Berea is on a "Journey Through His Word." Following in the footsteps of the first Bereans (see Acts 17:10-15), we are reading and studying the Scriptures with the expectation that God will meet us there and show us the way to go.

Eight months into this Journey, we have made it to the Psalms. The Psalms are the hymnal of Hebrew worship. You can learn a lot by reading the worship music of a church.

"Hymns" have a rich, deep theology that seems very intellectual. "Gospel songs" (think Fanny Crosby to Bill Gaither) tend to have a testimonial focus, singing to one another. "Contemporary Choruses" tend to have an upward focus, singing directly to God.

The Hebrew Psalms have a very unique, widely varied style that does all of the above, but the distinguishing characteristic is that they tend to focus on the "here and now" situation going on at the time of writing.

As our Journey has taken us to the Psalms, we have seen how willing God is to hear our praise, but also our complaints. He is just as willing to hear our frustrations as He is to receive our worship. He is big enough to take our questions and doubts, even when they can seem pointed and vindictive. He is always there to lead us back to comfort and praise.

I think that's been the biggest lesson: He is always there. In Psalm 101, David is setting up his kingdom. In the second half of the Psalm, he sets the standard for someone who will work in his court. They must be humble, honest, and faithful.


But even before he sets the standard for everyone else, he makes a promise to himself that he will likewise live a life of integrity. David promises to put God first, seek His help, and live a counter-cultural life in pursuit of holiness.

On August 10, we were encouraged to memorize these verses and make the very same promise to ourselves. Have you made the promise? Have you kept it?

As we move into the fall, we will find God's immense blessings as we study His word and live a life of integrity before Him.

Will you join Berea on this Journey? Will you come to His word expectantly, asking Him to speak to you? Will you promise yourself and God that you will follow Him with all of your life? Pray for me that I will, even as I pray that you will too!

Dirty, grease stained jeans with a heavy pair of boots on his feet. Simple t-shirts with the sleeves cut off, neatly trimmed beard, cigarette hanging from his lips, and arms covered with an assortment of tattoos. This is the making of a man that might make you a bit nervous. However, after a few minutes of conversation, a couple of his dad jokes and his unique laugh, you realize you have met someone truly special with a heart for Jesus.

It's a common enough mistake, to take stock of the way a person looks, and form an opinion. Just as commonly, we often judge a person by either their worst moments or even their best moments. In 1 Samuel we see this very scenario played out, as Samuel is meeting the sons of Jesse. At first glance each

of the sons of Jesse could gain favor in the eyes of men, and each is subsequently rejected by God. Finally, the youngest, a shepherd by the name of David, is summoned and God's chosen heir to the throne is selected. Samuel is reminded that God does not look to the outward appearance. He is not looking for the markers by which we examine people, good looks, success, or even a fist full of degrees. Instead, God looks beyond all those things at the very heart of man.

This brings us to the question, what's the condition of my heart? Perhaps like Eliab, people look at us and see someone who would be the perfect choice, and yet just like Eliab, God looks to the heart and he finds us lacking where it matters the most. The good news is, we have a Savior that will cleanse and make new, even usable, the most vile heart. Choose today to allow Jesus to cleanse your heart within, so there is no question that we are acceptable in His sight.

#### NC churches join forces, partner with ministries to 'ServeNC'

About 500 N.C. Baptist churches took part in ServeNC Week from Aug. 2-9, with many completing projects at other times this summer. This was the second year of the ServeNC emphasis, a statewide initiative that invites local churches to serve their communities in tangible, practical ways.

Churches served across the state, providing meals, hosting clothing closets, offering free laundry services, delivering baked goods to first responders and through various other ways. Volunteers of all ages and generations served together and had opportunities to have meaningful Gospel conversations with their neighbors.

Several churches encouraged members to give financially or collect donations if they couldn't physically join on-site. Southside Baptist Church in Elm City collected bedding for Sleep in Heavenly Peace, a nonprofit organization that builds and delivers beds to children in need.

#### God glorified and joy multiplied

Caleb Waller serves as a Great Commission catalyst for North Carolina's regions 5 and 7. Over the last few weeks, he traveled the region to visit churches as they participated in ServeNC.

"My time with our churches has reminded me that God has strategically placed His people right where they need to be — in the midst of lostness, brokenness and hopelessness — so that He might be glorified and joy multiplied, from our neighborhoods to the nations," Waller said.

"ServeNC has equally reminded me of the beautiful gift of serving King Jesus together. There are few things that demonstrate the transformative and authentic power of the Gospel as much as like-minded churches locking arms together and believers serving side by side."

As districts prepare for a new school year, many churches focused on assisting local schools during ServeNC Week. Ten volunteers from Lake Church in White Lake built a deck and ramp and painted doors at Elizabethtown Christian Academy. Some walked through classrooms to pray. Cornerstone Baptist Church in Mount Airy distributed backpacks and provided vouchers for students to receive free shoes, which were funded by a neighboring church.

Churches partnered with local ministries and other organizations already meeting needs in their communities. Catalyst Church in Jacksonville supported their local YMCA's Community Day by distributing school supplies, preparing and serving food, and setting up and overseeing activity stations.

First Baptist Church of Kannapolis provided new teachers with lunch and gift bags, and helped set up classrooms in Kannapolis City Schools. In Raleigh, New Hope Baptist Church served alongside the Raleigh Dream Center and Carolina Hurricanes defenseman Jaccob Slavin to distribute backpacks.

ServeNC Week offered opportunities for collaboration. The Cabarrus Baptist Association worked with local ministry partners on a back-to-school fair while hosting the Baptists on Mission mobile health screening unit. In Stokes County, several churches also worked together to organize another back-to-school event.

Blaise Baptist Church in Mocksville mobilized about 126 volunteers to participate in 17 events. They built on ministry already happening year-round. Volunteers joined existing efforts like one member's weekly visits to a nursing home, another's involvement with Storehouse for Jesus' gardening group, and a group's weekly meals for Celebrate Recovery. New participants joined regular volunteers, offering more people a window into service that can continue beyond ServeNC Week.

Emily Angell, who coordinated the week's events, said ServeNC helped their church family grow together.

"I learn things working beside people in a project that I would not learn otherwise," Angell said. "I learn why they're passionate about going to the senior living home or about packing these backpacks. It really strengthens our relationships and our community."

Memorial Baptist Church in Williamston is using ServeNC to support new church plants in eastern North Carolina. A team traveled to Pillar Havelock, a 2-year-old plant, to tackle needed renovations and repairs. While Memorial hopes to become a sending church, they're already investing in church planting by serving Pillar, First Love in Tarboro and Gospel Hope in Greenville through three dedicated projects.

"ServeNC Week was a beautiful reminder that 'On Mission Together' is more than a slogan. It's who we are," said Todd Unzicker, N.C. Baptist Executive Director-Treasurer. "I'm so grateful for every volunteer and local church that poured out their time and energy to serve.

"Together, N.C. Baptists have shown communities across the state that Jesus brings healing for today and hope for tomorrow, and that His love is put on display when we work side by side."





# **Hurricane Helene Update**



We are using our Helene donations to purchase building materials that will be used by volunteers to help get families back in their homes (Our goal is 1000 homes this year). More than half the cost of building is labor, but with volunteers providing the labor we can double or even triple the number of families that we can get back in their homes.

Even more than that, volunteers are providing a listening ear, a smile, a prayer and encouragement to the family that they are not forgotten. Volunteers provide hope. Baptist disaster relief volunteers have been working since Helene hit. We started with mass feeding, and along with our partners with NC Emergency Management, Red Cross and Salvation Army were able to provide almost 500,000 hot meals.

Next came chainsaw jobs, mud-outs and tear outs of homes that had been flooded. Volunteers showed up to tear out flooring and drywall, to stop the spread of mold and give encouragement with conversations, smiles and prayers. Over 5000 jobs were completed.

Then we started working to try to help get people back in their homes. As of August 10, 2025, we have completed 433 home rebuilds, we have 248 in progress and we have a total of 1300 rebuild requests. Baptists on Mission is operating 5 rebuild sites in Western North Carolina to assist those affected by Hurricane Helene. We can house, feed and work volunteers from these rebuild centers.

We are trying to get homeowners back into their homes as quickly as possible. We will be working for the next 4-5 years to help with rebuild efforts. You don't need to be trained to serve. We're grateful to the more than 16,000 people who have volunteered since the storm hit our state.

Thank you for helping us offer hope to families affected by this massive storm. Please continue to pray for everyone impacted by Hurricane Helene.


