And may we, as the people called Methodist, continue to live as free people—bearing witness to a grace that sets captives free, lifts the weary, and brings hope to all.

Mountain Sky Annual Conference 2025 CUMC Report

Beloved Belong Becoming

Mountain Sky Conference 2025 Christ United Methodist Church Lay Member to Annual Conference Report

The 2025 Annual Conference was held at St. Andrew's UMC in Highlands Ranch, June 11 – 14. Participating from CUMC were Reverend Leah Coleman, our pastor and Conference Secretary, Laurel Kubin, CUMC Lay Member to Annual Conference, and Sue Ptacek and Carma Zimmerman, Front Range District Equalization Members.

Prior to the opening session, Laurel, Sue and Carma participated in Mission Engagement plenary sessions on Creation Care, Disaster Preparedness, Accessibility as Belonging, and Volunteer Missions. In these sessions we learned about the opportunities, initiatives, and support available from the Mountain Sky Conference.

Bishop Kristin Stoneking gave the Episcopal Address during the Opening Plenary. She introduced guest speaker Israel Maestrado Painit, Resident Bishop of the Davao Episcopal Area in the Philippines, who invited us to step into a future made possible by regionalization, which is one of the four pieces of ratification legislation we voted on. We will not know the results of the votes until November when all the votes from throughout the world are tallied together.

The first worship service was also the memorial service. Rev. Sr. Valerie L. Jackson reminded us that God meets us where we are on this journey toward the beloved community, and while affirming our current reality, God calls us into the 'now then'. She called us to always be stepping into our future with God by our side.

Annual Conference is a time of learning and decision making. We learned of efforts of various initiatives such as Abundant Health, Mission Volunteers, and Sand Creek Commitments. We interacted with vendors/exhibitors including Church Mutual Insurance, Methodists Helping Methodists Foundation, various seminaries, and many aspects of the United Methodist Church. Offerings were taken to support North Littleton Promise, and the East Angola Ministries. Numerous short videos introduced us to our church camps, sponsors, and more.

We voted on several petitions that included closures of four churches, Resolutions condemning Genocide in Gaza and West Bank, and one regarding Missing and Murdered Indigenous Persons, and petitions for the establishment of a Queer: LGBTIA2S+ Matters Committee, and Asbury Korean UMC's Use of Building Sale Proceeds. All votes passed.

Laity met separate from clergy on Friday morning starting with a panel of youth members from whom we gained many insights. We divided into small groups to discuss our hopes and concerns for our family or community, and where we find belonging. The man I visited with told me he didn't feel like he belonged in the church he'd been attending for several years because he was never hugged, like others were being greeted. Hmm.

In the share-out follow up, one of the ideas I found most interesting was taking snacks and quarters to a laundromat to help pay for people's laundering while creating relationships with them. We were reminded that "When we're not helping out, we're missing out!"

Another church group goes to a pool hall to create Christian relationships, and yet another hosts a three day Senior Vacation Bible School.

On Friday afternoon, Rev. Lisa Greenwood began a presentation based on Isaiah 43:18-19a. She reminded us that the church rooted in the Wesleyan tradition is the rootstock and the grafts that are spliced in produce more fruit, create new varieties, and produce more hope, love and diversity. She asked "What is the Holy Spirit grafting into the existing church from which new things are possible?" She also discussed the importance of 1) Tending grief, 2) Discerning purpose, 3) Loving neighbor, and 4) Expanding imagination.

The closing session was followed by the Ordination Worship.

Thank you to Christ United Methodist Church for supporting our participation in the 2025 Annual Conference. These conferences are informative, inspirational, and filled with the Holy Spirit and we appreciate your prayers for us as we attend on your behalf.





NEW BOOK IN THE CUMC LIBRARY




