

"What shall I return to the Lord for all His bounty to me?" (Psalm 116:12)

Dear Church Family,

This is a fitting question for those of us who claim to be "Rooted in Jesus, Growing in His Love and Branching Out to Serve Others." Before the Psalmist asks the question in verse 12, we discover God heard his cry for healing and deliverance. The Psalmist describes the Lord as One who listens and protects; is gracious and merciful.

We don't know many other details about his life circumstances: how bad it got (although it sounds like it was bad), what the struggle was which he was delivered from or how, in fact, God healed him. But do we really need to know the Psalmist's story? What about our stories?

How has God blessed you and me? How has God rescued and healed us? In Jesus Christ, how has God delivered and protected us . . . even "saved our lives" (Psalm 116:4)?

Going through "Gentle and Lowly" this Fall has made me increasingly aware of how gracious God has been and continues to be. Are you becoming more aware of this too? Are you and I growing in our awareness of God's goodness and grace – not only in and through Jesus but also in countless other ways. Would you describe God's provision with the word "bounty"?

Depending on who we compare ourselves to or how we define "bounty," we may not be planning to give thanks at all. We might be seeing scarcity more than abundance. We might not be asking what we can "return to the Lord." But let's not get caught up in the comparison game or only look at material possessions as evidence of God's provision and protection.

Like the Psalmist, let's discipline ourselves to look at our lives with honesty and gratitude. Let's remember we serve a God who answers when we cry out to Him. And let's remember that the Father gave His One and Only Son – who also sent His Spirit to live in us. What more could we be given? What more could we "even ask for or imagine"? (see Ephesians 3:20) And how, in light of God's incredible generosity, might we ultimately answer the question above?

May you and I join the Psalmist is his answer: "I will offer You a thanksgiving sacrifice and call on the name of the Lord." (Psalm 116:17) Whatever that looks like for each of us, may you and I find ways to, like Jesus, sacrifice our time, talent and treasure to the God who is worthy of our thanks and praise. And, who knows? We might end up being used by God to be His conduit in providing someone else's "bounty"? And, who knows? That person may "call on the name of the Lord."

5th Sunday Worship




Sunday, November 30 9:00 & 11:00 am - Sanctuary
