Amy Davidson has worked with crime survivors for 15 years in North Carolina and Oregon. Her direct service work ranged from crisis response to providing supervised parenting time for families experiencing intimate partner violence. In 2006, she was instrumental in developing Mary's Place in Bend, OR, largely influenced by the principles of restorative justice. She worked with parents who had harmed their families to bring accountability while providing a safe space to re-engage with their children to repair harm. Working with surviving parents, their children and the parent who had caused harm proved to be profoundly instrumental in Amy's understanding of individuality and healing. Amy simultaneously worked with the Oregon Attorney General's Sexual Assault Training Institute to provide training to system professionals coming into contact with survivors of sexual violence. Throughout her years of working with crime survivors, she has also spent over 15 years training professionals in understanding roots of oppression and privilege. Currently, Amy is the Crime Survivor Program Director at Partnership for Safety and Justice, working to elevate the voices of crime survivors in public safety policy reform.
