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A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR



With the first Sunday in Advent on November 30th, Christians started the new year. Happy New Year, dearly beloved!!

Christian calendar, also known as the liturgical year or church year, is a carefully woven tapestry of time used by Christian communities worldwide. It structures seasons of worship and remembrance, focusing especially on the pivotal events in the life of Jesus Christ. The two major

events, birth and resurrection of Jesus, are remembered and celebrated on Christmas and Easter with the seasons for preparation and follow-up.

Christmas Season with Preparation and Follow-Up:

Advent: Advent is a four-week season of anticipation and spiritual preparation leading up to Christmas. Each Sunday of Advent unveils a theme—hope, peace, joy, and love—as Christians ready their hearts for the celebration of Christ's birth. Christmas: Celebrated on December 25, Christmas marks the arrival of Jesus, the light of the world. The festive season does



not end on Christmas Day but continues for twelve days, culminating in Epiphany on January 6, which commemorates the Magi's visit and the revelation of Christ to all nations. The season of Christmas is thus both a time of joyful celebration and of pondering the mystery of the incarnation.

Season of Epiphany: Follows Christmas and lasts until Ash Wednesday. The length of the Season of Epiphany varies depending on the date of the Easter. Christmas is always on December 25th, but the date of Easter changes each year. Easter is determined each year based on a calculation

known as Computus, which states that Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday following the first full moon after March 21, the vernal equinox. This means that Easter can fall anywhere between March 22 and April 25.

Easter Season with Preparation and Follow-Up:

Lent: The Easter cycle is anchored by Lent, journey of fasting, prayer, and self-examination, starting from Ash Wednesday. The date of Ash Wednesday also changes each year because we count forty days, not counting Sundays, backward from the already determined Easter date for that year. This solemn period invites Christians to prepare their hearts for the resurrection, mirroring Jesus' forty days in the wilderness. Lent culminates in Holy Week—an intense remembrance of Christ's passion, including Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday.



Easter: At the heart of the Christian calendar is Easter, the triumphant festival celebrating Jesus' resurrection from the



dead. Easter is not a single day but a season of forty-nine days following Easter Sunday. The joy of Easter reverberates through the church, signifying new life, hope, and the promise of salvation. Pentecost concludes Easter cycle and marks the descent of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the church. The season of Pentecost propels believers into mission and witness as the community built on life and resurrection of Christ.

Ordinary Time/ Kingdomtide: Ordinary Time is between Pentecost and Advent, focusing on the teachings of Jesus and the development of spiritual life for individual Christians and as the faith community, "The Church." Kingdomtide, also known as the Kingdom Season, is observed in the autumn and emphasizes the values and glory of God's Kingdom. It typically runs from the last Sunday in August until the beginning of Advent, with a focus on social justice and the advance of God's reign. Both are important for spiritual growth and reflection, with Ordinary Time emphasizing the teachings of Jesus, while Kingdomtide highlights the establishment of God's Kingdom in the world.

Christmas and Easter are the spiritual high points of the Christian year embracing the wonder of Christ's birth and the victory of his resurrection. Through the waiting and preparation of Advent and Lent, the exuberant celebrations that follow, and the periods of follow-through the messages of Incarnation and Resurrection, Christians are reminded of God's love and the transformative power of hope. The annual journey through these seasons invites us into the story of salvation and anchors our faith in the birth, death, and resurrection of Christ and remind us how the church should live and have our being in the world.

UMC: CONNECTIONALISM AND APPORTIONMENT

One of the distinct features of the United Methodist Church (UMC) is in its Connectionalism. We are not an



individual church but a member of a global church. This means you can see our cross with double flame logo on other continents and know they are one of us. The basic unit of the UMC is an annual conference (AC). California-Pacific Annual Conference, or Cal-Pac, is the annual conference where La Habra UMC belongs to.

Geographically, Cal-Pac includes Southern California, Hawaii, Saipan and Guam. Cal-Pac is therefore the most widely spread annual conference. Annual conference is led by a bishop, elected at jurisdictional conference and assigned to our annual conference for a quadrennium (four-year period). Bishop, Dottie Escobedo-Frank is our current leader and

her office with program and assistant staff are in Cal-Pac office in Pasadena. To make it manageable to oversee and support the individual congregations and pastors, Cal-Pac has divided into five districts, East, West, North, South, and Hawaii and assigned district superintendent to each of the districts. La Habra is located in the East District with the District Superintendent, Rev. Moon Young Lee as our District Superintendent. The five district superintendents help the Bishop as her cabinet members. Cal-Pac also provides various ministries for the local congregations including the Camps and Retreat Centers. Pastors are guided, supported, and examined and eventually ordained at the annual conference. Lay persons have their memberships in the local churches, and clergy have their memberships in the annual conference. Cal-Pac is one of the annual conferences in the Western Jurisdiction, and there are five Jurisdictions in the continent of U. S., North-East, South-East, North-Central, South-Central, and Western. And the annual conferences on the other continents are called Central Conferences.

General Conference meets every four years to lead this huge denomination and provide theological directions. General Conference is made up of delegates, laity and clergy in equal numbers, elected from each annual conference proportionately from the numbers of the membership. General Conference establishes general agencies (or churchwide agencies) to provide essential services and ministries beyond the scope of individual local congregations and annual conferences, and they are important for providing a common vision, mission and ministry for the entire global church. General Conference and the Connectional Table share in oversight of agency programs and ministries. There are 13 general agencies; Archives and History, Church and Society, Communications, Discipleship Ministries, Finance and Administration, Global Ministries, Higher Education and Ministry, Religion and Race, The Status and Role of Women, United Methodist Men, The United Methodist Publishing House, United Women in Faith, and Wespath (Benefits and Investments). The titles of each agency can give you some idea about what they do. If you studied Discipleship Bible Study some years ago, that curriculum was developed by Discipleship Ministries which also includes the Upper Room. Global Ministries invite, train, and support missionaries, and includes UMCOR which you hear and see often for the work of humanitarian relief and recovery. Higher Education and Ministry oversee UMC's 13 seminaries and over a hundred universities and colleges, just in the US, and establishes the standards and educational requirements for the pastors. Pastor Soomee worked for this agency for 8 years before she came to La Habra.

This huge structure is there to enhance the ministry of the local churches. Local churches, in return, send the apportionment money to support the work of the denomination at these various levels so that the ministries are done in the scale and dimension above and beyond one local church can. Apportionment supports this Connectionalism on various levels. (More to Come)
