from the Editor, Stan Bunch



The MOFWB Executive Committee met in January to devote time to prayer, discussion, and seeking God's guidance for several items, one of which is the upcoming MOFWB State Convention, June 5-7, 2023 in Springfield, MO.

These committed men of God were led to adopt a state convention theme of "Resolved." One thought kept coming up in the dialogue which is the need for pastors to be passionate, dedicated to the task, and resolved to fulfill the calling of God upon their life. The congregation will be faithful and zealous to the same degree as the pastor. The spiritual leader is the key to the spiritual vitality of the local congregation. A lethargic, apathetic, and unresolved pastor will result in a congregation with the same spiritual deficiencies. We are asking God to forgive us and correct us.

How is God going to correct us and restore our resolve as a State Association of churches? During the 2022 National Free Will Baptist Convention, delegates approved a "Resolution of Repentance" see page 8. The first call to repentance deals with pride, arrogance, and taking the glory that belongs only to God. "To God be (all) The Glory" is a hymn that should linger in our subconscious as we talk about attendance figures, buildings, baptisms, salvation decisions, and sermon responses. For ministers, it is tempting to become prideful when altar responses are happening or the ministry is flowing in a positive direction.

We are also admonished to repent of our failure to evangelize all peoples. We must repent of our failure or apathy in reaching the "misfits and down and outers" around us. A few years

ago in one of the MOFWB fall All Boards Meetings, we were discussing the need to reach those of other ethnicities or races who live among us. One pastor commented to another that "this topic isn't an issue with us in our church" and then left the meeting. Race issues may not be something that affects your congregation simply because you live in an area that is predominately white & conservative. You can however, rest assured that prejudice is an issue and sinful attitude among you. Would you pray and help your congregation repent of the failure to reach the unwed, divorced, cohabiting, or prison-record mothers around you? Has prejudice kept you from attempting to reach that guy with multiple tattoos who is an alcoholic or meth addict? What about the local lawyer or physician that has more money than anyone in the county, is arrogant, and thinks he comes from a shelf or two higher than everyone else? (oops, my prejudice just stuck its face out) May we pray and repent of unknowingly or willingly picking & choosing who we want to reach with the gospel and have attend our church.

We have been guilty of allowing matters of opinion and preference to divide us. Is rallying a group of folks who think like me to sway a vote at the local church or association meeting the mature and proper way to deal with a matter of opinion or preference? Have we been guilty of becoming divided, suspicious, and forfeiting precious fellowship over the songs we sing, days we worship and meet together, Bible translations, or body art and jewelry? Worse yet, have I added fuel to the fire of this division?

One of the first challenges we put forth to the MOFWB State Association was

that of setting aside specific times for fasting and prayer personally and as a congregation. We have tried to mention the challenge on a regular basis. I am calling on pastors, deacons, and church board members to lead the way in setting aside four days of fasting and prayer. Thursday, March 2; Thursday, June 1; Thursday, September 7; and Tuesday, November 7. The November date is a date adopted by the voting delegates of the 2022 NAFWB Convention.

I would ask you to read the Resolution of Repentance to your congregation and make copies available for them to read and contemplate in private.

The heart cry of the NAFWB and MOFWB Executive Committees and that of countless brothers and sisters among us is that this resolution and the following verses might reflect our heart's desire.

Psalm 139:23-24;
"Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts: And see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting."

Psalm 51:10:
"Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me."

A MISSION FIELD IS AT OUR DOORSTEP



How would you like to be an international missionary? Seem impossible? Nothing is impossible with God. How about being an international missionary and never leaving Missouri? Not possible? Not so fast, my friend.



There are nearly one million international students in the United States this year. Over 23,000 internationals are studying in Missouri. At the University of Missouri in Columbia alone, there are over 1,400 students from 110 countries. If you live near a college campus, the chances are reasonable; you have a mission field close by where no one else is working.

Mosaic Church, our church plant in Rolla, MO, has several internationals that attend regularly. If you were to attend a service at Mosaic, you would probably sit near someone from another country. Mosaic regularly has between 8-12 countries represented each week.


A sad fact is that 80% of international students will never be invited into an American home while they are living here. As visitors to the United States, many would gladly accept an invitation because they want to meet 'real' Americans. They are young, live in a new place, are open to new ideas, and are open to new experiences. All that translates into a mission field waiting to be worked.

Our Missouri Free Will Baptist Mission Board is partner-

ing with International Missions to put a missionary on the Mizzou campus. His name is Bradley Mercer. Bradley grew up in Virginia. He is a senior at Welch College. His goal is to be in Columbia by the fall semester of 2023. Bradley has an interest in being an International Missionary. He has the heart for it. He has worked in evangelism while he has been at Welch. He regularly has gone into downtown Nashville to witness to those he meets on the streets. Rev. Danny (Dan) Lynn Talbott of Lebanon, MO, age 79, passed away January 24, 2023 in his home.

Dan was born to Clarence Talbott and Sylvia January Talbott on May 20, 1943 in Guymon, OK. He spent the early years of his life in Oklahoma and Kansas before moving to Missouri when he was sixteen years old. His family lived in the Cedar Ridge community near Long Lane, Missouri. He graduated from Buffalo High School and married Sharon Mathews on August 12, 1962. Dan and Sharon eventually moved to Lebanon, Missouri.

First and foremost, Dan was a servant to the Lord. He was saved when he was 24 and later accepted the call to preach. He pastored churches in Missouri and Oklahoma including Dove Bible Church, New Home in Wright County, Lynn Street FWB, Liberty FWB, Kingsway FWB, Marshfield FWB, Calvary FWB and Unity FWB. National Association of Free Will Baptists Resolution of Repentance

WHEREAS God has graciously brought about the existence of the National Association of Free Will Baptists and used them for His glory, and

WHEREAS God alone is Worthy of all honor and glory and power; but we have pridefully sought to steal His glory by claiming ministry successes as our own, and have been complacent and callous toward our spiritual condition and others,

WHEREAS God has created all peoples in His image for His glory and called us to love them and reach them with the Gospel, regardless of race, ethnicity or socio-economic status, we have instead failed in our attitudes and actions, particularly by failing to evangelize and disciple all peoples in our communities.

WHEREAS God has called us to unify amid our diversity to accomplish His work in the world, we have instead divided over matters of opinion and preference, failing to focus on His priorities, and often displayed a critical spirit toward leadership and those not in our group, creating factions among us resulting in a state of crisis revealed by:

- the decline of nearly five hundred churches
- the decline of Sunday School enrollment by nearly 75,000
- the decline of ordained ministers by 1,100
- the decline of ordained deacons by 2,500
- and the staggering reduction in baptisms to an annual average of 1.6 per church, and

WHEREAS God's Word warns that failure to obey His precepts results in chastisement, weakness, and removal of His blessing, and

WHEREAS God has called His church to be a community of holiness and reconciliation, and because we have sorely neglected the practice of Biblical and redemptive church discipline and are in desperate need of godly sorrow and urgent repentance; Therefore, be it

RESOLVED that we as a denomination corporately acknowledge our sin before God and implore Him to forgive us as we repent of these sins, evidenced by changes in attitude and action. Be it further

RESOLVED that those of us who are redeemed by God's power and strong hand to individually call upon the Lord in fervent prayer and fasting, pleading for Him to hear our prayer and grant us as members and churches of the National Association of Free Will Baptists fruitfulness in obeying His Word. Be it finally

RESOLVED that we set aside the first Tuesday in November which commemorates the organization of The National Association of Free Will Baptists as a day of fasting and prayer as evidence of our resolve and repentance.

Be the Church that Embraces Children, Not Just Tolerates Them

There are two kinds of restaurants—those that embrace children and those that tolerate children. You know this reality if you're a parent, especially if you have multiple small children. When my family of six storms a restaurant, I can tell immediately whether the establishment will embrace my children or tolerate them

In a recent occurrence, the host looked at my brood with eyes wide: "Oh, my. You have . . . a lot of kids." I was not offended. Serving large families at a restaurant is tough. Odds are at least one of my kids will have a meltdown before the food arrives, and a one hundred percent probability exists that large portions of something will fall to the floor.

Rarely are we treated rudely, but I can tell which restaurants merely tolerate my children. I understand the tension. Feeding my kids is hard work. It's why we pay money to have someone else do it! My wife and I don't get angry; we just don't return to the places where my kids are a burden. When we discover a restaurant that embraces children, we go back.

There are two kinds of churches—those that embrace children and those that tolerate children. Most churches are not rude towards kids, and I've never seen a church sign stating "No Kids Allowed." However, the families visiting your church will know whether you embrace their kids or not. The churches that welcome children have a higher likelihood of families returning—not just once but often!

Embracing children means understanding that messy is healthy. Children do not learn to eat cleanly. They turn dining room tables into abstract impressionist works. More food ends up in the hair than in the mouth. You'll need a hazmat suit to serve spaghetti. Children learning to take in God's Word, worship, and love Jesus are just as messy. The dirt line on church walls about two feet high is there because little hands are dragging as kids walk the halls. Messy is healthy.

Embracing children means valuing noise over perfection. Children make noises in worship. Children make noises in classes. Children make noises in the parking lot. They cry. They laugh loud. They scream and yell. Some churches tolerate the noise. Other churches value the noise. I've heard of churches

not allowing children below a certain age in the worship service. It's ridiculous.

Embracing children means protection at all costs. Child security is a discipleship issue—and one of the most important! If you believe in the Great Commission, you will create robust security measures for children. Jesus says, "I am with you always." A low-security church teaches children, "I am with you sometimes."

Embracing children means consistent promotion in multiple venues. Check your worship guide. What is in there about children? Check your social media feeds, email newsletters, and worship service announcements. If kids are not there, then you are not embracing children.

Embracing children means investing in KidMin. Is your children's minister the lowest-paid ministry team member? Does your children's budget match your worship budget? A church that embraces children will invest in the ministries supporting children. A church that tolerates children will give the monetary leftovers to them. If it is easier to cut your children's budget than your technology budget, then you likely are not embracing children in your church.

Embracing children means understanding church at their level. A lot of churches will seek out the perspective of parents. You should! Helping parents create God-centered homes, not child-centered homes, is one of the core elements of family discipleship. However, you should not neglect the perspective of a child. Ask about their experiences, their feelings, and their opinions. When you understand church at a child's level, you are better positioned to guide the child towards Christ.

In Luke 18, Jesus invited the children. In Mark 10, Jesus embraced the children. Churches that welcome and embrace children are like Jesus. Jesus becomes angry at the disciples for discounting the value of children. The next time a child cries out in church, don't get angry at the child. Instead, get angry at the person who is angry at the child. Children are a blessing, so churches should make them a priority. Be the church that embraces children, not just tolerates them. *

"Daddy, can we talk?" Upon hearing this question parents may wonder, Is this a ploy to avoid bedtime? Or it could create concern that something awful might be revealed. But having faith conversations and heart-to-heart talks can be as normal as eating every day.

When questions like this are asked, how can parents maximize heart-to-heart talks? First, lay down your phone, make eye contact, and help your child feel as comfortable as possible as she shares the question that is on her mind. Here are a few tips as we raise and disciple D6 kids regarding heart-to-heart talks:

- **1. Have these talks often.** It is our desire as parents of younger children that they will feel comfortable talking with us now and in the future.
- **2. Don't be anxious.** Most of us have had conversations with family members, friends, and co-workers that take a wrong turn, bring negativity, or end up hurting the relationship. If conversations with your kids become normal, no matter the topic, expect the outcome to be good.
- 3. Constantly remind your child that they should come to you when they need to talk about issues of faith and life. One way to practice this is to talk to them about your faith, prayers, and spiritual growth.
- **4. Ask good questions throughout the week.** Deuteronomy 6 teaches us to impress God's Word on our children as they wake up, walk along the way, and go to sleep. Ask questions every now and then about the topics they are learning in church. It doesn't have to be trivia or an

oral exam. As you are driving down the road, you could say something like, "Hey, on Sunday at church we learned about the resurrection of Jesus. What do you think it was like for his friends to see Him again?" The free SPLINK resource (d6family.com/splink) is also a great tool with questions you can ask your kids each week.

- **5.** Give your child undivided attention. This can be difficult since we are very busy people, and many times their questions come at a time you didn't plan. Turn off anything electronic, close the door, look them in the eyes and listen. Try to give your child the same attention God gives you when you pray.
- **6. Finish well.** After you listen to your child, give an appropriate response. This can be a hug, a plan for next time, a prayer, a Bible verse, advice, a story from your childhood, discipline, bringing others into the conversation, and more. However you chose to end the conversation, your goal is to help, but more importantly, to set the stage for future conversations like this as they grow up. We want these heart connections to be strong. That way, when we do have conversations about painful topics, our hearts are connected. Both you and your child know that your mutual love can survive difficult times.
- **7. Keep it private.** To build trust for your child to have the confidence to ask difficult and potentially embarrassing questions, don't talk about this publicly. It should not be used as an illustration in a sermon or class. And it certainly should not be referenced in a humorous manner to friends or coworkers. It will break trust if your child hears that their private conversation with you has been shared with others.



D6 is a movement intentional about empowering parents, homes, marriages, leaders, and churches to live out the story of Deuteronomy 6. This Scripture paints a beautiful picture for the family and of God's heart for discipleship at home. The family is God's original small group. D6 provides resources to align the church and home to accomplish God's design of generational discipleship.
