








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Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is fulfilling of the law. Romans 13:10

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On September 1st, we will celebrate Labor Day, perhaps least understood among all the federal holidays. More than just the unofficial end of summer, it is a day to celebrate the importance of labor - and especially organized labor - in our society.

Organization was so important because the workplace could become so dangerous and even callous toward human life. In the nineteenth century, productivity could be valued over the person. So, the labor movement arose to protect workers' rights and lives.

The church lifted its voice too. In the 1908 General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, our predecessor denomination adopted the first Methodist Social Creed, which began:

The Methodist Episcopal Church stands – For equal rights and complete justice for all in all stations of life.

The creed continued to name other values—especially related to labor—for which the Methodists of 1908 were willing to take a stand:

For the protection of the worker from dangerous machinery, occupational diseases, injuries and mortality.

For the abolition of child labor.

For a release from employment one day in seven.

For a living wage in every industry.

For the suppression of the "sweating system."

In 2025, we describe industrial plants employing the "sweating system" as "sweatshops." We imagine them in faraway lands, using child labor and other deplorable labor practices. Then we realize that they were once here until labor organizations and the church lifted voices to take a stand against these inhumane conditions.

It's probable and perhaps even likely that the owners, operators, and managers of those 1908 industrial plants understood themselves to be fine Christian people. No doubt the same was true sixty-four years earlier when the Methodist Episcopal Church split over slavery. Those slaveholders probably understood themselves to be fine Christian people.

With the benefit of hindsight, however, we believe they were wrong. We believe that they failed to love slaves and factory workers as neighbors, using them instead as human machinery.

So, when we celebrate Labor Day on September 1st, I will also celebrate the church of 1908 and for its willingness to take a stand.

I will also pray for the church of 2025. We are fine Christian people. May we never again be blind to the ways in which we oppress or participate in systems of oppression. May we still and always be people who stand for "equal rights and complete justice for all."



Please join us as we ask the question Mister Rogers made famous on his PBS show, "Won't you be my neighbor?" **Learn more at 1stchurch.org/worship**.




Help spread the word about Fall Festival


