THE WESTMINSTER LARGER CATECHISM

First Presbyterian Church of Greenville Ohio Minutes of the Session of October 12, 2023

I. Opening

A. Call meeting to order with reading of the Word and prayer

The October 2023 stated meeting of the Session of First Presbyterian Church of Greenville was called to order on October 12, 2023 at First Presbyterian Church at 7 PM by Pastor Andrew Gilman. Pastor Gilman opening the meeting with prayer.

Members Present: Pam Bowman, Wes Jetter, Jan Roestamadji, and Helen Miller (4)

Members Absent: Peter Haviza, Craig Leland and Randy Tester

Guests: Don Stevenson for Financial Report

Approval of Agenda A motion was made to approve the docket by Wes Jetter and seconded by Helen Miller. The motion passed 4-0.

Approval of Minutes Jan Roestamadji motioned to approve the September 2023 minutes. This motion was seconded by Pam Bowman. The motion passed 4-0.

II. Agenda Items

Financial Report Don Stevenson presented the financial report for September 2023. Highlights included mentioning that we had \$8,064 in contributions in September. Contributions to date have reached \$101,114. Don also mentioned that \$55,405 have been made toward the capitol improvement account. Don stated that \$1,000 had been contributed by the church to Campus Outreach and there was another unusual expense item of \$250 to cover entry fees to the youth group to attend the Illuminations concert. Helen Miller motioned to accept this report, seconded by Pam Bowman and passing by a margin of 4-0.

Renovation Project John Vehre (JV) had a brief FYI updating session on the need to modify the plans for the women's lounge next to the restroom. Because of sprinkler pipes discovered during demolition, a change had to be made to both construction and the architectural drawings. As part of these modifications, Dustin Nealeigh had a suggestion of placing an L-shaped entry wall, but after considerable discussion by the renovation committee it finally was decided at this time to just add carpet, new lighting and install technology hookups. At a later date the church may consider further renovations of the women's restroom and most likely the men's room at all, but no set date has been made for these projects.

Pam Bowman also had an FYI on furniture. Her committee met with representatives from IOS. A number of items were examined, and tentative selections were made. A final assessment will be made when IOS gets back to us with actual cost estimates.

Helen Miller had an FYI on the upcoming annual retreat. Final Bow will be the location and all final preparations had been made for the event. She mentioned lunch will consist of cold cuts and various other items not requiring cooking or warming.

Andrew Gilman presents a brief FYI on the book the <u>Great Dechurching</u>. In addition to the brief oral discussion, he included in the session packets an 8-page summary of the book.

Andrew also had a brief written summary for Stated meeting of the Midwest Presbytery that he attended and which took place from September 15-16, 2023.

Pastor's Report (Andrew Gilman – written submission) Pastor Gilman submitted a written report of his activities for September. His oral presentation was truncated because of the need for him to attend to the pastoral needs of fellow parishioners, who are facing a loss in the family. Andrew also reported that B.J. Newman will be giving a sermon on November 19, 2023, during Andrew's upcoming "Staycation" that will take place from November 17-24. Wes Jetter motioned to accept the report. This was seconded by Pam Bowman and passed 4-0.

Deacon's Meeting A written report was submitted for the October 2, 2023 meeting. After session reviewed the report, a motion was made by Pam Bowman to accept it, seconded by Helen Miller and passing 4-0.

III. Closing

Prayer. A closing prayer was made by Pam Bowman.

Adjournment. Jan Roestamadji motioned to adjourn, which was seconded by Pam Bowman. The motion passed 4-0.

NOW COME THE DAYS OF THE KING (CONT.)

The backstory of Jesus is one that has been told over and over again in the world; and rightly so for He is the savior of the world still today. Each year we go back to Bethlehem in storybooks and worship services to enjoy the retelling of the birth of Jesus in a manger. But what is it all for? That's what I want to talk about in this article? Why retell these stories over and over again?

First, we retell the story of Jesus' birth because we are truly amazed that God became a man. If we view the birth of Jesus through the lens of lore or mythology then the details become somewhat mundane. Afterall, there's another superhero origin movie out every couple of months it seems. However, if we understand the story the way God intended, then we see that this miraculous birth was the opening shot in an ancient battle between God and the Evil One. It was God marching on the gates of hell. One man stepping down into darkness to do battle with the enemy of humanity. The baby in the manger was God's Son, His Chosen One for the mission of reconciling the world to Himself.

Second, we retell the story of Jesus' birth because we are truly amazed that God's son would choose to come as a baby. One of the first questions we ask ourselves is why God would come as a baby? Why subject yourself to 30 years of growing and learning everything from chewing to walking to reading and so on? If we were in-charge, we would likely have sent a fully formed adult warrior; ready to go on day one. We don't fully understand the wisdom of God in having Jesus born subject to all of the laws of nature as well as the laws of Moses.

However, Jesus had to fully succeed in keeping these laws in order to present himself as a perfect sacrifice on our behalf. He was fully God so he was capable of fulfilling the law of Moses and he was fully man capable of substituting for humanity having been subject to every law of nature just as we ourselves are.

Third, we retell the story of Jesus' birth because we are truly amazed that Jesus was born in such humble circumstances. We struggle to see why God would choose to put his only son on earth to be born along-side animals. He was born to a blue collar man and a young woman with little to no wealth. This too confuses us since we would prefer to gather up stuff. If we had a choice to be born into a poor family or a rich family we would choose the latter. Who wouldn't? And we know that God had a choice as to where Jesus would be born, and yet it was to Mary and Joseph in a manger.

Perhaps it was so that we could not accuse Jesus of having special privileges that others did not have. Or maybe it was so that every person could be encouraged by all he accomplished despite his lowly beginnings. These may make sense on a human level, but is there a lesson for us in this that is closer to the core of the gospel mission of Jesus? I think there is.

Jesus estate as a baby in the manger is both an affirmation of our own stories growing day by day as well as a condemnation of the sin and impoverished image of God in humanity at the time of his birth. In God's design for creation, he did not have in mind that children would come into the world in the cold, nor did he imagine they would be born next to the filth of animal refuse. He did not have in mind a world where there was "no room in the inn".

Jesus came to save humanity from the effects of the fall, the corruption of our beings by sin, and to finally put an end to our great enemy Satan. But the origin story of Jesus goes much further back in time than just that cold December night in Bethlehem. It goes back to before the foundation of the world.

Ephesians 1:4 says this...

"Even before he made the world, God loved us and chose us in Christ to be holy and without fault in his eyes."

This was the moment when God the Father agreed with God the Son, that a Savior needed to be sent and that you and I would be among those

who belonged to Him by faith. It was a volunteer mission. It was a necessary mission. It was a mission that became visible to us for the first time in the manger; it came upon a midnight clear. It culminated in a march to the cross and the glorious resurrection from the grave. It is why we still tell the story year after year. It is the hope of all humanity to know and be restored to their creator, God Almighty.

This year, let's marvel again at the wonder of the birth of our savior. Let's consider again how his birth has everything to do with the mission he came to accomplish. Let's remember that this is no myth or legend. It is God stepping down into darkness to rescue the world He made and loves from sin and the curse. This is the prequel to the great deeds and miracles of Jesus as an adult and as our eternal King.


