Psalms 34:1-10, 22





THE ENTERTAINMENT AND MUSIC WORLDS GO CASUAL



I had the thrill and privilege of attending a Frank Sinatra concert, live at the Sands Hotel in Las Vegas, in January 1982. Ole Blue Eyes, then 66, was in the prime of his career, singing his signature pieces such as "The Lady is a Tramp," "My Way," and "New York, New York." He appeared in the Sands' large showroom immaculately attired in black tuxedo, white shirt, and bow tie. Sinatra dressed that way his entire career. When I saw him live at the New Orleans Superdome in 1987, he was the same class act. So were most other popular singers of the day.

Comedians also hewed to a formal attire. Don Rickles, the "Merchant of Venom," always was formally attired, even if his insults and jokes were anything but staid. The women in comedy wore beautiful gowns and evening attire. I enjoyed seeing Joan Rivers at a show in Michigan in 1976, and she wore well her evening dress.



When performers dress up, they are honoring their craft, as well as respecting their audiences. This standard generally stood through the 1960's. When the "British Invasion" launched the Beatles on their American tour, the young, longish-haired group wore stylish narrow neckties and dark suits. These paradigms began to shift to more casual attire starting in the 1970's, then greatly accelerating toward the end of the 20th Century. The influence of rock groups, including Country/Western performers, was a major driver as our society became more casual.



Nowadays most entertainers, comedians, and musicians are casually attired as they perform before casually-dressed audiences. Exceptions include some mega-star women, such as Taylor Swift and Lady Gaga, who wear elaborate costumes as part of their acts. A handful of male crooners, including Michael Bublé, continue to wear tuxes and tails.

The last hold-out for dress-up performers include opera singers and organists. The former continue to appear in costumes appropriate for the production, while the latter commonly wear suits or tuxedos for men, or evening wear for women. I might opine that traditional music might call for formal attire, even if the audiences are dressed casually.

Finally, in our church world, serious choirs either dress up, or if in church, wear choir robes. In this case, they are offering respect not only to the congregation and to the music, but to the majesty of the universal church. No matter what your choir and organist wear for worship, it should be stated that all congregants are encouraged to worship in the attire they deem appropriate. If we are to welcome all, that includes those wearing formal or everyday garb. God does not discriminate.

This month, the Membership Committee is highlighting one of our longtime members, Anne Speights

Anne was born in La Porte, Indiana. Her father worked for General Electric, and the family moved several times while she was growing up. She has one younger brother, who was born in NY State. They also lived in King of Prussia, PA and then Asheville, NC, where Anne graduated from HS. It was in high school that she met her first husband, Steve Macintosh. She attended High Point and Maryville College, then Asheville-Buncombe Technical Institute (now with UNC). Growing up, her family attended Methodist and Presbyterian churches.

She married Steve after college and the couple moved to Lexington, KY. Anne says she became a “corporate wife.” and also did bookkeeping/secretarial with Carey Construction and Junior Achievement. Her husband worked for the American Can Corporation, and his job also required frequent moves throughout the US, but mostly southern states. They had two sons, Doug, and Heath. At one point, they owned and ran an IHOP restaurant in Gulfport, MS and Biloxi, MS.

The couple divorced in 1991 after 24 years of marriage. Her sons were grown and had moved to California. Anne decided to move to San Antonio, to be closer to her parents who lived in Leon Valley near many other OHPC members of the time. Anne lived in apartments now known as the Oaks at Medical Center just down the street from OHPC.

Anne initially worked for Kelly Services at Corporate Square and soon was hired in the Admissions and Registrar's Office. She retired as Associate Registrar in 2012. It was there she met Steve Speights. The couple was married at Oak Hills and Anne believed theirs was the last marriage performed in the old sanctuary, 8/8/98. They attended OHPC since the 1990's. Steve Speights passed away in 2019 after 20 years of marriage.

Anne has been a continually active member of our congregation. She served many roles including serving as an Elder, Counter, Women's Circle, OHPC Prayer Chain, Middle School Sunday School Teacher and inventory help at the OHPC Library many times (happens when your mother, Alita, is the church librarian). She is currently involved in the Oak Hills Book Club. Anne says she never spent much time reading but joined the group during COVID while the group met via Zoom. She has also participated in the recent Bible Study groups and helped Jack Henson with managing cash at our recent Garage Sales.

Anne is a crafter, loves holidays/decorating and enjoys Googling, which was introduced to Steve and Anne by Dad (Fred Cooper). She has become a daily Psalm 150 reader and Pray As You Go evening prayer time. Family and friends mean more as the years pass, and God has been good.

Anne enjoys participating in the online worship services but joins the congregation “live” on most Communion Sundays.

Our congregation is so blessed to have such a longtime, faithful member!
