chairs from the Parks & Rec/Everett Senior Ctr. Improvements have also been made in the plumbing area with a new faucet installed and changes made to the hot water system. Many of these improvements have been made using grant money from the Holston Foundation.

On the Second Sunday of each month people have the opportunity to be a part of a 30-minute worship service focused on having a barrier-free environment. In November, Rev. Jonathan Jonas shared a message of Thanksgiving and what God provides to make our spiritual and literal seeds grow. After the service people received packets of seeds from the front garden. The next worship service is Christmas themed and happens on the 14th at 2:00 pm.
