If I hope to find victory in the Christian life I need to have God's word in my heart. It's just that simple, because it's just that important.


The path to victory is draped in scripture and if we hope to walk the path, we must be saturated in the truths.

#### **Baptist Children's Homes names David Melber next CEO**

THOMASVILLE, N.C. — After a yearlong search, the Baptist Children's Homes (BCH) of North Carolina has a new leader for the first time in 40 years.

David Melber, a veteran executive leader in Southern Baptist life, was named BCH's next CEO following a unanimous vote by the organization's board of trustees during a special meeting held Friday, Oct. 11. BCH officials formally announced Melber's appointment in a news release on Saturday, Oct. 12.

David is a native of Paducah, KY. He earned a bachelor's degree in construction engineering from Murray State University in 1989 and worked in business before surrendering to a call to ministry. He went on to earn a Master of Divinity from The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, KY., in 2001.

He currently serves as Chief Operating Officer/Chief Financial Officer with the Georgia Baptist Mission Board, a position he's held since July 2020. In his current role, Melber is responsible for all of the Georgia Baptist Mission Board's operations, including financial services, information technology, human resources, marketing, events and more.

Previously, he served as a Senior Vice President with the North American Mission Board (NAMB) from October 2015 to December 2019. During his tenure at NAMB, he developed what would become known as Send Relief, an evangelistic compassion ministry. Send Relief was officially launched in 2016 with David serving as its president. In 2020, NAMB joined forces with the International Mission Board (IMB) to extend Send Relief's reach internationally.

David has been married to his wife, Tera, for 33 years. The couple has six grown children, three biological children and three children from international adoptions.

Tera Melber is a trauma care specialist and serves as the founder and Executive Director of Resound Trauma Education, which provides gospel-centered, trauma-informed education and resources. She's also served as a foster care mobilizer with the Georgia Baptist Mission Board, co-hosted a podcast on adoption and fostering through Send Relief from 2017-2020, and directed an adoption and orphan care ministry through her local church for several years.

"Tera and I have always prayed that God would open up a role with an organization like BCH," Melber said. "Looking back at the journey with Send Relief, Georgia Baptist Mission Board, and the adoption of our three international children, it's amazing to see how the Lord has worked through all of our circumstances to bring us to this point. I cannot think of anything greater to give my life to."

The couple plans to move to Thomasville, N.C., as David's office will be located at the Mills Home campus, BCH's inaugural location that also serves as the nonprofit's administrative headquarters. David and his wife desire to live on campus so they can best get to know the staff, the children and individuals who BCH serves, and the 139-year-old ministry itself.

In a statement included in BCH's news release, Melber said it was "humbling" to be selected as the ministry's next CEO.

"Coming into this role at Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina is both sobering and uniquely humbling," Melber said. "God has been preparing me for this opportunity since a visit in 2003 to an orphanage in Moldova where He opened my eyes to the plight of those in great need — particularly children — who have no voice.

"One of the biggest priorities for me is demonstrating — especially over time — my love of the Lord and love for my neighbor," Melber said. "My neighbor includes the staff, who are our most valuable resource, but also includes the broader BCH family of NC Baptists, supporters and ministry partners. At the end of it all, this is not about me or my name. It is about Jesus working through His people to accomplish what only He can accomplish."

#### Red Bags, Big Hearts: Berea Baptist's Outreach

On a hot Tuesday morning in August, members from Berea Baptist Church of Elizabeth City set up a table outside a local pharmacy to distribute Red Bags to aging adults picking up their prescriptions. You may ask: "What is a Red Bag?" "How could that help aging adults?" Because medication mismanagement is the number one health risk to individuals 65+, Red Bags are part of NCBAM's "Priority #1: Prevention" outreach. Red Bags safely store all medications in one place and are insulated to keep temperature-sensitive medications chilled during short trips. Red Bags are wonderful tools to help aging adults safely manage their medications. Not only are Red Bags a great way to meet a physical need of aging adults, they are a great way to share the love of Christ. Each bag includes a leaflet that gives instructions for using the Red Bag and shares a simple gospel message. The church chose to include a soap gift bag along with information about their church and how to have a relationship with Jesus. NCBAM partnered with Berea Baptist Church on their Red Bag outreach, initiated by Pastor Jason

Wise and Senior Adult Ministry leader Pam Price as a ServeNC project. They believed it would serve their community and invigorate their Senior Adult minis try—post-COVID. I shared several outreach ideas with them and they chose Red Bags. Pam Price said, "This gave us an opportunity to reach our homebound members as well as the Meals on Wheels clients we serve." Berea Baptist Church saw the Red Bag distribution as a way to serve aging adults in their community that might be unchurched. Price told me, project—from seniors to young mothers with babies. There were great conversations with people who visited our table outside the pharmacy." The Red Bag outreach during ServeNC involved 35 of Berea's senior adults, reaching other aging adults in their community. One member exclaimed, "It was a rewarding project from start to finish!"
