The Door

Revelation 3:20 Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears the Lord's voice and opens the door, I come in to be with you and your family and eat with you and talk with you.

Have you ever come across a half-open door? What do you do? Are you brave enough to open it all the way and see what's behind the door? Or have you ever been in a place where you weren't expecting anyone, and then they loudly bang on the door?

You don't open the door because you feel that life is good and believe you are content with how things are. You have everything you need, or at least you think you do. Your outer life is going smoothly, and you're feeling satisfied, but what about your spiritual life?

Suddenly, there's a knock on the door, and this knock feels like an invasion—whether to open it or not. If you choose not to open it, are you honestly saying deep down that everything around you is okay, and that you've done all you can to be an instrument of joy, hope, peace, and love during this Advent season and beyond? Or do you look inward and wonder if you might need to open the door to see who it is and what they need from you, or what wisdom they might have for you?

Opening the door is accepting Abba's invitation to go deeper into your spiritual life and to take time for introspection of what you have done or haven't done. It's the moment in time when you do self-reflection.

When sharing a meal with the All in All, it is a time of deep, personal work with God. You might say, 'God, please guide me and lead me through whatever I am going through.' It can be a moment where you have a conversation with God or simply sit in silent meditation, reflecting on how blessed you are to have a caring and understanding God who walks with you through all the joys and sorrows of life.


Opening the door also involves a moment when you need to genuinely unload and inform the ONE about all the events and actions you've participated in that haven't helped demonstrate the love of Christ and offering to others, or it's not genuine. It's that moment when Christ enters through the door that gives you a chance to say, "I want to be different, I want to work on changing who you are, and I want to understand what I don't already understand so I can be someone who shows that hope exists within sadness and pain."

Advent is a time of waiting for joy to enter our lives, but sometimes joy is missing. It's missing because we have lost people we love. Joy is missing because someone or something has taken away your joy. Advent is an invitation to open the door; ask the Lord, can you please bring relief from what you're carrying, but first, you must open the door—and then you might need to wait for the guidance of the ONE who loves all for who they are and where they are. Still, the choice is up to you whether you open that door. Opening the door can and will be intimidating, so ask yourself whether I want to open the door.

This Advent season, pray, meditate, and reflect on what it truly means to open the door. Recognize that opening it can provide new insights into how you want to grow in your spiritual life. It is also a time for the church to consider where it is headed in the future, and whether opening the door is the right choice for the fellowship or to ignore the knock and just keep doing what the fellowship is doing.

Advent is a time of waiting, and as we all wait, may the knock on the door lead us to open it, listen, pray, and truly reflect on where we need to be, both as individuals and as a church.


The Chancel Choir, Trinity Ringers, along with guest musicians will celebrate the joy of Christmas on Music Sunday. You won't want to miss this special worship service.

Every year TUMC Missions and Food Pantry makes Thanksgiving dinner kits including everything needed (except the beverages) for a full thanksgiving dinner. A team of 13 volunteers assembled the kits (less frozen meat) on Thursday morning 20 November. We distributed the food boxes at the church on the following day. The Food Bank sold us some of the items at a low price, but the majority of the items came from local markets.

Last year we gave out 33 kits: This year we anticipated a greater demand and so we made 50 kits.

We had time to do some comparison shopping this year; and we were able to get the cost down to about \$37 each. Donations from the congregation, UWF, and Bay-Osos Kiwanis totaled \$2,658.

Thanks to all for your donations of time and treasure to make this event meaningful for us and the community we served.

FAIRBANKS NEWS NOVEMBER 2025

We had a trick-or-treater in her mid-30s. She was petite with Down's Syndrome and in costume she looked like a 7th grader. We recognized each other, she was one of Carole's students. She asked about Carole, and I asked if she would like to see her, "Yes." I invited her in; she gave Carole a big hug and Carole reciprocated.

We had heard via the grapevine that her mother's cancer is serious, so the hugging seemed appropriate.

Also, in October we heard Bill Awbrey's amazing story at the Fall Senior Lunch. He spoke about how in 1975 he flew a military cargo plane. He had received orders diverting his destination to Saigon airport and was told it would be the last flight from Saigon. His "cargo" were orphan children, including many newborns plus some American nurses. The evacuees were not what he expected, nor was his plane what they expected! The newborns, that were too young to turn over, were put on their backs on blankets by the sides of the fuselage. Older children and the nurses sprawled on the cargo space. Bill's orders were to take them to Guam, but the nurses said if he flew to Guam, six of the newborns wouldn't survive the journey. Bill was told he couldn't land at a closer airport because it was too crowded. He told them to clear the runway because, "I'm coming in." He landed safely and the wives of the servicemen were there waiting and received all of the children.

In late October Carole started up the steep narrow steps beside our garage, she got halfway, decided she couldn't go any further, so turned around and began scooting down. With only two steps to go I told her not to go any further, because even with my help she wouldn't be able to stand up. Our neighbor Scott Baksic and Suzanne Dean, who was visiting someone in our neighborhood, heard us and came over to help. They got Carole upright and continued up the stairs in front of our house, which are wider with less rise. Suzanne identified herself as Elizabeth's Clover's daughter. Good neighbors and friends are a blessing!

San Luis Chamber Orchestra Fall performed three works of Beethoven: Fidelio Overture, Symphony No. 5, and Piano Concerto No.4, at Trinity on November 2. The pieces fit well together, and it was certainly one of the best music programs Carole and I had ever attended.

During Sandlot Bridge on November 9, Glen Graham made a grand slam. Ken Graham and I tried our best to prevent it, but try as we might, we couldn't prevent him from taking all 13 tricks. Grand slams in bridge are similar to "holes in one" in golf, they occur but are rare.

Our daughter Judy, her husband RIck, Carole and I attended MBHS's "The Play That Goes Wrong" on the 15th, a high energy comedy where everything imaginable goes wrong. Holly Holtz walked by and spoke to me, but due to the background noise, even with my hearing aids, I didn't hear her. When she took her seat, we made eye contact and waved to each other. If you have any questions about the play, please ask Holly as her hearing is better than mine.
