Food Pantry Collections



You may be seated for the reading of the scriptures.

Reading from Isaiah 2:1-5

The word that Isaiah son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem. In days to come the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established as the highest of the mountains and shall be raised above the hills; all the nations shall stream to it. Many peoples shall come and say, "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob, that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths." For out of Zion shall go forth instruction and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem. He shall judge between the nations and shall arbitrate for many peoples; they shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation; neither shall they learn war any more. Please remain standing for the reading of the Gospel. The Gospel reading takes place from the middle of the sanctuary, a symbol of Christ's presence among the people. The \$2 theological term is the "incarnation" of Christ.

Leader: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Everyone: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Reading from Matthew 24:36-44

But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. For as in the days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so, too, will be the coming of the Son of Man. Then two will be in the field; one will be taken, and one will be left. Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken, and one will be left. Keep awake, therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.

Passing of the Peace

Take a minute to stand, stretch, and greet those around you. Traditionally this a time when the church exchanges words of peace to one another, echoing the words of Jesus in John 20:21, saying, "peace be with you."

You may be seated during the following liturgy.

Leader: The Lord be with you.

Everyone: And also with you.

Leader: Lift up your hearts.

Everyone: We lift them to the Lord.

Leader: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. Everyone: It is right to give him thanks and praise.

Leader: It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to

you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth. Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who

for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name,

Everyone: Holy, Holy, Holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your

glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of

the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Leader: Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when

we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live

and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He

stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your

will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

Leader: On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ

took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his

disciples, and said,

Everyone: Take, eat; this is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of

me.

Leader: After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to

them, and said,

Everyone: Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you

and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the

remembrance of me.

Leader: Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Everyone: Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

Leader: We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise

and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him.

Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom. All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is

yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. Amen.

Leader: And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say:

Everyone: Our Father, who are in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will

be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And let us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and

the glory, forever and ever. Amen.

Communion Instructions

We practice intinction during communion, which means you take the wafer and dip it into the juice. Our wafers are gluten free and our table is also open to all who wish to receive. If you would like to receive communion today, walk forward down the center aisle to receive the bread, and then make your way to the right or left for the juice.

"God With Us In Waiting"

Devotional Guide by Ryan Snider

e are a people who don't know how to wait. Don't believe me? How many of you started rockin' around the Christmas tree as soon as the turkey was thrown into Tupperware? In a world of instant gratification, at least we still make the kids wait until Christmas to open their presents. Waiting is not instinctual; at best, it feels like a passive waste of time and at worst like a theft of control. To paraphrase Henri Nouwen: waiting is an awful desert between where we are and

where we want to go. Fittingly, the word patience comes from the Latin verb *patior*, which means 'to suffer'. When a Honda hits a Kia on I-285, you are rendered powerless, left with no choice but to wait while dinner at home is getting cold. In moments of grace, you realize that your delay pales in comparison to folks who may have their lives turned upside down. Waiting reminds us that we aren't fundamentally in control.

Nouwen writes that one of the only reasons we can endure the torment of waiting is because we have received a seed of promise. In the first pages of the Gospel stories, we are thrust into two stories of pregnancy—stories of waiting. However, Mary and Elizabeth can wait because they have received the promise: a child is coming. In that sense, "Our waiting is never a movement from nothing to something. It is always a movement from something to something more."

Advent creates a space in which we wait for that which we have already begun to receive, that which is already growing like a seed. Advent is a season of pregnancy for Christians. We're waddling around, heavy with a hope that is already kicking but not yet born. We decorate the baby's room. And redecorate it. Everyone tells us to savor the season—the anticipation, warmth, and wonder. But all we really want is to get the baby out. We're yearning and praying for this child to be born among us. The world is broken and we need a Savior—like, now. Yesterday would have been great. And yet, we must wait. However, God is with us in our waiting, shaping our imagination of how our world is about to change. We know God is going to change the world. The seed has been planted. We can see it here. We can hear it here. We can taste it here.

Questions for Reflection

- In what specific area of your life do you currently feel powerless or out of control?
- What is the "seed of a promise" that God has already planted in you, even if it's small or hidden? Take a moment to name it and give thanks for it.
- Mow can you name "God with us" in your waiting?



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
