Beloved Family,

This past Sunday went a little differently than planned. Overnight storms caused an electricity surge, leaving us with fried appliances, persistent alarms, and no sound system in the sanctuary. To me, it felt as though God was trying to get our attention, to encourage us to not simply go through the business of worship as usual. So instead of listening to a typical sermon, you all allowed me to lead you through a God-centered meditation exercise. I can't count the number of people who later told me that it might have been the first time in weeks that they had relaxed their shoulders or unclenched their jaws. Which indicates that perhaps we could all use a little more relaxation these days. With that in mind, I have created this brief meditation. As you read it, just allow your body to follow the instructions, no brain power required!

Uncross your legs, and allow your feet to rest on the ground.

Relax your arms by your sides or in your lap, palms facing up.

Take a slow, deep breath in through your nose, and exhale through your mouth.

Do this two more times.

Notice your shoulders, and allow them to drop away from your ears.

Notice your jaw, and soften it if it is clenched, perhaps even parting your lips slightly.

Notice your forehead, and relax it if it is furrowed.

Take a slow, deep breath, marveling that God chose to create you.

Take a slow, deep breath, marveling that God chose to create the world around you.

Take a slow, deep breath, creating space for God's guidance.

Take a slow, deep breath, grateful for today.

I hope this blesses you. Come back to it as often as you need during the month of May and beyond. And remember to take things one day at a time.



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Sunday Morning Worship, 10:30 a.m.



We continue to celebrate our risen Lord throughout the season of Easter, which ends with Pentecost. In keeping with Jewish tradition, the disciples were gathered on the day of Pentecost, which was the Greek name for the Feast of Weeks, so called because it fell seven weeks (a week of weeks) after the Firstfruits celebration. While gathered for this feast, there came a sound from heaven like the rushing of a mighty wind and above them appeared something like tongues of fire. As Christians, we celebrate this day of Pentecost as the birth of the church, when the Lord sent the blessing of his Holy Spirit to men on earth.

Listed below are Lectionary passages to reflect upon each week throughout the remaining Easter season.

May 7, Fifth Sunday of Easter

Acts 7:55-60 An angry crowd stones Stephen; he prays: Jesus, receive my spirit.

Psalm 31:1-5, 15-16 Deliver me, O Lord; into your hands I commit my spirit.

<u>1 Peter 2:2-10</u> Now you are God's people, built into a temple like living stones.

John 14:1-14 Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life; he prepares a place for us.

May 14, Sixth Sunday of Easter & Mother's Day

Acts 17:22-31 Paul introduces the Athenians to their "unknown god": the Lord.

Psalm 66:8-20 Bless God, who hears our prayers and keeps us among the living.

1 Peter 3:13-22 Do not fear; testify to the hope that is in you through Christ.

John 14:15-21 Jesus says: the Father will send the Spirit, who will abide in you.



Acts 1:1-11 Forty days after his resurrection, Jesus ascends into heaven.

<u>Psalm 47</u> Clap, shout, and sing with joy: the Lord reigns over all the earth.

<u>Ephesians 1:15-23</u> Christ is seated at God's right Hand, above every earthly power.

<u>Luke 24:44-53</u> Jesus interprets the Scriptures; then he is carried up into heaven.

May 21, Seventh Sunday of Easter

Acts 1:6-14 After Jesus' ascension, the disciples go to Jerusalem and pray.

<u>Psalm 68:1-10, 32-35</u> God rides upon the clouds, and gives power to the people.

<u>1 Peter 4:12-14, 5:6-11</u> You are suffering now, but the God of grace will restore you.

<u>John 17:1-11</u> Jesus seeks the glory of God and prays for his disciples.

May 28, Day of Pentecost

Acts 2:1-21 On the day of Pentecost, God pours out the Spirit upon the earth.

or Numbers 11:24-30 The Lord sends the Spirit to the elders of Israel, and they prophesy.

Psalm 104:24-34, 35b The Lord of creation sends forth the Spirit to renew the earth.

1 Corinthians 12:3b-13 In the body of Christ there are varieties of gifts, but one Spirit.

<u>John 20:19-23</u> The risen Lord appears to the disciples and gives them the Spirit.

or <u>John 7:37-39</u> Jesus promises the Spirit: living water from the believer's heart.














We love good books!

Book Club goes on hiatus for the summer, but we'll be back in the fall. Check us out again in August when we will set out a new list of eclectic titles for your reading pleasure!


Ron and Idalia Harmon Memorial Scholarship

Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer.


Summer camp is a great opportunity for young people to meet with other youth and grow in their Christian Faith.

TURNING A MUSICAL PHRASE

Music is so emblazoned in our culture that many everyday musical expressions populate our speech. Just come to our choir practice, and you will hear an assortment of phrases uttered by me and our loyal choir members.

My favorite is **Pull out all the stops**, meaning going all out. This phrase referred originally to organ stops (the pull tabs controlling the pipe voices). When they are all pulled out, the instrument achieves maximum volume. Of course, I rarely do this as certain choir members become rather upset as they are blasted from their pews.

Another one we hear regularly is **Preaching to the Choir**, meaning pointlessly trying to convince someone of an opinion they already agree with. One rarely hears Pastor Rachael preaching that folks should attend church, as most of our faithful members are already present.



We enjoy referring to people who **Toot their own horn.** In medieval times, heralds would announce the arrival of a VIP with a trumpet fanfare. If you weren't a VIP, you had to blow your own horn. Many politicians are famous for tooting their own horns.

Politicians also are known to **Change their tune**. It's another way of saying someone has changed an opinion on something.

When folks say It strikes a chord, they mean they personally agree with the statement - just like a piano hammer striking a string within the case of the piano.

The choir members sometimes inquire if we are **Singing from the same song sheet**. Usually, the comment is lobbed at me by one of our many astute singers, detecting I am not playing the score as written. The choir members seem to be correct about 99% of the time.





Our pipe organ truly has **All the bells and whistles.** You may have thought your loaded luxury car was laden with this trait. The phrase originated in the 1920's when theater pipe organs had extra stops and features – just like our John Lile Memorial Organ has a Zimbelstern, a Chime set, and a Festival Trumpet. I use these features regularly in our worship.

People often say **It rings a bell** if something appears to be familiar to them. In ordinary life we rely on bells to remind us to do certain tasks.

All of us aspire to good health, or to be **As fit as a fiddle.** First coined to refer to a violin ready for use, now it just means in sound health.

So many of our phrases have their origins in music, and this essay merely scratches the surface. Come to our choir practice sometime; your presence would be **Music to my ears**.

Mother's Day



Celebrations of mothers and motherhood can be traced back to the ancient Greeks and Romans, who held festivals in honor of the mother goddesses Rhea and Cybele, but the clearest modern precedent for Mother's Day is the early Christian festival known as "Mothering Sunday." Once a major tradition in the United Kingdom and parts of Europe, this celebration fell on the fourth Sunday in Lent and was originally seen as a time when the faithful would return to their "mother church"—the main church in the vicinity of their home—for a special service. Over time the Mothering Sunday tradition shifted into a more secular holiday, and children would present their mothers with flowers and other tokens of appreciation. This custom eventually faded in popularity before merging with the American Mother's Day in the 1930s and 1940s. Mother's Day continues to be celebrated by presenting mothers and other women with gifts and flowers, and it has become one of the biggest holidays for consumer spending. Families also celebrate by giving mothers a day off from activities like cooking or other household chores.
