A Pastor's Perception

If you didn't know, this is my favorite Christmas song. Not just for the haunting melody, but for what it teaches us about longing and presence. About waiting and hope.

Here's the tension: We believe God is with us—Emmanuel. And yet we still cry out, "O come!"

We long for Him to come again. To bring the new. To end suffering. To usher in the fullness of His kingdom.

O come, O Bright and Morning Star, and bring us comfort from afar!

Dispel the shadows of the night and turn our darkness into light.

O come, O King of nations, bind in one the hearts of all mankind.

Bid all our sad divisions cease and be yourself our King of Peace.

O come.

What is it we're really asking for? Peace. Rest. Endless joy. The setting right of all things.

WGT Youth Update

As we are wrapping up the year in 2025 and looking forward to 2026, I wanted to provide an update on the youth of our church.

We have had some big events during the last part of 2025. The youth volunteered at Unto Warehouse in Mount Joy to help pack clothing as part of their October Mission Packing Event. We had a big turnout for the event of 15 youth and some brough friends to join. Our biggest attended event and one of the kids favorites was the Operation Christmas Shopping in November where we went to Dollar Tree and filled shoe boxes for

the children overseas. The youth did a great job of showing the love of Christ to these children by filling the shoe boxes with wonderful gifts and tried to put as much as they could into the boxes. Knowing His Voice

Last week I met with my mentor, David Superdock. We try to connect about once a month to encourage one another in the daily challenges of worship ministry. David serves as the Worship Arts Director at South Lebanon Community Church, and I'm grateful for these meetings because they are often exactly what we both need—sometimes one of us needs lifting up, sometimes both of us do.

This time, I knew I was the one who needed the boost.

I shared some concerns I've been carrying, particularly my desire to continue strengthening the culture of our worship team at WGT. Not because things are going poorly—but because I believe God always has room for growth, refinement, and deeper unity. I asked David if he would consider coming to lead a session with our team to encourage them.

As gently and wisely as only a mentor can, he paused and reminded me of something important. Aside from God's voice, the WGT worship team knows *my* voice best. They recognize it. They trust it. They know it belongs to a teammate and a friend. His voice, though well-intended, might feel unfamiliar—something they wouldn't know how to receive in the same way.

That thought stopped me in my tracks.

It immediately brought to mind John 10:27, where Jesus says, "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me." David's encouragement reminded me that as I seek God's will for the role I serve in, I must first be sure that I know His voice. If I truly am a sheep of His pasture, then the voice of the Shepherd should be familiar, recognizable, and trusted.

The reality is that we live in a world filled with voices competing for our attention. Many of them sound good. Many of them seem wise. But only one voice is best—the voice of the Good Shepherd.

So how do we learn to hear His voice?

It begins with prayer and abiding in Him. When we intentionally spend time in His presence and quiet the noise of the world around us, His voice becomes clearer. We also hear His voice through Scripture, where God consistently reveals His heart and character. And at times, His voice comes through wise counsel—brothers and sisters in Christ who are walking faithfully with Him and help us discern His leading. So I ask you today:

Are you able to hear His voice? And when you do—how do you respond?
