Founded in 1975, Canine Companions is leading the service dog industry so their clients and their dogs can live with greater independence. They provide service dogs to adults, children and veterans with disabilities and facility dogs to professionals working in healthcare, criminal justice and educational settings. The dogs and all follow-up services are provided at no cost to their clients. The South Central Training Center is located in Irving, TX, and serves Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas.

At Community First Village, each new resident is gifted basic household goods to get them started in their new home. We chose to purchase a homemaking bundle of cleaning supplies, with basic items such as broom, dust pan, mop, sponges, paper towels, a bucket, laundry basket, and various household cleansers. The staff, volunteers, and residents we interacted with when we delivered supplies were friendly and upbeat, creating a warm and welcoming atmosphere.

Inside Book Project & Black Pearl Bookstore

We participated in the Mission Committee's Christmas in July project to provide books to people incarcerated in Texas prisons. When we delivered the 27 books that the congregation provided, Mary Lou and I were extremely impressed by their facility, and the range of materials they provided to the prisoners. All their work is done by volunteers and funded only by donations. It occurred to us that buying additional books, this time from a minority owned bookstore, could help a local business. We found and visited Black Pearl Books and were warmly welcomed by the owners and staff. When we explained what we were planning to do with the books, they insisted we choose some additional titles, at no charge to add to our purchases. With our own contribution on top of the LYN funds, and the free books, we were able to take nearly \$100 worth of books to the Inside Book Project.

Prison Fellowship

About 8 years ago, when I was a very new member of RRPC, I saw the group called Band of Brothers was reading a book called *Outrageous Justice* about the failings of the criminal justice system and the Prison Fellowship. I volunteered at the Indiana Women's Prison for many years and was interested in reading this book, so I signed up to join the study. I'm not sure why I didn't realize that a Band of BROTHERS did not

include women. A member of the group explained Band of BROTHERS to me and graciously volunteered to discuss the book with me if I still wanted to read it. I did read it, and I have been donating to the Prison Fellowship ever since.

Prison Fellowship is the largest Christian nonprofit serving prisoners, former prisoners and their families, while advocating for criminal justice reform. I gave my \$25 to the Prison Fellowship Angel Tree, which provides gifts to the children of an incarcerated parent, along with a note from them.

Dianna Howell	Mountain Seed Foundation	After much thought and prayer, I discovered the Mountain Seed Foundation and gave my \$25 along with my own money to this organization.	
		The Mountain Seed Foundation provides mental health support to children and their families caught in the war zones of Europe, primarily in Ukraine. It was founded by Nathan Schmidt, a U.S. Marine who served in war-torn countries for many years. The non-profit was inspired by Matthew 17: 21. Through Nathan's own experience with PTSD and the impacts on his family, he grew to recognize the importance of mental health support. He experienced healing in nature, most notably in mountaineering. It took faith and mountains to finally get Nathan to a place of hope and the ability to heal. He shares that his faith, the mountains, and listening, allowed him to understand this calling—the	

		calling to help others find peace and hope for the most vulnerable and the innocent victims of conflict: the children and their families.
		The program has a Healing Base Camp in Austria where Ukrainian participants learn to build resilience through mountaineering. Climbing tall mountains challenges them physically and mentally, while therapists give the families personalized one-on-one sessions to help give them healthy coping skills.
		I can't do much to help those facing war, but at least I know my donation is helping others to heal from the tragedies they have faced.
Dick Foster	Samaritan's Purse	I added a little cash and made a donation to Samaritan's Purse to be used to plant a grove of fruit trees in Southern Sudan or Uganda. I'm a strong believer in the adage to "give a man a fish, feed him for a day; teach a man to fish, feed him for a lifetime." This grove of trees will provide family income, food for a starving population, remove carbon dioxide from the air, and give off oxygen for generations.
