ICEBREAKER ACTIVITY

EXTREME CHARADES



Items Needed:

None



Instructions:

Have students take turns acting out different extreme sports. They should do this by playing Charades and not speaking. If they cannot come up with their own, give them help by whispering something to act out in their ear. Some extreme sport examples are sky diving, bungee jumping, skateboarding, dirt bike riding, white water rafting, and scuba diving.

Say, “Do you know what extreme sports are? Not basketball or track. Extreme means they are considered dangerous and exciting. We are going to play Charades by acting out extreme sports. I will pick one or two of you to act, while the rest of the group guesses which extreme sport you are doing.”

LESSON SETUP

Use one or both of these activities to prepare your students for the lesson.

Option 1: Group Game **The Extreme Cup Game**

Instructions:

Say, “We are going to play some extreme games with our Extreme series this month. First up, you need to know anatomy and have good eye-hand coordination. What I mean by that is our players will need to think quickly to know their body parts and have fast reflexes. I will choose eight players for our game. They will partner up and face off with a cup in between them. As I call out a body part, you must touch that part. For example, if I say ‘elbow’ then touch your elbows. I’ll quickly call out parts, and at some point, say ‘cup.’ At that point, whoever grabs the cup first is the winner. The four winners will then partner up and play each other until we have the final two contestants.”

You will need one cup for every two students. Call eight students up on the stage. Partner them up and have them face each other. Place a cup on the floor in between them. Call out body parts quickly. Then call out ‘cup!’ Whoever grabs the cup first is the winner.

Variations:

Have the contestants face off away from each other, so they can’t see each other and have to turn around to grab the cup, making it more difficult.

What’s the Point?

Say, “Our elbows, knees, ears, and toes, all make us human. Did you know Jesus was human, too? God sent Him to be a real person. He showed extreme humanity in the way that He lived on earth.”

LESSON SETUP

Option 2: Object Lesson

Items Needed:

Heart

Show students the heart.

What shape is this? It's a heart. Hearts remind us of Valentine's Day and love. A heart is also an organ in your body. There are lots of important body parts – lungs to help us breathe, stomachs digest food, and muscles to keep us strong.

The heart is vital because it pumps blood to the rest of our body. It's impossible to live without a heart. You may know someone who had a sick heart. Doctors had to fix it with medicine or surgery so it could keep beating.

Our hearts are necessary for life. We also like to say that we feel things with our hearts. Not literally...our heart doesn't touch things to see if they are hot or cold. Our hearts feel our emotions. Our hearts show the characteristics of who we really are.

Sometimes those emotions and character traits are pretty big. We might even say they are extreme. Do you think it's good to have extreme emotions in our hearts? This month, we are going to find out the answer by learning about both David and Jesus who had some extreme emotions and characteristics.



Bible Story Video:

Extreme Humanity

MESSAGE:

EXTREME HUMANITY

Main Point:

David was great. But he was also very human. Only Jesus is perfect.

Scripture:

1 Samuel 13:13-14; 2 Samuel 11; 1 Samuel 25; Romans 3:23-24

▶ Introduction

Are you extreme? What I mean by that is, are you extremely passionate about something? Think about extreme sports. These are the ones that not your average player participates in. Sky diving and scuba diving aren't for the faint of heart. They take human bravery that goes beyond what many people feel they possess.

Extreme sports may give you a thrill, but that's not the only thing that can be extreme. People can be extreme in the way they act or react. Some might call it intense. Extreme goes beyond normal and can put us out of our comfort zone. But extreme can be good.

▶ Transition

We are going to take a look at two extreme people from the Bible. One was David, the shepherd boy who became a king. He was extreme in how he told the truth, in how he worshiped and in how he praised God. But he was not without fault. Why? Because he was human, just like us. The other guy we are going to talk about is Jesus. He was extreme in all the same ways, yet He never sinned. His extreme humanity showed us His heart and paved our way for a relationship with God, and that's what this month is all about.

▶ 1 Samuel 13:14

"But now your kingdom will not endure; the LORD has sought out a man after his own heart and appointed him ruler of his people, because you have not kept the LORD's command."

These words were spoken to King Saul, and the promise was fulfilled. Samuel, the prophet, found David and anointed him as the next king of Israel. David was called a man after God's own heart, which was quite the compliment. But even with such high praise, David was far from perfect.

▶ 2 Samuel 11:1

In the spring, at the time when kings go off to war, David sent Joab out with the king's men and the whole Israelite army. They destroyed the Ammonites and besieged Rabbah. But David remained in Jerusalem.

When David became king, God was with him and the Israelites won many wars. Usually kings went into battle with their troops. But as it says here, David chose not to go out to war during this time. That led David into one mistake after another.

MESSAGE:

He saw a woman who was very beautiful. Her name was Bathsheba, and David wanted to have her as his wife. The problem was that she was already married. But David still decided to take her into his home. Then, he tried to get rid of her husband, Uriah.

▶ 2 Samuel 11:14-15

... David wrote a letter to Joab and sent it with Uriah. In it he wrote, "Put Uriah out in front where the fighting is fiercest. Then withdraw from him so he will be struck down and die."

David's crazy choice was to have Bathsheba's husband, Uriah, put in the front battle lines, ensuring he would get killed, so that nobody would find out what David had done.

There's a little saying that goes like this, "What a tangled web we weave, when first we practice to deceive." That means, one bad choice can snowball into lots of bad choices. This is exactly what happened in David's situation. David's sin created a lot of problems.

There was another time when David's extreme nature got the best of him. He encountered a man named Nabal, who was rude and disrespectful. Instead of turning the other cheek, David got extremely angry. He gathered his small army, and rushed into Nabal's town with the intention to destroy everyone and everything there.

▶ 1 Samuel 25:13

David said to his men, "Each of you strap on your sword!" So they did, and David strapped his on as well. About four hundred men went up with David, while two hundred stayed with the supplies.

Thankfully, David's destructive plans were changed when he met Nabal's wife, Abigail, and she was able to smooth things over with him. Otherwise, several innocent lives could have been lost due to David's extreme anger.

Now, don't get me wrong. David did a lot of good things. After all, he was a man after God's own heart. And every time that he realized he had messed up, he was sorrowful and admitted what he had done. He did his best to stay in tune with God and follow his ways. But try as he might, David did mess up. He wasn't perfect. And neither are we.

▶ Romans 3:23-24

for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and all are justified freely by his grace through the redemption that came by Christ Jesus.

MESSAGE:

Every single one of us messes up. We all fall short of perfection. But that's not how our story ends. Jesus was sent by God to give us grace and redeem us. We spent a lot of time talking about David. His extreme character led him to a truly passionate relationship with God. David was a good guy that we can look up to and take notes from – he pursued God despite his failures. But Jesus is the one and only example that is perfect; flawless; without fault. Jesus is perfectly human, and perfectly God. It's a hard thing to wrap our minds around, but it's an important thing to know.

Conclusion:

The example of David points to Jesus. In fact, Jesus came from the line of David; they share a family tree. They were both extreme. The difference is that Jesus was perfect. That's because He is God. We can read all about His life on earth in the New Testament, where He lived, who He associated with, and how He treated people. He did it all without sin. Now, that's extreme righteousness!

Jesus is our One and Only Extreme Example of what we should try to be like. We want to have an extreme love for God and for others. And when we don't meet expectations, we need to remember that God's grace covers our extreme imperfections. We just need to keep looking to Him as our example.

Hand Motions

Memory Verse Activity: Trade-Off

Make multiple sets of memory verse cards, with one word of the verse written on each card. You will need a full set of cards for each student. If you want to make less cards, you can make them with two or three words, but each set should be made the exact same way. Thoroughly mix up all of the cards and deal all of them out to the students.

Say, "When I say 'go' I want you to get up and start trading cards. If you have more than one of a card, trade away the duplicates to get something you don't have. Let's see who can trade to get all the words of our verse first. Ready...go!"

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WHAT WE LEARNED TODAY

In the Car:

Ask your child about their experiences at church:

Hanging out:

Make the lesson real:

When your child displays a failure in some area this week, use it as a teaching point about grace. Remember that God sent Jesus and it's through His grace that we are saved. We can show that same grace to our families.

At Dinner:

Here are some great discussion starters:

- What are some of the ways David's extreme humanity caused him to sin?
- How was David's connection to God about a relationship and not about his performance?
- How does God handle our failures? What does Jesus have to do with that?

At Bedtime: Ask your child if they can say this month's memory verse.
