Have you ever been riding along in the car and an uplifting song is playing on the radio? It really lifts your spirits, doesn't it? Maybe that's the thought behind Paul's admonishment to be, "...making melody to the Lord with your heart," (Ephesians 5:19). Maybe, God's call to "make a melody" is His desire for us to experience joy deep down within our hearts? That's easy to do on good days, but what about the bad ones? Athletes will praise the Lord when scoring the winning touchdown, but where is the praise when facing a debilitating loss? Am I any different? Is my heart filled with praise when the sun is shining, but empty of joy when the storm clouds of life are looming? Praise and worship should be a part of every day, no matter the circumstances. Yet, in my life that's not always true. There are days when my eyes are swimming in tears or when my teeth are grinding in rage, and praising the Lord is far from my heart. On those days, I am grateful to the hymn writers and artists who have provided a melody of praise which lifts me up and changes my attitude. They can drain the rage right out of my heart and fill it with the light and love of the Lord. Some days, I just need help praising the Lord!

God has blessed us with faithful hymn writers. Their words are meant to lift us up and put our focus on Jesus. They are an expression of love for God while being rich in theology; theology sung to aid us in worshipping Jesus in "spirit and truth" (John 4:23). Through their words we can sing of the magnificence of Jesus, praising Him for who He is and what He has done. Have you ever found yourself driving in your car while singing a song on the radio praising the Lord? Have you ever been cheered up or experienced a change of attitude, for the better, by a praise song playing on the radio? Hymns engage our emotions while instructing us on the truths of the Lord.

In Colossians 1:15-20, Paul bursts into song as he writes about the supremacy of Jesus. These five verses are written in poetic form and many scholars believe it is a known hymn sung in the church in Paul's day. This hymn is an exalted song praising the deity of Christ, and His creative and redemptive work. It's a reminder we don't worship a godly man who points us to God, but rather God Himself who is both the eternal (1:15) creator (1:16) and sustainer of all creation (1:17). And this same Almighty God has reconciled to Himself all things (1:20) through the "blood of His cross" (1:20). It's a song celebrating Jesus' work of reconciling you and me to Himself because of His love for us.

We sing of His power and our redemption (1:22). The joy of our salvation should bring a sweet melody to our hearts and a song to our lips. It's often easy to be distracted by our troubles or to take the joy of our salvation for granted, but each day we should take time to praise our exalted risen Lord, the creator of all creation, because of who He is and what He has done. Praise is the proper response to Jesus.

From The Elders:

Dear South Siders,

Can you believe it is August and that the kids will be going back to school in just a few short weeks? I don't know about you, but I am sure glad that I went to school when the starting date was after Labor Day!! While we are speaking of kids, please pray for our students and the others, as they return to school and as they return to the routine of a student's life.

The Solomon Foundation V. P. of Construction, Tom Vick came to visit and to take a look at the capital projects we have on our list. Everyone is aware of the need for new outside doors on the building, and that the entryway by the Fellowship Hall had to be closed from December 1, 2024 through April 1, 2025 due to the thick ice that blocks the sidewalk. In addition to the doors, our parking lot is not weathering well and needs to have the cracks sealed and the entire lot sealed and restriped; our chimney is in need of tuck-pointing, and several other parts of our 50-plus year old building need to be repaired or replaced. The General Board has outlined the major tasks and prioritized the list. Tom has also put the elders in touch with a local contractor who met with Kevin Groben, Dan Chapman, and Jeff Hayden to discuss the possible solutions to our door and sidewalk/ice issue. The estimated cost for replacement of the doors was \$150,000.00 and an estimated \$150,000.00 for the replacement and solution to the sidewalk/ice issue. The contractor is putting together an estimate on replacing the doors and the sidewalk with a eye on cost saving measures and creative repairs. We, and we are asking for everyone's help, are praying for solutions that will allow South Side to continue serving the communities of Northwest Indiana and Northeast Illinois.

It is time to begin thinking about the election of church leadership, with the Congregational meeting scheduled for September 28, 2025. Please prayerfully consider those members who would make good deacons, trustees, or elders.

Remember, it is 119 days until Thanksgiving, and it is 147 days until Christmas, so you have lots of time to shop for a turkey and Christmas gifts; especially since stores already have Halloween candy out for sale!!

September 7, 2025	Elders receive the list of member candidates from the Nominating Committee. Elders vet candidates and inform nominees of the office for which they have been nominated.		
September 14, 2025 September 17, 2025	Deacon Class - nominated Deacons must attend this class, or be removed from the nominated list. Candidates will review SSCC's Belief Statements, verify their support of these be- liefs, and the role of Deacons in the church. Nominated deacons must inform the Elders of their intent to accept the office nomination, or decline the nomination.		
September 21, 2025	Final candidate list is published to the congregation.		
September 23, 2025	Any Scriptural objection to any nominated candidate must be submitted to the Elders by 5:00 PM.		
September 28. 2025	Congregational Meeting following Worship Services – nominated officer candidates are either affirmed or not affirmed by the congregation members present at the meeting and casting an "yea" or a "nay" ballot for each candidate.


