

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Sunday Morning Worship, 10:30 a.m.

October 1 is World Wide Communion Sunday. We celebrate the life and resurrection of our Lord in communion with fellow believers all over the world. While we don't all look alike or worship in the same way, we are all children of the kingdom of God. But Jesus didn't ask us to love just those in our circle of friends or even the wider circle of believers around the world. In our final lectionary text, he asks us to love our neighbors—all of the human beings that God created and that inhabit the world with us. As we go through this month, let us reach out and find ways to share love with all of those around us, even those who act, look, believe or love differently.

Lectionary passages for the month follow:

October 1: 18th Sunday after Pentecost—World Communion Sunday

<u>Ezekiel 18:1-4, 25-32</u>	Is the way of the Lord unfair? Turn away from your sin and live.
<u>Psalm 25:1-9</u>	Be mindful of your mercy, O Lord; do not remember my sin.
Philippians 2:1-13	Seek the mind of Christ, who was humble, but exalted by God.
<u>Matthew 21:23-32</u>	Leaders question Jesus' authority; he answers them with a parable.

October 8: 19th Sunday after Pentecost

Isaiah 5:1-7Isaiah sings of a vineyard that has failed to produce good fruit.Psalm 80:7-15Restore us, O God of hosts; have regard for the vine you planted.Philippians 3:4b-14All that I have is nothing; knowing Jesus Christ is everything.Matthew 21:33-46A parable about a vineyard, wicked tenants, and the owner's son.

October 15: 20th Sunday after Pentecost

Isaiah 25:1-9God will make a feast for all peoples, destroying death forever.Psalm 23The Lord prepares a table for me in the presence of my enemies.Philippians 4:1-9Rejoice in the Lord; do not worry; God's peace will be with you.Matthew 22:1-4The kingdom is like a banquet; many are called, few are chosen.

October 22: 21st Sunday after Pentecost

Isaiah 45:1-7The Lord anoints Cyrus: I alone am God; I call you by name.Psalm 96:1-9 (10-13)Declare God's glory among the nations; all other gods are idols.1 Thessalonians 1:1-10Paul writes to the Thessalonians: We give thanks and pray for you.Matthew 22:15-22The Pharisees test Jesus with a question about paying taxes.

October 29: 22nd Sunday after Pentecost

Leviticus 19:1-2, 15-18	Be holy as the Lord is holy; love your neighbor as yourself.
<u>Psalm 1</u>	Happy are those who delight in the law of the Lord.
<u>1 Thessalonians 2:1-8</u>	We came to you to share the gospel; we also share ourselves.
Matthew 22:34-46	Love the Lord your God, and love your neighbor as yourself.

October 31: Reformation Day

<u>Jeremiah 31:31-34</u>	God says: I will make a new covenant, writing my law in your heart.
<u>Psalm 46</u>	Though the earth changes and the waters roar, God is our refuge.
<u>Romans 3:19-28</u>	We are justified by the gift of God's grace through faith in Jesus Christ.
<u>John 8:31-36</u>	Jesus says: You will know the truth, and the truth will make you free.

Following high school, Jose is hoping to attend college at Texas A&M San Antonio. He is interested in studying cybersecurity.


Jose enjoys playing video games and drawing when he has free time.

We're so pleased to have such a wonderful young man taking part in the leadership of our church!






SINGING THE NATIONAL ANTHEM



"The Star-Spangled Banner" is the National Anthem of the United States. The lyrics were written by lawyer and amateur poet, Francis Scott Key, after he witnessed the bombardment of Fort McHenry by British ships during the War of 1812. He was inspired in his writing by the large U.S. flag, with 15 stars and 15 stripes, flying triumphantly above the fort during the U.S. victory. Key's splendid lyric was set to music originally composed in the 1770's by British writer John Stafford Smith. The composition was adopted by the Navy in 1889, and by joint resolution of Congress became our National Anthem, an Act signed by President Hoover in 1931.

Smith's score is notoriously difficult to sing, especially by amateur vocalists. The composition has a large tonal range, and aspirant singers simply cannot reach the high notes. The lyrics are compelling to sing with drama and Victorian grammar, and even professional singers have struggled. Even skilled singers have been known to forget the words, leading some singers to pre-record and lip-sync their performances.

The most famous performance gaff occurred on May 25, 1965, when Robert Goulet (famed opera-trained singer, remembered as Sir Lancelot in *Camelot*) mangled the lyrics to the National Anthem at the opening of the second Muhammad Ali-Sonny Liston heavyweight fight. Goulet forgot the lyrics and was booed by the crowd and mocked by announcer Howard Cosell. More recently, Christina Aguilera performed wrong lyrics to the song prior to Super Bowl XLV (2011) leading to public criticism.



Yankee Stadium featured for many years the famed operatic baritone, Robert Merrill (1917-2004) singing the National Anthem at the opening of its ballgames. I think Merrill's performance is the best of all. Many versions are available on YouTube; just search for Robert Merrill National Anthem. You will be moved.

Merrill explained he preferred a traditional approach to the Anthem, devoid of additional ornamentation, as he explained to Newsday in 2000, "When you sing the anthem, there's a legitimacy to it. I'm extremely bothered by these different interpretations of it."

Garage Sale News




Thank you, thank you, thank you!
