Beloved Family,

During the Ash Wednesday service, we listened to Matthew 6, where Jesus tells us that we are to faithfully practice prayer, almsgiving, and fasting. Then we meditated on how to bring those practices into our Lenten journey. We asked God for guidance on how to pray, what we should be doing more of, and what we should be doing less of. Lent is a time of walking through the wilderness, all the while trying to discern God's path. The wilderness can be unnerving and disorienting, and so I offer you this blessing. I pray you will re-visit it as often as needed.

Beloved Is Where We Begin

If you would enter into the wilderness, do not begin without a blessing.

Do not leave without hearing who you are: Beloved, named by the One who has traveled this path before you.

Do not go without letting it echo in your ears, and if you find it is hard to let into your heart, do not despair. That is what the journey is for.

I cannot promise this blessing will free you from danger, from fear, from hunger or thirst, from the scorching of sun or the fall of the night.

But I can tell you that on this path there will be help. I can tell you that on this way there will be rest.

I can tell you that you will know the strange graces that come to our aid only on a road such as this, that fly to meet us bearing comfort and strength, that come alongside us for no other cause than to lean themselves toward our ear and with their curious insistence whisper our name: *Beloved. Beloved. Beloved.*

Thursday, March 21 at 11 AM



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Lenten Music

Savior, when in dust to thee, Low we bend the adoring knee; When, repentant to the skies, Scarce we lift our weeping eyes; O by all thy pains and woe, Suffered once for man below, Bending from thy throne on high, Hear our solemn litany!

This hymn by 19th Century writer Robert Grant opened our Ash Wednesday service, marking the start of the Lenten Season. As many members have noticed, the music at Oak Hills Presbyterian Church shifts to more meditational and reserved melodies. Lyrics also shift to more sentimental and penitential words, marking this season as one of atonement and purification. In general, my organ anthems are lighter and less prominent, and the choir's selections follow a similar trek.

As we approach Holy Week, some of the lyrics of the classic hymns become more dramatic, even graphic at times. Grant's hymn reflects this shift starting in its third verse, which tracks our Lord's passion and death.

By thine hour of dire despair, By thine agony of prayer; By the cross, the nail, the thorn, Piercing spear, the torturing scorn; By the gloom that veiled the skies, O'er the dreadful sacrifice; Listen to our humble cry, Hear our solemn litany!


also worked in a hospital education department teaching CPR class. Her last job before retirement was Director of Admissions and Records at Lewis and Clark Community College.
