Main Idea: God has given his people hope in the promise of a

Messiah which is fulfilled in the life of Christ.

Notes: Isaiah 7 reveals the hope of God's people in the coming of a Messiah. God's people had clung to this hope through many generations. This Messiah will be Immanuel, God with us. As we reflect on this concept of hope, we, too, are reminded we are in a period of hope. Hope in the second coming of Christ.

Suggested Memory Verse:

DECEMBER 3

Text: Peace–Jeremiah 23:1–8

Main Idea: God has promised, that through the Branch of David, he will raise a King who will restore peace to God's people. This peace is accomplished through Christ.

Notes: The second week of Advent is the week of Peace. The Hebrew word for peace is shalom which means completeness or well-being. This passage in Jeremiah is a promise from God that he will "restore" peace among God's people. We are reminded that this peace comes through Jesus who is the Branch of David who will be a king that reigns wisely. We are reminded as we reflect on this concept of peace, that while we have received God's peace through Jesus, that peace is not yet complete but will be when the ultimate fulfillment of Jeremiah 23 comes to pass in the return of Christ.

Suggested Memory Verse:

DECEMBER 10

Text: Joy-Luke 2:8-20

Main Idea: Jesus' birth is a joy for the entire world.

Notes: The third week of Advent is the week of Joy. This is a joy that comes through Jesus' arrival and through the salvation he has given us. We celebrate the joy Jesus' birth brings as we reflect on that birth parrative in Luke 2:8-20.

Suggested Memory Verse:

DECEMBER 17

Text: Love-Isaiah 2:1-20

Main Idea: The ultimate act of love is that God would send his son for us. God has done that through Christ, in his first advent, and will come again, in his second advent.

Notes: The fourth, and last, week of Advent is a reflection on love. This week we reflect on the love that God has for us. That love narrative begins in creation and culminates in the return of Christ when he establishes His forever kingdom rule upon the earth. This passage in Isaiah reflects on that time when Jesus will rule from Jerusalem and His love will be known to all his people as we spend all of eternity in the worship of our Triune God. This passage points us to that final act of Love, Jesus' return where he will continually provide for his people.
