

God's covenant with Abraham: I will make of you a great nation.


Psalm 22:23-31



WORKING WITH SINGERS

Church musicians will agree that four factors contribute significantly to the satisfaction of being a Music Director and Organist. Those factors include the quality of the facility and organ, the personalities of the clergy and staff, the dynamic of the congregation itself, and the ability of the choir and singers. This essay will focus on the fourth factor, collaborating with the choir and singers.

In more than 50 years of serving as an organist, I have encountered every possible situation with singers, from sublime success to dizzying disaster. In general, the larger and more moneyed congregations will attract the better singers and choir members, while the smaller churches, especially mission churches, often struggle along. There are exceptions, of course.

In the 1970's I played for Roman Catholic congregations in Ohio and Arizona. My worst experiences centered on unqualified singers who served as cantors, leading the singing at Mass. With few priests being musicians, whether a cantor was good or bad, was up for grabs. I remember a husband-and-wife team, where the husband was the organist and the wife was the cantor. The wife was an opera-trained mezzo-soprano, whose warbling voice and gross vibrato was shocking to hear in church. One Sunday she croaked out the familiar Trinitarian hymn, *Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty*. It was just awful, her piercing voice making a mockery of holiness. It was raining outside and upon conclusion of the hymn, a huge thunderclap rocked the church building. "Yikes," remarked a parishioner, "even God disapproves!" Shortly thereafter, the pastor ran her off, but this diva was able to secure a new gig shortly thereafter.

For every bad situation encountered, I had two or more good situations. My Arizona church had a tremendous congregation that loved to sing, encouraged by the colorful Irish-American pastor. He always urge the singing of familiar hymns so everyone would participate. The singing was so good, we did not need a cantor—just a strong organist to lead and lift the people.

By the 1980's I had shifted to mainline Protestant churches as the organist, and the relationships with singers and choirs were mostly positive. The one treacherous situation remained wedding singers. Most pastors generally washed their hands of regulating who could sing, not wanting to offend the bridal party. So, if the bride wanted her favorite sorority sister to sing *Ave Maria*—whether that singer was qualified or not—I was at their mercy behind the console. It was then, and now, always hit or miss. Today, I will try to screen the capabilities of the soloists and offer advice to the wedding party. Some churches fully empower the musician to refuse certain singers, although I have never been able to say politely, "You sing like a wailing cow and are not allowed at our church."



Oak Hills Presbyterian Church has had an excellent choir for more than four decades. Our singers are all musically literate—most read music—and they blend well. We just need more singers to augment our ranks, especially when the regular members are away.

During the 13-month pandemic lock-down, our worship was remote and broadcast live. During the period, three persons were involved with the worship inside the sanctuary—Pastor Rachael, Ann Stull as soloist, and me

as organist. The character of the service changed markedly without the presence of a congregation, but we soldiered on. Ann Stull a gifted and talented first soprano, sang beautifully, Sunday after Sunday, her remarkable voice always on pitch and graded with a natural vibrato. Ann's singing voice, coupled with the good preaching by Pastor Rachael, carried us through the rigors of the pandemic.

So, when a musician encounters a good group of singers, plus the other three factors in church ministry, the result is bountiful music. OPHC is blessed indeed!

For he can take this structure, that's As big as any house, And make it squeak as softly as A tiny little mouse; And then he'll jerk out something with A movement of the hand, And make you think you're listening to A military band.



He plays it with his fingers and He plays it with his toes, And if he really wanted to He'd play it with his nose; He's sliding up and down the bench, He's working with his knees; He's dancing round with both his feet As lively as you please.

I always like to take a seat Where I can see him go; He's better than a sermon, and He does me good, I know; I like the life and movement and I like to hear him play; He is the most exciting thing In town on Sabbath day.
