A Pastor's Perception

May I please have your attention?

It sounds polite enough, doesn't it? A courteous way to ask someone to listen. But in our modern world, the battle for our attention has become more sophisticate and far more aggressive.

Remember when we had just a handful of television channels? Commercials were simply part of the experience. We watched them whether we wanted to or not, and many of us can still recall those memorable Christmas advertisements that became as much a part of the holiday tradition as the shows themselves.

Today, we pay premium prices to avoid commercials on our streaming services. Yet somehow, they still capture our attention through product placements seamlessly woven into our favorite shows. The methods have evolved, but **the goal** remains the same: to hold our focus long enough to influence our choices.

Consider a recent example: a clothing company made headlines not for their sales figures, but for a controversial advertisement. Critics drew attention to condemn it. Supporters rallied to defend it. The result? Without seeing a single increase in actual sales, the company's stock value rose simply because people were talking about them. **Attention itself had become currency.**

Companies understand what many of us are only beginning to realize: <u>attention has measurable value</u>. They hire influencers, craft viral content, and design apps specifically to capture and hold our focus. They study our habits, track our clicks, and optimize every pixel on our screens to keep us engaged.

Most telling of all is our relationship with our phones. Research suggests the average user touches their device over **2,000 times per day**. Think about that number. Many of us may not share that many words with the people we love most in an entire day, yet we interact with our phones thousands of times.

We've entered an era where a battle is raging for **our most precious resource**—not our money, but <u>our attention</u>, <u>our time</u>, <u>our focus</u>. **Where Is Your Treasure?**

Jesus spoke directly to this reality when He said, "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:21). In our digital age, attention has become our treasure. Where we focus our minds reveals what we truly value.

He also commanded us to "love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength" (Mark 12:30).

In 2012, the Christmas Dinner expanded to include delivery and take-out as well. This allowed us to serve more individuals and families within the community. We also outreach to local Emergency Response personnel.

The original goal of the Christmas Dinner was to offer a place to share a meal and fellowship with those who did not have elsewhere to be on Christmas Day. This continues to be the mission behind the ministry – serving others and meeting them where they are to extend the love of Jesus by being His hands and feet. We in turn, are abundantly blessed by Christ – He has faithfully provided each year to meet the needs of those who have participated in the Christmas meal – and we trust that He will continue to do so this year.

Our Challenge

So here's the question that cuts to the heart of our spiritual lives: Does Jesus have your attention?

If we interact with our phones 2,000 times a day, how many times do we turn our attention to Him? If we scroll through hundreds of posts, do we spend even a fraction of that time reading His words? If we share our thoughts instantly with social media, do we share our hearts as readily with our Savior?

This isn't about guilt or shame, it's about awareness. It's about recognizing that in a world designed to fracture our focus, choosing where we place our attention becomes an act of worship.

The companies and platforms vying for your attention have teams of experts, sophisticated algorithms, and billion-dollar budgets. But Jesus simply says, "Come to me" (Matthew 11:28).



The Soundboard: An Instrument On the Worship Team

Greetings, WGT Family!

During the Spring Congregational Forum, several of our family members expressed concern with the current sound system being used during gatherings and events in the sanctuary here at WGT. Specific concerns were raised about the frequent issues with the microphone Pastor Shawn uses and the quality of sound in other regards.

Following that meeting, the Stewards and Technology teams began working on solutions to rectify the issues at hand. Following thorough research, both of these teams recommended Tim Cyphers (production director at South Lebanon Community Church) come in for some consulting and trouble-shooting. I've known Tim for a few years now and knew of his expertise in this area.

During the first meeting with Tim, he was not only able to make a list of projects to be improved on the sound front, but he adjusted the gain and EQ for the pastor microphone and then saved a preset that can be recalled each week ensuring little to no trouble. In addition, Tim continues to set up presets for each of our teammates as time allows.

It has been great to receive your feedback from Sunday mornings as the sound continues to improve. It is great to hear that you are experiencing clearer sound and can hear the distinct and beautiful voices of each of our teammates as they lead us in worship. Praise be to God for this! In addition, the livestream has been running with clearer sound as Tim has helped us to connect the sanctuary sound to the livestream making the experiences both in the sanctuary and at home a worshipful environment. In light of these notable improvements, Tim said something profound a few times while in the building working on the system. He shared that the soundboard should be viewed as an instrument on the worship team. The operator of the soundboard should play it as an instrument and be adjusting it actively to draw out the best sound. If one of our talented vocalists is leading a song or a guitar part is the driver at the beginning of the song, the soundboard operator should actively raise the volume on these components so that they are brought to the front and heard the most clearly. Tim's statement resonates with me as we try earnestly to give the Lord our best efforts knowing He is worthy of it all. The truth of this is that each thing we do for the building of the Kingdom should be done as if we are playing an instrument. It should not become a passive act that is neglected or done half-heartedly. Passive acts of service often do not lead to giving God our very best, which again He is worthy of. When we consider the gifts and talents that God has given us, we should desire to use those gifts fully. So I ask you today, if you are not running the soundboard or playing an instrument, what metaphorical instrument are you playing and how are you playing it? Are you passively playing it and serving reluctantly or are you actively using it give God the best that you have?

"WHAT IT IS" OR "AS IT IS": SETTLED OR VINSETTLING?

"What It Is" or "As It Is": Settled or Unsettling? A September Sermon Series

"It is what it is."

This phrase seems to follow me everywhere—on social media, in conversations, even in my own thoughts when life feels overwhelming. While I don't use it regularly myself, I find myself resonating with its underlying sentiment: there's so much in life we must simply accept.

The Serenity Prayer captures this tension perfectly: "God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can, and wisdom to know the difference." But how do we actually discern that difference? When should we settle into acceptance, and when should our unsettledness propel us toward action?

Jesus taught his disciples to pray a radical prayer: "Your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven." As it is in heaven—yes, that's exactly what I want. But what's my role in making that reality? And what does heaven actually look like?

This September, we'll spend several weeks wrestling with these questions in a series called "What It Is" or "As It Is": Settled or Unsettling? We'll explore when acceptance becomes faithful surrender and when it becomes passive resignation. We'll discover what it means to pray for God's will while actively participating in its fulfillment.

I'm sure there are many things in your life that feel unsettled right now—and I'm not talking about your stomach after too much fair food. When Pepto-Bismol isn't the answer, what is? Join us as we learn to live faithfully in the tension between "it is what it is" and "your kingdom come."

For those wishing to car pool, meet at the church.


