On Trinity Sunday we proclaim the unfathomable mystery of our faith in the triune God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit, One-in-Three and Three-in-One. In a sense, it synthesizes all we have celebrated over the past months which have centered on God's mighty acts: Christmas-Epiphany celebrating God's taking flesh and dwelling among us in Jesus Christ; Easter celebrating Christ's death and resurrection for us; Pentecost celebrating God the Holy Spirit becoming our Sanctifier, Guide, and Teacher.

The celebration of Trinity Sunday began among Western Christians in the 10th century and developed slowly until it was formally established on the Sunday after Pentecost by Pope John XXII (1316-1334).

AN ENTOMBED PIPE ORGAN

Many pipe organs are enclosed in specific rooms known as "pipe chambers." Gazing at the chancel of Oak Hills Presbyterian Church, one sees a façade of 50 pipes, but behind it resides another 1500 pipes encased in wooden racks atop wind chests. This room was specially designed by John Lile and beloved charter member Cy Betts to contain a pipe organ. It is double- lined with sheetrock designed to project the sound into the church, with vibrancy. The room, very tight, would be the perfect refuge in the event of a tornado.

As a previous resident of New Orleans and survivor of Hurricane Katrina, I witnessed many churches' after-effects of the storm, along with the loss of several notable pipe organs. One of those great losses to the Synod of the Sun was the suburban congregation known as Peace Presbyterian Church. Its origins predating the Civil War, the Congregation was known as the Claiborne Avenue Presbyterian Church, located three miles east of the French Quarter. By the early 1980's, most members had moved, and the Session voted to move to the eastern suburb of New Orleans. They built a new sanctuary in traditional Presbyterian style, merged with another congregation, and renamed themselves to be Peace Presbyterian Church.



They also moved their significant circa-1922 Moller pipe organ to the new sanctuary in 1984. That organ had two manuals and more than 900 pipes, plus a beautiful chime set (like OHPC's). All pipes were encased in a prepared second floor chamber above the chancel, but none were visible. According to the local organ tuner in 2005, the instrument was fully workable but had not been played in many years.



Hurricane Katrina's August 2005 entry into the city was not kind to Peace Presbyterian Church, located one mile from the breach of the city's levee system. Peace was devastated, its windows blown out and the interior flooded with nine feet of putrid flood water. The sanctuary was devastated and the entire contents, including the communion table, wiped out! Curiously, the roof held, so the elevated pipe chamber was undamaged, and its precious contents completely preserved.

Active at the time with First Presbyterian Church of New Orleans, my beloved Pastor alerted me to the situation at Peace Presbyterian Church, saying *"There may"*

even be a pipe organ extant in the building. We should check it out. The church has been gutted, but I think the organ is still intact."

In October 2005, the Pastor and I, along with others, drove to New Orleans East and assessed the situation. There we found the 1922 Moller console intact and the pipe chamber in dry, immaculate condition. We entered a trap door and crawled into the perfectly preserved pipe chamber – seeing the 900 pipes set on three separate wind chests, all in perfect order, without damage. The chime set remained silent on the adjacent wall, and the blower motor sat on the floor awaiting power. Of course, without electricity, assessing the operation of the organ was impossible. But to see this survivor of the great storm was truly remarkable. The chamber was completely dry, mold-free, and clean.

Peace Presbyterian Church was disbanded by the Session and the Synod of the Sun immediately following Hurricane Katrina. The Synod sold the gutted building in 2006 to a

Baptist Congregation that had lost its sanctuary in the storm. The building was sold with the entombed pipe organ, where it remains to this date, inoperative and waiting for its next life. The cost of removing, rebuilding, and reinstalling the vintage, hundred-year-old organ surely exceeds its value. I oft schemed of a way to save this significant piece of organ art, but economic realities prevented any solution.

"A hand up, not a hand out"

That's the motto for Habitat for Humanity. The original concept was started prior to 1973 by Clarence Jordan from Americus, Georgia. From this biblical scholar and farmer, Millard and Linda Fuller developed the idea of "partnership housing". By working with volunteers, those needing adequate housing could be built at no profit. The first family to benefit from this concept were Beau and Emma.

In 1973, the Fullers took this concept to Zaire, Africa. Three years later, they returned to the United States and founded Habitat for Humanity International. Jimmy Carter, with his wife Rosalynn, became involved and started working with volunteers in New York in 1984.

The first Habitat for Humanity home in the US was built in San Antonio!

Who gets a house? In general, it's based on level of need, the person's willingness to become partners in the program, and their ability to repay the loan. An extensive background check is done for character references. Employer interviews and a financial audit is also conducted. There are normally a first and second mortgage. The second mortgage is to cover any equity not covered in the first mortgage. It is usually forgiven if the house is paid down by homeowners within a certain period that varies by affiliate.

Up to 500 hours of sweat equity (working on a future homeowner's house or other houses being constructed) is re-



quired. Once the sweat equity is done, the homeowner purchases the home with a 0% - 2% interest rate. The monthly payment, inclusive of taxes and homeowners' insurance, will not exceed 30% of the homeowner's monthly income.

Mortgage payments go to Habitat to build future homes. Until the mortgage is paid in full, there is no equity and the home can only be sold back to Habitat for Humanity.

Since 1976, over one million homes have been built or repaired, serving five million people.

San Antonio Habitat for Humanity requires a minimum of 300 hours of sweat equity. Applicants are chosen on basis of need, ability to pay a 0% interest mortgage, and will-ingness to partner. In addition, they must be a resident of Bexar County. Once accepted, the homeowner can buy a home with 20–25-year 0% interest. The loan default rate is less than 1%.

Currently, over 150,000 families in San Antonio need affordable housing. 100% of the donations go to home building.

Presbyterian Cluster

There are over 20 Presbyterian churches in San Antonio. At least 15 are part of the Presbyterian Cluster. Each year, the cluster raises the current \$60,000 to sponsor a home and donates volunteers to build a home and supply lunch to the hungry volunteers. This year, we were blessed with a \$100,000 donation from a property sale. This was used to complete the sponsorship and allowed 2 homes to be built.

Currently, the build site is south of San Antonio at Rancho Carlota. When finished, 250 homes will have been built!
