

**Acts- Church Afire!**  
**“The Day of Pentecost, Acts 2:1-41”**  
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**Sermon Summary & 5-Day Devotional Feb. 1<sup>st</sup>, 2026**

**Sermon Summary**

The Day of Pentecost marks a decisive new way God lives with his people. On that day the Spirit came with wind and tongues of fire, filling followers of Jesus and enabling them to speak God’s wonders in many languages. That first miracle was not primarily a spectacle; it was public testimony that Jesus is risen and that God’s Spirit is now poured out on all peoples, not just the Israelite select few. Because the Spirit came, the church itself came to life: a Spirit-filled people empowered and sent into the world to confess the risen Lord, call others to repentance, and baptize them into new life.

This outpouring carries four connected realities for us. First, Pentecost testifies to the resurrection—every true work of the Spirit will point people to the living Christ and press them toward repentance. Second, the Spirit is given as a seal, a present assurance that the work of God in us is genuine and ultimately secure; the inward witness of the Spirit steadies hope when doubts arise. Third, the Spirit supplies real power to turn from sin; holiness is not moral striving, but a new life formed by the Spirit’s presence, producing fruit that humans cannot manufacture on their own. Fourth, the Spirit equips each believer for witness and service—different gifts, services, and workings given so the body can speak the good news together to a broken world.

If the Spirit’s activity is reduced to exotic displays, we miss the point. The proper test of any claimed outpouring is whether it clearly declares the risen Jesus and calls people to repent. The Holy Spirit’s aim is not to amaze but to establish the presence of the living Lord among us, secure our salvation, sanctify our lives, and send us out to be his witnesses. Let us welcome this gift, yield to its shaping power, and use whatever abilities we have for the building up of the church and the proclamation that Jesus is alive.

**- Pentecost proclaims Jesus is alive**

Peter’s explanation linked the Spirit’s arrival directly to the death, resurrection, and exaltation of Jesus. Any authentic movement of the Spirit will point away from novelty and toward the historical, saving reality of the risen Lord. The Spirit’s presence is confirmation that Jesus reigns now and that our proclamation should center on him.

**- The Spirit seals our salvation**

The indwelling Spirit functions as God’s pledge: a present, internal assurance that what God began in us will come to completion. That assurance reshapes how we live, not by removing struggle but by giving a trustworthy hope that empowers perseverance. The Spirit’s witness steadies faith in seasons of doubt.

**- The Spirit empowers repentance**

True repentance is enabled, sustained, and shaped by the Spirit’s work within us rather than by mere willpower. As we yield, the Spirit cultivates inward change that produces outward fruit—love, self-control, faithfulness—that human effort alone cannot produce. This is sanctification as participation in the Spirit’s life, not performance.

**- The Spirit equips us as witnesses**

Every believer receives Spirit-empowered gifts for service so the church can testify together of Christ. Those gifts are given to build the body and to make the name of Jesus known across tongues and nations. Our witness becomes effective when gifted service is offered for the common good, rooted in the conviction that Jesus is alive.

## 5 Day Devotional Based on the Sermon

### **Day 1: The Holy Spirit confirms Jesus is alive.**

The outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost was not primarily about unusual experiences, but about bearing witness to the risen Christ. It was a powerful declaration that Jesus, who was crucified, had been raised from the dead and exalted as Lord and Messiah. The Spirit's coming served as God's undeniable proof, assuring hearts that the living presence of Jesus is truly with us. Any genuine work of the Holy Spirit will always direct people to the living reality of Jesus Christ, calling them to repentance and faith.

Acts 2:32-33

God has raised this Jesus to life, and we are all witnesses of it. Now, exalted to God's right hand, he has received the promised Holy Spirit from the Father and has poured out what you now see and hear.

*Reflection: How does the living presence of Jesus, affirmed by the Spirit, shape your daily hope and perspective in the face of life's challenges?*

### **Day 2: The Spirit guarantees our eternal salvation.**

Beyond attesting to Jesus' resurrection, the Holy Spirit living within believers serves as a profound assurance of their salvation. The Spirit is God's promised seal, a divine mark that confirms our belonging to Him and guarantees our inheritance in Christ. Like a down payment, the Spirit comforts our hearts with the certainty that in the end, everything will be well with us because our future with Christ is secure. This indwelling presence testifies that everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.

Ephesians 1:13-14

When you believed, you were marked with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit, who is a deposit guaranteeing our inheritance until we are fully redeemed and belong to God.

*Reflection: In what specific ways does the Spirit's presence within you bring comfort and assurance regarding your future with Christ, especially when doubts arise?*

### **Day 3: Power to walk away from sin.**

The indwelling Holy Spirit provides believers with the essential power to overcome sin and walk in new life. Without the Spirit's presence, true freedom from sin cannot be achieved through human effort alone. The Spirit gently leads us, enabling our repentance and guiding us away from sinful desires toward the fruit of righteousness. As we yield to the Spirit's leading, He produces His divine fruit within us—love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control—forming Christlike character and empowering transformed living.

Galatians 5:16, 22-23

Walk by the Spirit, and you will not fulfill the desires of your sinful nature. For the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

*Reflection: What specific area of your life do you feel the Spirit inviting you to surrender more fully, trusting His power to lead you away from sin and towards His transforming fruit?*

### **Day 4: Empowered to be a witness for Christ.**

The Holy Spirit living within believers means they are empowered for service and to be effective witnesses for the living Christ. The Spirit equips each person with unique gifts, talents, and

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strength, not for personal glory, but to point others to Jesus through their work and to build up the church. This empowerment enables believers to declare to the world that Jesus is alive. As you dedicate your gifts, service, and work to God, the Spirit works powerfully through you to proclaim Christ to all nations and strengthen His body.

Acts 1:8

You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.

*Reflection: How might the unique gifts and abilities the Spirit has given you be used more intentionally to point others to the living Christ in your daily interactions and community?*

### **Day 5: The Spirit poured out on all people.**

The Day of Pentecost marked a monumental shift, signifying that the Holy Spirit was poured out not just on select individuals or one ethnicity, but on all people. The miracle of speaking in diverse languages demonstrated God's intention to declare His wonders to every nation, inviting all people of the earth to receive the gift of the Holy Spirit and the salvation of Christ. This universal invitation breaks down barriers, proclaiming that everyone, regardless of background, is called to experience and proclaim the wonders of God.

Joel 2:28-29

In the last days, God says, I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your young men will see visions, your old men will dream dreams. Even on my servants, both men and women, I will pour out my Spirit in those days, and they will prophesy.

*Reflection: Considering the Spirit's universal invitation, how can you actively participate in sharing the wonders of God with those from different backgrounds or cultures in your sphere of influence?*
