53 Ways You Can Be

Better TOGETHER

in 2025-2026

In January 2024, the State Executive Committee decided to adopt “Better Together” as the theme of our 2025 State Association meeting. Since then, we have been working with our Planning Commission to make this theme the overarching ministry theme for all of our state ministry from the 2025 State Meeting until the 2026 State Meeting. We appreciate the positive feedback and input we have received.

We hope to provide Free Will Baptists across Missouri with helpful ideas to consider as we try to put this theme into practice. We want first to mention some biblical themes/emphases that we think connect to the idea of being “better together.” Second, we will provide 53 practical examples of how to be better together.

Themes Related to “Better Together”:

- Unity, Relationship,
- Ministry Partnership
- Church Membership
- Accountability
- Healthy denominationalism/associationalism
- Avoiding and resolving conflict
- The many “one anothers” passages in Scripture
- Friendship
- Trusting others
- Overcoming Loneliness
- Collaboration

Practical Examples for How to Be “Better Together”: (in no particular order):

1. Pray regularly for other churches, pastors, and state ministry boards/leaders.
2. Participate in your local association and/or encourage others who aren't to do so.
3. Encourage greater cooperation among ministries in your church where it doesn't currently exist.
4. If you're a pastor, start meeting regularly with another pastor whom you can encourage, pray with, or discuss a helpful book with.
5. If your church is in a strong financial position, consider helping another church to send a pastor to the minister's retreat, or pastor's wife to the ministers' wives' retreat. (Be sure you have already provided this blessing to your own pastor and his wife first!)
6. As your church is blessed financially, increase your contribution not only to COOP, but Show Me Missions.
7. Choose not to gossip about other church members, church leaders, or churches in your community.

8. Partner with another local church to host a July 4th celebration, New Year's Eve celebration, or some other civic/cultural event.

9. Partner with another local church to host a missions conference, youth rally, men's or women's rally, or some other strategic ministry event.

10. Donate excess ministry supplies to other churches, such as communion supplies, VBS materials, Bible studies, etc.

11. Partner with another church to plan a missions trip together. Two smaller youth groups would benefit, but a smaller group would also benefit from a larger group helping with the overhead.

12. Church leaders can encourage volunteers from an area of abundance to go and temporarily help out another church needing musical help, pulpit supply, etc.

13. Be willing to adjust a meeting/service time to accommodate another church's needs.

14. Multiple churches/pastors from one association can actively encourage and help resource a newly licensed or ordained man as he prepares and begins in ministry.

15. Churches can urge newcomers from other sister churches to pursue reconciliation with the other church before considering moving their membership.

16. Pastors can invite another pastor to attend a conference/seminar with them and help share the expenses.

17. Teach prospective church members in new member classes about the importance of fellowship with other believers and emphasize our obligations to them.

18. Churches within close proximity can consider combining resources and commitment by merging to form a stronger congregation.

19. Associations that are within the same region can consider merging to form a larger, potentially stronger association.

20. Associations within the same region can plan occasional joint meetings to encourage each other and learn from each other.

21. Organize a pastors' book discussion group in your area.

22. Plan a parenting/grandparenting seminar with another church in your area.

23. Provide a ministry internship to someone in your church, another area church, or a Christian college student.

WHY YOUR CHURCH NEEDS A WEBSITE

I used to love my daily newspaper. It was dropped off in my driveway every morning. I always spent a few minutes with the front page stuff, and then I would go straight to the sports section. I would catch up on the Cardinals, Tigers, Royals, Chiefs, Rams (yes, it was a while ago), etc. Then I would look over all the pages and read things of interest to me. I haven't looked at a newspaper in years. I don't want to spend the money, and I want to get news more quickly.

Now, when I first get up, I go to my laptop and I start looking online for my news (you have to be careful because there is a lot of fake stuff), sports, and weather. In fact, I now go to the internet for information on just about anything. If I want to find out about a restaurant, I check out their website, read their menu, and check their reviews. If I need a plumber or an electrician, I do the same. I find a lot of useful information in just a few clicks.

Where am I going with this? You and your church are trying to reach people in an online world. Almost everyone now uses Google, Instagram, X, etc., as their sources of information. If they are looking for a church, they will do the same. Ninety percent of the folks who are considering coming to your church will look for information about your church online. If they don't find you, they will not come. You may or may not like this, but this is our world. There may be many bad things online, but we can use the internet for good as well, for sharing the Gospel.

Long before they ever step through your front door, they have checked you out online. If they can't find you, they won't look further. Your front door is now your website. In fact, your website is now more for your prospective guests than it is for your members. Most churches have a Facebook page where most of their member news and information is shared.

Let me give you several reasons why your church needs a website...

1. A church needs a website to serve as a 24/7 online presence, enabling them to share information, connect with members and prospective visitors.
2. Websites help communicate within the congregation through announcements, newsletters, etc.

3. Churches can use their websites to offer spiritual resources such as sermons, devotionals, prayer requests, online giving, and volunteer opportunities.

4. A well-designed website can attract new visitors and members by promoting the church's mission, values, and community, making it easier for people to find and connect with the church.

5. Websites can be accessed by people who are sick, traveling, or homebound, allowing them to stay connected to their church family through features like live streaming and online resources.

6. A church website demonstrates that the church is modern, relevant, and engaged with the world around them. We should not be like the world, but we are in the world, and we have been called to reach the world. The only way to reach them is by meeting them where they are.

7. A church website is a place to share your beliefs, values, and mission with a larger audience. Whether through blog posts, podcasts, or videos of your sermons, you can extend your message to those beyond the physical boundaries of your church.

I am not a website expert, but I know people who can help you with this issue. Please contact me, and I will be glad to share more information. I just want to encourage you to build a website if your church does not already have one or to improve your website if you do. In the next issue of the GEM, I will share how to build a website.

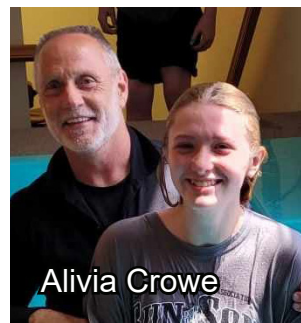

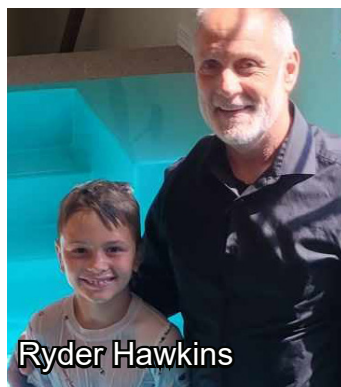

Naaman Dement and family led in Spirit filled worship with a special presentation by MOFWB CTS winners.

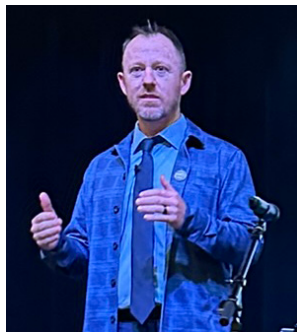

May God continue to be glorified in all we do as His servants.





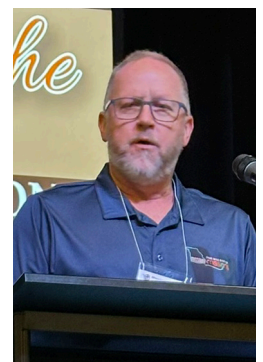

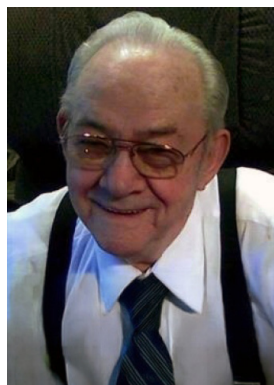

COMPLETE HONESTY

“Oh, what joy for those whose disobedience is forgiven, whose sin is put out of sight!

Yes, what joy for those whose record the Lord has cleared of guilt, whose lives are lived in complete honesty!” Psalms 32:1-2 (NLT)



Complete honesty, you have got to be kidding me. The thought of being completely honest is horrifying. If anyone knew what I had done, no one would want to be around me. At least that's what I tell myself and believe in this moment of secrecy. The psalmist says that when I am completely honest, I will find a life free of guilt, full of forgiveness and joy. But everything within me says, “That is crazy!” Complete honesty requires confession. If people know what I have done they will stop loving me, they will stop being my friend, and she will no longer want to be in a relationship with me. These are the lies that I tell myself. Charles Spurgeon once said, “It does not spoil your happiness to confess your sin. The unhappiness is in not making the confession.”

What is complete honesty? How do I confess?

The first step of complete honesty begins with me confessing some things to myself that are true. I must confess that my sin is my fault! Yes, others may have acted wrong towards me, hurt me, abandoned me, yet it is my reaction to their sin that I must own. Others may have planted seeds, that circumstances and events may have fertilized, but I am the one who allowed sin to grow. I need to tell myself this truth. It is painful, but it is true. When I see others as the fault of my sin, I am powerless to change my situation and to find victory. Therefore, the first step of complete honesty is confession of my sin, in all its ugliness, to myself. Now I am ready to take the next step towards a clean heart, forgiveness, and joy.

The second step of complete honesty is the confession of my sin to God. This confession is not because He needs to know something, for there is nothing He does not know. He knows all my sins before I do and before I am even honest with myself about them. Confession is the process of “agreeing with that which is true”. Throughout God's word

He states that He created humanity for holiness, purity, and to reflect His image. So, when I confess my sin to God I am agreeing with Him that my thoughts, motives and/or actions were unholy, impure, and contrary to His image. It is in that agreement that I can now walk truthfully with God (Amos 3:3). If I do not confess my sin to God, I will find myself walking in shame, guilt, and loneliness. Saint Augustine put it this way, “In failing to confess, Lord, I would only hide You from myself, not myself from You.” In my complete honesty with God I experience, through Jesus, a clean heart, forgiveness, joy, and the power of the Holy Spirit to take the third step of complete honesty.

The third step of complete honesty is the confession of my sin to those that God will use to help me make restitution where needed, seek reconciliation where appropriate, and to build and maintain a life that reflects His image. We are called to live in relationships and community (Hebrews 10:24-25), but sin separates and seeks to destroy relationships and community. When my sin has created separation within a relationship and/or my community, it is my responsibility to be completely honest about my sin with others so we may be reconciled (Galatians 6:1-10). Confessing my sin to a fellow follower of Jesus, who I trust, can bring about hope and healing to my relationships and within my community (James 5:16). My honesty with someone else who can pray with me, hold me accountable, and give me guidance; empowers me to live in healthy relationships and community.

Are you completely honest? What confessional step(s) do you need to take to develop honesty?

24. Participate in a disaster relief project for affected churches.
25. If your church doesn't have any campers, sponsor a camper from another church.
26. If you've never attended a district association or state association, go and take someone with you.
27. Volunteer to take a turn serving as an officer, board, or committee member in your district association.
28. Volunteer to be a sponsor or helper at Camp Niangua.
29. Provide a scholarship for someone or a couple to attend the Retiree Retreat.
30. Visit a church planter to learn more about their ministry and needs.
31. Intentionally attend a FWB church while on vacation and encourage them.
32. Include your church, missionaries, and/or the State Association in your final estate distribution plan.
33. Challenge your church and other churches to include the Missouri Mission Board or State Association in your Church By-law dissolution clause. If your church ever closes, this will keep Free Will Baptist assets at work doing Free Will Baptist ministry.
34. Tithe regularly to your local church and allow your children and/or grandchildren to physically put it in the offering plate or box.
35. Meet bi-weekly with another pastor, leader, or friend of the same gender to pray for local ministries, churches, schools, and community leaders.
36. Send an encouraging card or email to pastors in your area.
37. Communicate in a timely way with your district moderator and clerk to alert them of substantial changes in your church, or to submit your annual report.
38. Organize an event with other churches to honor and pray for teachers, police officers, emergency workers, and other community leaders.
39. Listen to the "Better Together Podcast" sponsored by the Free Will Baptist Executive Office and tell others about it.
40. Buy an extra copy of the most helpful and biblically based book you have read recently and give it to a new and/or growing believer.
41. If you are over 60 years of age, approach someone under 30 and offer to pray for them. If you are under 30, do the opposite.
42. Ask the Holy Spirit to remind you when you are being overly negative and critical in your attitude or comments toward other believers.
43. Accept correction, reproof, and rebuke as you want and think others should.
44. Be intentional to point out a positive trait in someone and encourage someone every time you attend worship or a meeting.
45. Tell the leaders of your church, association, and other ministries how much you appreciate their commitment and service.
46. Give an appreciation gift card to your Sunday School teacher, pastor's wife, pastor's children, or another person who has ministered to you.
47. After your pastor has served seven years in your local church, propose to the leadership that a sabbatical be given to him and his family.
48. Encourage your pastor to take his vacation time and be sure to utilize other preachers in the church as needed.
49. Sponsor an annual appreciation dinner for your association leaders, with the association paying the bill and gratuity.
50. A district association can cover a struggling church's annual dues for one year until the church stabilizes.
51. Memorize Ecclesiastes 4:9-12 and Romans 12:4-8, and read 1 Corinthians 12:14-27 daily for 30 days.
52. Confess any sinful spirit of independence and criticism and determine to be a productive, positive servant of God for the benefit and edification of Christ's body.
53. Always pray over your attitude, comments, and opinions prior to sharing them publicly.

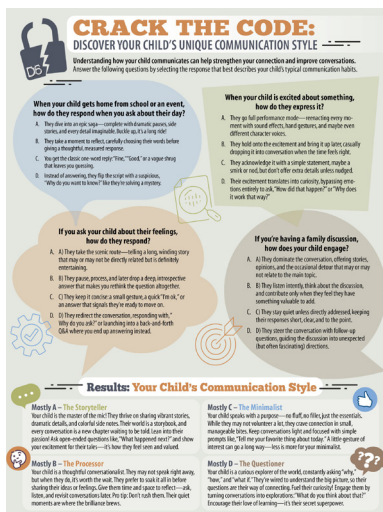
