from the Editor, Stan Bunch



A church in Kansas City, Kansas, closed. As is the normal process, the pastor (a FWB of convenience who 'promised' to teach nothing contrary to FWB doctrine) and leaders had ceased attending meetings of their association. As the pastor began to show his true doctrinal colors, any committed members of long standing began to attend elsewhere. Fast-forward a few years. Attendance drops to a handful who are mostly relatives of the pastor. The vote is taken to close the church, and eventually to sell the property. Where are the proceeds of the sale? Only those who signed the sale contract know. Neither the Kansas nor the Missouri FWB Associations received anything.

More frequently than I care to acknowledge, legal issues with church properties, cemeteries, and outright takeovers are something we attempt to deal with.

One angry member of a defunct FWB church in Missouri stated to me that they planned to sell the property and divide the proceeds among the remaining members. Such a move is not only unethical, demonstrating a heart of greed, but it also exposes those who accept the proceeds to illegalities for violating non-profit and IRS laws. Once enlightened regarding the illegality of their proposed scheme, they reneged on their intent.

Seventy years ago, a rural Missouri FWB church was doing well. Time passed, the church closed, and was eventually destroyed by fire. The

property was to be reverted to the FWB Association. There was no record of this in the State FWB Archives. Decades later, an adjoining landowner would like to take possession of the abandoned church property. A quit-claim deed is signed, the recipient makes a donation to missions and the transaction is made. An uninformed distant relative of the original owner becomes angry and upset because of the transaction.

These, and others, are actual events that we have dealt with as the MOFWB Executive Director, along with the MOFWB Missions Director. This ought not to happen and can be prevented.

Every congregation should incorporate with the Missouri Secretary of State and include in their incorporation documents a "Dissolution Clause." This clause clearly states what will happen with the property and proceeds of the church in the event of closure. By taking these steps, we're not necessarily thinking about what might happen three years from now. We're thinking about what could potentially take place when we are no longer here. We have good intentions and great leaders currently, but we have no assurance that this will be the case in 40 years. Wisdom from Proverbs teaches us to consider the future.

Another step is to include the dissolution clause in the church bylaws. The wording of a dissolution clause is something that a Christian law firm, such as the National Center for Life

and Liberty (NCLL.org), of which the MOFWB is a partner, can provide guidance on.

How can we work together in these situations? When we are approached to give guidance in these cases, most of the time we are working from a position of ignorance. That is, we do not have a copy of the church bylaws, nor the local association bylaws. Some churches do not have bylaws, are unincorporated, and do not know where their deed is located.

When the Central and Beacon FWB churches in the KC area closed to be reopened as the Esperanza and Church of Faith churches, the legal transactions were relatively seamless because both congregations had previously prepared dissolution clauses, and the MOFWB Executive Office and the Missouri Mission Board were aware of the documentation. These churches worked closely together with the state boards, and we were able to avoid large legal fees and paperwork.

How can we prepare ahead and work together? Review your bylaws and legal documents for a dissolution clause, keep them up to date, and properly archived. Please provide your local association and the MOFWB State Office with a copy of these documents as a matter of information.

Let's work together and avoid the situations mentioned at the beginning of this editorial. Let us help you, which will eventually help us. Contact us anytime we can be of service to you.

A Reason To Celebrate

The greatest basketball player of all time? Michael Jordan. The problem with my choices is that a lot of people will disagree with me. That's ok, you have the right to be wrong. Just kidding.

We may disagree on the greatest of all time in many different areas, but there is one we can all agree on: THE greatest missionary of all time...Jesus.

I love the Christmas Season. I love remembering how the Gospel Story began. I have fond memories as a kid of dressing up in my dad's bathrobe so I could be a shepherd or a wise man in the church's Christmas program. 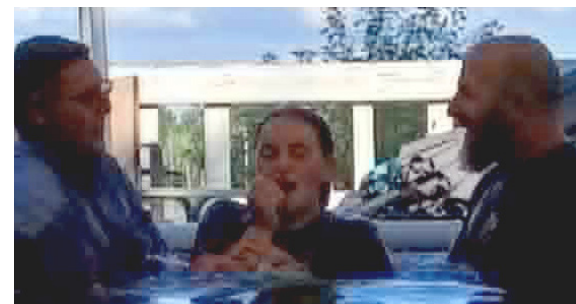

What is the thing you cannot stop talking about?

I am not a big talker. My wife and I talk about how some people have lots of words and others don't. I'm a "don't"... except when certain topics come up. *Farm animals and gardening. Strategic board games. Theology and the Church.*

When topics like these come up, I seem to do most of the talking. **Our passions fuel our sharing.** One of the basic principles of following Jesus is that we are to share Jesus with others. Jesus himself said: **"Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation."** (Mark 16:15). That's not just for pastors or people with lots of words; we are all supposed to be sharing Jesus. *Does anyone else find that hard?* I've tended to think if I'm nice enough, available enough, serve others enough; that someone will eventually ask me to share Jesus with them. It usually doesn't work that way. We say we believe that hell is real and the only answer to that being our eternal destination is a saving faith in the person of Jesus Christ. If that's true, we can't be content to just say of those far from God: *"Wow. That's terrible. I hope someone helps them."* **Improving our sharing starts with gaining the right passion.** The Apostle Paul was always a zealous person. When we first meet him in the

book of Acts, he is called Saul and he is a persecutor of those following Jesus. He was a rabid defender of the purity of the ancient Jewish way of life. His passionate pursuit led him to see the first Jesus followers as deviant enemies of that way of life. His passion for the Jewish way of life moved him to strong belief and action. But then resurrected Jesus met him on the road, stopped him in his tracks, challenged the focus of his zeal...and it changed everything. From that point forward, Paul's zeal turned to telling others about the Good News of Jesus, the Son of God, the Savior of the world! In his second letter to the Corinthians we find that Paul's passion is fueled by love. **"For the love of Christ compels us"** (2 Cor 5:14a). Paul was even willing to give up freedom so others might find the truth. The Gospel's irresistible effect is why Paul took risky mission trips, suffered prison stays, lived in constant conflict, loved the unlovable, and gave up his preferences. Paul says if Christ has saved you from your sins, you are now an ambassador to your neighborhood, workplace, school, club, gym, family. **Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us. We plead on Christ's behalf, "Be reconciled to God."** -- 2 Corinthians 5:16-20 (CSB)

Sharing the Gospel is motivated by love. When we come to know the great love of Christ; we will be compelled to share it with others. We won't be able to stop talking about it. ~Mark Elliott, CE Board Chairman

Forty Years at One Church: An Interview with Rick Dement

By any human measure, forty years is a long time. It's also a recurring number in Scripture. Moses spent forty years in the Pharaoh's palace, followed by forty years in Midian, then forty years leading the Israelites from Egypt toward Canaan. David's reign as king lasted around forty years, as did Solomon's. "Forty" persists in spiritual significance.

Several months ago, another notable forty-year period passed in Missouri: Rick Dement and his wife Jamie completed forty years of service at the First Free Will Baptist Church of O'Fallon ("O'Fallon First"), where Rick has been Senior Pastor since 1985. Rick has served in multiple leadership roles in the Mid-Rivers District Association, the Missouri State Association, and for many years served on the Richland Ave Financial Board. He and his wife have three children, and 10 grandchildren.

I asked Rick the following questions about his tenure with the aim of providing some wisdom and insight to those just beginning, near the end, or somewhere in-between.

Rick, let's start with a cliché of a question. If I had told 22-year-old Rick Dement that he would remain at one church for 40 years, what do you think that version of yourself would have said?

Impossible, overwhelming. I didn't know how I was going to make it through three months! I didn't even consider that I would be here 40 years.

Enough time has passed where we can publicly acknowledge that things were difficult when you first began your tenure. Can you share a little bit about some of the troubles the church were experiencing when you arrived?

In 1980, O'Fallon First lost a beloved pastor of 10 years in a plane crash. In 1982, the church split, which resulted in another church forming. In March of 1985 the church experienced another split.

When I became the Pastor in June 1985, the church was financially broke. Its spirit was broken. Its reputation was broken. Most of the leadership was gone and not many attenders were left.

How long did it take for things to "settle down" and for you to feel that the church had healed?

We started an almost instant turn-around in the church itself. Our attendance tripled in the first six months, but then for the next two years everything went downhill. After struggling for two years, we started a slow, consistent increase.

What was the most helpful advice that you received from someone during the first half of your ministry?

If people know you love them, they will appreciate what you say.

And when we feel tension with someone, our normal response is to pull away, but we should pull closer.

What aspect of pastoral ministry have you found most difficult: shepherding, teaching, or leading? How have you

tried to grow in that area?

Leading has been my biggest struggle, particularly when it came to direction. This has been a consistent challenge to the present. I'm trying to learn to lean on "big picture people" in our congregation to be better together.

What's one aspect of your ministry that you feel you could commend to others, regardless of their own ministry context?

The genuineness of our congregation. We are a down-to-earth group who are willing to admit our faults and our need of the Savior.

What's one area where you would approach your work differently? Why?

I would be more intentional about involving others in the process of leadership and ministry. Carrying a lot by yourself gets overwhelming and discouraging. It also makes others feel unappreciated.

What's something about your congregation that especially encourages you and makes you smile as you think back through the years?

Our people are pursuing the Word of GOD. Many are striving to read the Bible through. Some have done it for the first time in their life, even though they have been a believer for many years.

You have been very active in your local association and state association. How have these relationships/partnerships influenced your ministry? What have you found their value to be?

Without these relationships I probably would not be in ministry today.

During my most difficult times of ministry, it was the regular fellowship with other pastors that revealed I was not the only one

dealing with problems. Their fellowship provided me with direction and encouragement to move forward from my challenges.

National, state, & local meetings have and continue to inspire me in the LORD's work.

At 62, you're reasonably young to reach the 40-year mark.

I believe O'Fallon First has a bright future. We are beginning to discuss a transition plan with a goal of seeing the church continue to mature and be fruitful for years to come.

Support the Refresh Counseling Program

Long ago, Jesus said, "The laborer is worthy of his hire." We like to say, "The laborer is worthy of help." Jesus informed His followers that it was important to provide for those who ministered to them, and Paul reiterated that principle. As we consider our pastors, may we look for ways to support them in the often-stressful work they do. Though extremely rewarding, pastoring can be difficult, which has led to a national crisis in the number of men answering the call to the ministry. Free Will Baptists are not immune to this crisis.

One way we can support pastors is through the Refresh Counseling Program. Since the 2022 National Convention, the NAFWB has conducted more than 2,400 sessions with pastors, their wives, and in rare cases their children. In a recent survey of current participants from over 25 states, 100% indicated the program has been helpful, and 37% reported learning about the program from another pastor. Do you know the name of Santa Claus's wife? In Slavic folklore, her name is Snezhanka. The problem is that this is the same word that we use for Snow White from the fairytale. And while this seems to be merely a coincidence of translation, it has created a comical situation where in our city of Shumen we have a large statue of Santa Claus holding hands with the Disney version of Snow White!

This silly example shows the cultural and religious confusion surrounding Christmas in Bulgaria. While Bulgarians also celebrate Christmas on December 25th, for most people, the similarities begin and end there. While in Christian circles we do have a name for this holiday that literally means "Birth of Christ", most Bulgarians refer to Christmas as "Koleda", a name with likely pagan origins that has no connection with the coming of the Savior into the world.

This cultural confusion is made even greater in our region, where a significant portion of the population is Muslim. Under the guise of creating unity between nominal Christians and nominal Muslims, Christmas was transformed in a generic, meaningless holiday celebrating wintertime. As strange as it may seem, a large percentage of Muslim families in the city of Shumen put up Christmas trees alongside their Orthodox neighbors.

If you ever come to visit our family during the month of December, your first observation will probably be how serious people take Christmas. There are decorations all

throughout downtown Shumen, including a popular photo op with Santa Claus and his young bride Snow White! There is Christmas music playing in stores and almost every Bulgarian has memorized the words to Jingle Bells (in English!). Bulgarian families will almost certainly gather around the table, especially on Christmas Eve. On this evening, there are a variety of traditions (most of which are of pagan origin), but the most prominent is that on every dining room table there should be either 7, 9, or 11 dishes, all of which are meat-free. Through the years I have asked many English students and friends why this is, and no one has ever given me an answer other than, "That is just the way it is!"

In essence, Bulgaria is a country that loves Christmas, but has forgotten almost entirely why we celebrate it. And yet, the Christmas season gives us amazing opportunities to share the gospel with hundreds and hundreds of people every year. Our three churches partner with Operation Christmas Child and The Hanna Project, going to over a dozen villages and small towns around Shumen. In each place, we sing Christmas songs and play games and give out amazing gifts wrapped in shoeboxes. But most importantly, we introduce them to the Reason for the season. Not just about Bethlehem, but also about Calvary and the empty tomb. We tell them not only that Jesus was our best Christmas present, but also that He came to conquer death so that we could be saved by grace through faith.

That is the greatest gift!

Jumping for Joy!

Each year, Faith Chapel Free Will Baptist Church, West Plains, looks forward to packing shoeboxes for the Operation Christmas Child ministry of Samaritan's Purse. This ministry involves sending gift-filled shoeboxes to children around the world, along with opportunities to hear the Gospel of Jesus Christ through discipleship programs. The church starts early each year, collecting items and conducting fundraisers for the ministry, which culminates in packing the shoeboxes and preparing them for drop-off at collection centers in November. The church is on target to reach a goal of 300 shoeboxes this year.

As you might imagine, it takes a tremendous amount of time, effort, and money to coordinate and accomplish the packing and delivery of these shoeboxes. However, these presents may be the very first gifts and very first exposure to the gospel that these children have ever received! That makes it all worth it!

At Faith Chapel, one project that has become popular with those involved in this ministry has been the making of jump ropes out of old t-shirts to include in the shoeboxes. By simply following the pattern of cutting, stretching, braiding, and tying the pieces together, jump ropes can be made for children to enjoy. Many at Faith Chapel have joined in on the fun of creating the jump ropes. This year one lady in particular has taken the jump rope making to a whole new level. Church member Joyce Piper, alone, has made nearly 150 jump ropes so far this year! Considering each rope takes about an hour to create, that's a lot of time braiding and tying old t-shirt pieces! For Joyce, the past year has been a year for surgeries, as she has had hip replacement and two knee replacements. Recov-



ery has called for lots of "down time", so Joyce chose to make "lemonade out of lemons" (technically, jump ropes out of t-shirts) during this time.

At 81 years old, Joyce was unable to cut the t-shirts, but had lots of help from others, especially one of our teens, Kenadie Nordyke, who kept her supplied in pieces. With 3 t-shirts needed to make a single jump rope, Kenadie literally cut up hundreds of t-shirts for Joyce.

If your church is looking for a great ministry to support, try Operation Christmas Child! If you are looking for a fun little project, give the jump ropes a swing.

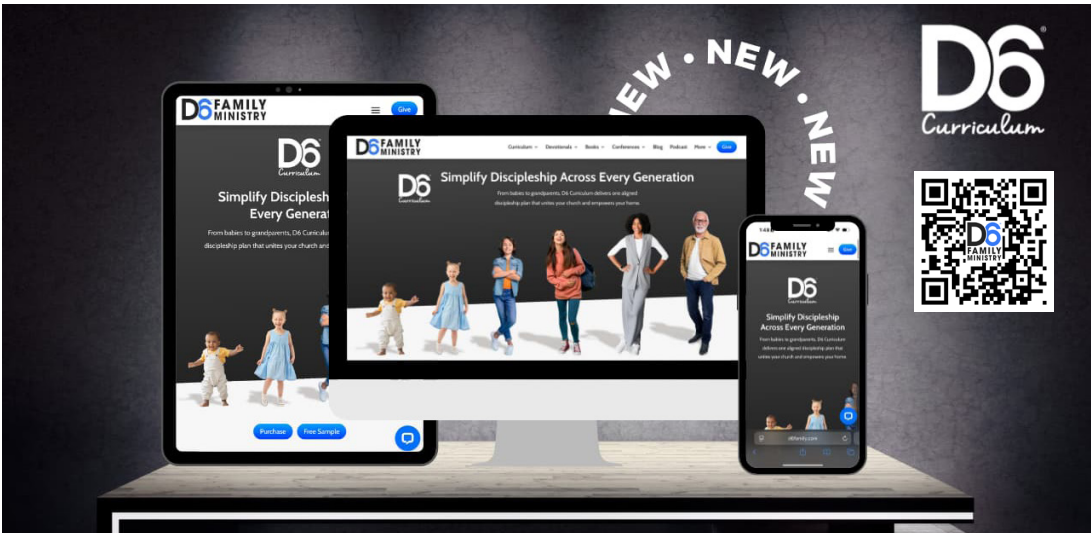
