A Note from Pastor Jeff

I like my doctor. I have been going to him for fifteen years. We have the kind of relationship where I call him by his first name. He knows me well. Together we are watching my weight, my cholesterol, and my blood pressure. All of these have serious implications for my overall health in general and my heart health in particular.

But, in the fifteen years that I have been going to my doctor, he has never checked on one of the most significant factors of my heart health – my relationship with my treasure; my money.

Jesus talked about the effects our treasures have on our heart — a lot. Jesus talked more about money than anything else except the kingdom of God. Eleven out of the thirty-nine parables Jesus told are about money. Jesus talked about money and treasure so often because He knows that they have an effect on our heart. Money can cause division and divorce. Treasure and the pursuit of money can consume us and take away everything that is really important. Those who have lost jobs, taken a severe pay

cut, or who have not had a pay raise in years will tell you that it is not just an economic issue – it is an emotional and spiritual issue as well.

Jesus taught that "Where our money is, there our heart will be as well." (Matthew 6:21) I used to believe that our treasure followed our hearts. But, I have come to believe that Jesus was right – our heart follows our treasure. In other words, the place where we spend (or invest) our money will become what we pay attention to most, and our heart will follow whether we want it to or not. When we put our treasure into anything, our heart will follow.

During the month of October, we will be taking a kind of spiritual echocardiogram to discover the health of our heart, and the relationship between our hearts and our treasures. At the end of the month, we will have the opportunity to commit our hearts through our treasures to God and to the mission of Fenton Unit-

ed Methodist Church. Along the way, we will be asking you to prayerfully reflect on some important heart/ treasure questions.

For now, let us be honest about the health of our heart when it comes to our treasures: it is the one factor your doctor doesn't have a test for – and your health insurance doesn't cover.

And, as always, I am proud to be... With you on the journey, Jeff Jaggers

FUMC's Annual Potato Dinner

Sunday, November 11 at 12:15 PM, Fellowship Hall


FUMC has been involved with *The Society of St. Andrew's Potato Project* for many years. First introduced by the late Bud "The Spud" Curtis, the Potato Dinner is an annual tribute to seeds planted long ago which continue to "...feed the hungry."

The Potato Project salvages truck-loads of potatoes and other produce donated by the agricultural community. Gleaned from fields by volunteers, the perfectly edible food is delivered to agencies that serve the poor, redirecting 45,000 pound truckloads to soup kitchens, food pantries, local churches, and other hunger agencies for distribution. Since this produce is donated, transportation and packaging of the food is done for the amazing low cost of 4 cents per pound.

Important to know is that "gleaning" is the traditional Biblical practice of gathering crops that would otherwise be left in the fields to rot or be plowed under after harvest. Because the food is unmarketable due to size, color and blemish, growers allow volunteer gleaners to pick what is left following harvest which directly addresses world hunger problems.

The Gleaning Network coordinates volunteers, growers, and distribution agencies to salvage food. Tens of thousands of volunteers from churches, synagogues, scout troops, senior citizen groups, and other organizations participate each year in gleaning - thousands of volunteers go gleaning, picking up over 15 million pounds of fresh, nutritious food. Clearly, a mission project well worth our church's support!



New Church Committee Formed

Last December a small team was formed under the direction of Pastors Jeff and Michelle. The purpose was to formulate an Emergency Response Plan for our church. This plan was to be comprehensive and encompass all manners of emergencies including weather, medical, fire, active shooter, menacing person, and others.

A plan was developed and it was approved by the Church Council last May. An Emergency Response Committee (ERC) is now being formed. This committee will be a standing committee and report to and be represented at Church Council. This committee will be responsible for the implementation of the Emergency Response Plan. It will consist of eight members. To facilitate the implementation, ERC will be working with various church committees as well as providing training to a select group known as the Emergency Response Team (ERT). ERT will support the efforts of the ERC in providing leadership during any emergency. All aspects of safety will be reviewed, e.g., first aid kit locations, communication between buildings, security protocols, shelter locations, etc. Building maps are updated and will replace the current evacuation and shelter drawings posted throughout our buildings. Plans are being made to conduct fire and severe weather drills. Training manuals are also being developed. The goal is to be able to quickly and correctly respond to any emergency and to have a core group of trained people able to provide leadership and assistance.

The initial Emergency Response Committee members are Sandy Williams (chairperson), Morgan Cherry, Melanie Hein, Allison Opferman, Kelley Readman, Ron West, Vicki West, and Mike Williams.

Evening Hosts (5:15-8:15 PM): 2 volunteers are needed to greet and spend time with the families upon arrival. You will also have dinner with our guests, and assist with making lunches for the next day.

Dinner Hosts Only (5:30-7:00 PM): 2 volunteers are needed to serve, clean-up and assist with dinner.

<u>Prepare a meal or part of a meal:</u> 4-6 volunteers are needed to prepare and bring in dinner. At times we may need a meal plan, due to dietary restrictions and to avoid duplicate meals.

Overnight Hosts (8:15 PM-7:00 AM): 2 volunteers (1 male/1 female or 2 females) are needed to spend the night in the FLC. You will oversee family needs and assist with breakfast & clean up).

<u>Set-up Team (Sunday 12:15 PM):</u> 4-6 volunteers are needed to unload beds from the trailer, take down tables & chairs, set-up bedrooms & dining area. Set-up takes less than an hour.

<u>Tear down Team (following Sunday 7:30 AM):</u> 4-6 volunteers to tear down the bedrooms, clean up rooms and setup for Sunday School, load beds into trailer. Takes about an hour or so.

<u>Children & Family Activities:</u> 2 volunteers to organize supplies and equipment for crafts, recreation activities, etc... and plan an activity for Friday night and Saturday during the day. This could be board games, movies, etc...

<u>Laundry:</u> Bedding & towels need to be laundered after the host week is over. Pick-up is Sunday after tear down, and please return clean bedding & towels by the following Sunday.

<u>Saturday Hosts:</u> 2 volunteers are needed at all times to spend a couple hours with the families during the day. It will be in two hour shifts starting at 9:00 AM and ending at 6:00 PM.
