A Note from Pastor Jeff

Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect. (1 Peter 3:15b)

I looked like a tubby green bean walking the two blocks in my Boy Scout uniform to the troop meeting on Tuesday nights at my elementary school. Clearly, I did not join the Boy Scouts because of the fashion. I mostly joined because my older brothers had all been in the Boy Scouts and had all achieved the rank of Eagle Scout. The other reason I joined was for the camping. Since I usually got home-sick when we went camping, I didn't stay in the Boy Scouts for very long.

A Scout is trustworthy, loyal, helpful, friendly, courteous, kind, obedient, cheerful, thrifty, brave, clean, and reverent. That is the Scout law. It reflected what I was learning in Sunday School and was taught at home.

Be Prepared. That is the Scout motto. "Prepared for what?" I asked my scout leader once. And like a Buddhist Master he replied, "That is the question, isn't it."

For a time, I thought that I should be prepared for any and every possibility, but I found I was getting paranoid. I finally came down on the idea that I should be prepared for the next thing on my calendar. That made a lot more sense, but it also left out the possibilities of other things coming my way: things that I did not plan for or expect.

I guess that you can really only be prepared for what you think might happen. The rest you have to improvise in union with God's Spirit.

The Apostle Peter encourages his readers to be prepared to give a reason for the hope you have in Jesus Christ when someone asks.

Hope is one of those things that can be easily lost – back then as it is these days. And a person who has hope in the midst of life's difficulties is a person who is in possession of something valuable; something that has escaped or eluded others.

Be prepared to give a reason for the hope you have; because when someone who needs hope sees that you have hope, they WILL ask.

This fall, the Leadership Board, along with some other folks in our congregation, want to help prepare us to give a reason for the hope we have and is sustained by living in community with one another at Fenton United Methodist Church.

This isn't about knowing the Bible, or the "four spiritual laws," or asking people to make a commitment to Jesus Christ. No one will ask you to wear a uniform – especially one that makes you look like a green bean, an eggplant, or any other vegetable. It is about sharing what you love about Fenton United Methodist Church and inviting people to join us in worship, or in another part of the life of the church. (continued on pg. 2)

The meetings won't take long, and I think that you will be uplifted just by attending one, even if you are never asked to share the hope you have in Jesus Christ. Though don't hold your breath – someone WILL ask you.

We are getting our traction again. New people are worshipping with us each week. People are finding God's presence, grace and love among us. People are starting to take notice of the many ways in which God is at work in us, through us and among us.

Let's be prepared to invite them to join us on the journey.

Stephen Ministry—Receptivity to Care

Most people are much more open to giving care than to receiving it. When giving care, we feel stable and secure. When receiving care, we can feel like we're acknowledging weakness, insecurity, and vulnerability.

As a result, there are countless people today who, though they really could benefit from a fellow Christian who would listen and care for them, instead they would rather tough it out on their own. They remain the strong silent type, or wear a smile across a face that is holding back a flood of tears. Society may encourage this by making you believe that asking for help is a sign of weakness.

But God did not create us to be independent. We were created to be interdependent. God's Word is clear on this. The New Testament includes more than 50 verses that contain the words "one another" - "love one another", "encourage one another", "build up one another", and "pray for one another". That means it's reciprocal; in addition to loving, encouraging, building up, and praying for others, we are to allow other people to do the same for us!

God does not intend for us to suffer alone. Jesus promises, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). We can receive this promised rest when we turn to one another for comfort and help.

That's why we have Stephen Ministers. Many of them have been on the receiving end of care in their lives. They know how difficult it is to ask for help, but they also know the great personal and spiritual growth and healing that follow. They know how to respond in a loving, caring, and nonjudgmental manner. They are equipped, ready, and waiting to provide the comfort and care God very much desires you to have.

Our September Board Meeting is Wednesday, the 3rd at 1:00 PM in the church conference room.



I want to share with you a terrific opportunity to experience the love and grace of God in powerful and meaningful ways, and to receive some helpful tools for faithfully following Jesus Christ. The Walk to Emmaus is a three-day experience of nurturing our soul, and our relationship with God through Jesus Christ. It is a highly-structured week-end event designed to strengthen and renew our faith, and through us to renew our families, our congregations and our communities.

Luke's gospel relates the story of two disciples who were traveling on the road between Jerusalem and Emmaus. As these two disciples together, they shared their heart's deepest troubles about the death of Jesus. An unknow person - Who was, in fact, the risen

Christ - joined them and explained the scriptures as they talked: how it was ordained that the Christ should suffer and so enter His glory. Toward the end of that journey, the disciples urged the stranger to eat supper with them. The climax of the story is when Jesus took bread and gave it to them; the two recognized that the stranger who had walked with them was the risen Christ. They rushed back to Jerusalem with the good news of Christ's resurrection. (Luke 24:13-35)

Here at Fenton UMC, we have dozens of people who have attended and found a re-energizing of their faith through the *Walk to Emmaus*. The next opportunities to attend a *Walk* are October 2-5 for men, and October 16-19 for women. The *Walks* will be at Plymouth First United Methodist Church. Cost for the week-end is about \$90, but we at Fenton UMC have funds available to cover the cost if it is an obstacle.

What is Kids Hope? A mentor from our church is matched up with a child who is considered at risk, for many different reasons. It builds caring relationships that can make a lasting impact on a child to know that someone cares enough to spend a half hour to one hour a week with just them. Every mentor/child team has a prayer partner.

Prayer is the backbone of Kids Hope!

Why do we need Kids Hope in our schools? Every child needs to know they are loved and valuable and that someone cares about them. The teachers and staff care and love their students, but there is not enough time in the day for them to spend extra, one on one time with those who need extra attention and help.

Fenton UMC/Tomek Eastern Elementary: Our church became a Kids Hope church in 2011 in partnership with TEE, under the direction of Judy Leek (Director) and Laurie Isenberg (school liaison/student-mentor match maker). The first year we had 25 students, 25 mentors and 25 prayer partners. We are beginning our 14th year with Tomek and look forward to another great year of building relationships with our students and the school staff. Laurie and teachers are already praying about the kids who will benefit from having a KIDS HOPE mentor.

Will you pray about becoming a KIDS HOPE MENTOR or a PRAYER PARTNER?


