# THREE BEGINNINGS

## Genesis 1; Job 38; Isaiah 14

### The Unfolding of Eternity Past

#### **Opening.**

It was English author {and believer} G.K. Chesterton who said, "I had always felt life first as a story; and if there is a story... there is a storyteller." Indeed there is— the supreme Storyteller, the King of all Creation. Christianity has lost its sense of the Larger Story. Life is like a movie we've arrived at 40 minutes late: we know something's going on, things are happening ...things good and grand or woeful and wicked, but we have no idea how to interpret them. This is a ploy of the Great Pretender, the Seducer of our souls. He is at work— constantly, feverishly— trying to steal, kill, and destroy our understanding of the Epic, the unfolding of History and the part we play in it. To separate us from both *our* hearts and the heart of God, and from the Larger Story our God is telling.

The recovery of our Story starts right here: with viewing life as a mythic reality, an Epic Adventure. And recognizing you are not alone, and never have been. You were made to walk with your King, to go to war with your Commander. The consummate challenge of the Christian Life is to live spiritually, powerfully, an intentional life of weight and worth in a world which refuses to believe this Life exists, a world which will *never* embrace what it cannot control. You are an outcast, my friend, an outcast from the *kosmos*. And you always will be. So, embrace this, relish your status as one of those leading a revolt against the originator of revolution, a rebel against the author of rebellion.

To look at life mythically is to understand the Story, to see something beyond the everyday soap opera. For this we must have eyes to see and ears to hear and a heart to know the Reality around us. We cannot live in the arrogance of unreality; we must live in the purpose of the present. And our hearts must connect to a single truth: **Christianity is a Love Affair in the midst of a life and death Battle.** Christianity tells us, once and for all, there is an Author to the Divine Drama, and that His heart toward us is infinitely good. And He has made us to live in an Epic Adventure – alongside Him, as allies of the Almighty. **Your life will never make sense until your heart embraces this truth.** 

One final thought to carry in your soul. **If your days are full of nothing but** *battle***, nothing but conflict, you'll miss out on the glory of the Gospel.** And we were created for great glory, for communion with the Fellowship of the Trinity. Because the Trinity is the mold, the Fellowship in which we were forged. Without it our hearts will yearn for a Day which will never come, a Sun which will never shine. For Christ is the Source of all Life, and it is *in* Him and *with* Him {in His-Story} that we must live.

#### The Three Beginnings.

There is a storyline to the great Cosmic Conflict which rages around us at this very moment; and we must learn to live in light of it.

In order to gain a proper grasp on this we have to go back to the time *before* the beginnings, into the far reaches of Eternity past.

#### Love Eternal.

Act I in the Epic Drama of history is *Love Eternal*. **The Story starts with God**. And God has no beginning, but a continuous existence, an Eternal Life  $\{ \leftrightarrow \}$ . In Eternity is God in three Persons {co-infinite, co-equal, and co-eternal} in perfect harmony, intimacy and communion with one another. In the trailer for the movie *The Fellowship* of the Ring the first words to appear on the screen are, "Fate has chosen him. Evil will hunt him. A fellowship will protect him." You hear this, believers? "*God* has chosen you. *Evil* will hunt you. A *Fellowship* will protect you." This *is* that Fellowship: Father, Son and Spirit in perfect relationship with one another. Moses wrote in Psalm 90:2, "**Before the mountains were born or You gave birth to the Earth and the world, from everlasting to everlasting You are God.**"

The question many have often asked is: Why would God even bother to create? Why not just skip it and save this entire mess? Was He lonely? No. Did He need someone else to love Him? No. The members of the Triune Godhead have an infinite and eternal love for one another; so this can't be it. God created simply to glorify Himself, for no other reason than this right there, to bring Himself honor by demonstrating the perfect unity of His essence: His sovereignty and eternity, His unconditional love, perfect justice and impeccable righteousness {which together comprise His 'holiness'} His omniscience {all-powerful} and omnipresence {ever-presentness}, and finally, His unchanging immutability and ultimate veracity {which together comprise His 'faithfulness'}. God never fails because it is impossible for Him to do so!

Out of the three beginnings to follow Act I, who or what came first?

#### Angels All Around.

Act II, Scene I involves the Angels. These are mighty creatures, powerful creatures with tremendous beauty, intellect, and ability. The glory they possess is a reflection of God's glory, their strength a picture of His strength, their authority a symbol of His might and majesty. They were on hand to witness the splendor of Creation: the second Beginning.

#### **Creation Comes to Be.**

Act II, Scene II gives us the Universe. In Genesis 1:1 Moses records the eyewitness account as inspired by the Spirit of God. It begins in the Hebrew with *bara bereshiyth Elohiym*: "In <u>a</u> beginning [really, the *second* Beginning] God created [*Bara* means = 'to create.' And He did so out of nothing, no pre-existent matter whatsoever. Theologians call this *fiat* Creation, that is, He *spoke* the Universe into being.] the Heavens [Ha'shamayim: all of stellar space and all the galaxies contained there] and the Earth [Ha-aretz]," i.e., the Universe.

"Then the LORD answered Job out of the storm. He said: 'Who is <u>this</u> that darkens My counsel with words without knowledge? Brace yourself like a man of war; I will question <u>you</u>, and you shall answer <u>Me</u>! Where were you when I laid the Earth's foundation? Tell Me, if you understand. Who marked off its dimensions? <u>Surely</u> you know! Who stretched a measuring line across it? On what were its footings set, or who laid its cornerstone while the Morning Stars sang together and <u>all</u> the <u>Angels</u> [NAS has, 'and all the Sons of God;' RSV has, 'all the heavenly Beings.' This is a unique phrase in the Hebrew — *beney ha elohiym*— used only five times in the Old Testament and always for divine beings, a special category of God's creative power, the mightiest of His Counsel {Gen. 6:2 and 4; Job 1:6; 2:1; and here}.] **shouted for joy?**," 38:1-7 {NIV}.

There are three key phrases in v. 7. The first is **"morning stars"— "when the morning stars sang together." "Morning Stars"** are a category of divine beings with the *power* and *authority* to rule, but without Lucifer's exalted position as the most glorious creature to ever come from the hand of Jesus Christ. Remember, the name 'Lucifer,' which we get from the Latin, means- *'light*-bearer;' it's translated in Isaiah 14:12, **"star of the morning,"** or **"morning star."** 

The second is **"Sons of God**," which is a technical phrase in the Hebrew; it's used only five times in the OT {Gen. 6:2 and 4; Job 1:6; 2:1; and 38:7}. *Beney Elohiym* is always used for angelic beings, never for mankind. Not once. Now, there are some similar phrases in the Old and New Testaments: **"Sons of God"** in the OT are divine or angelic beings; **"Sons of God"** in the New Testament are believers in the Age of Grace {Gal. 3:26}, the Family of Faith; **"Son of God"** in the NT is the Lord Jesus Christ. These are crucial distinctions to make.

The third thing here is "all"— "and <u>all</u> the Sons of God, <u>all</u> the heavenly Beings, shouted for joy." Interestingly, the NIV and TLB both have "and <u>all</u> the <u>angels</u> shouted for joy." But the key is this little word "all," from the Hebrew particle *kol*; *kol* signifies the whole of something, its entirety, its totality. It tells us we're talking about the Time before the Rebellion of certain Sons of God! Here's the point. The Universe was created as the domain of the heavenly Beings. It was in this perfect Universe that they ruled with the authority given them by God; it was in this perfect universe that they fulfilled whatever responsibilities God gave them.

#### **Betrayal and Rebellion.**

Act II, Scene III is an act of Betrayal and Rebellion. Somewhere in these un-named aeons of time Lucifer became disenchanted with the place and power and prominence he'd been given and decided upon a course which could lead only to destruction ...a *revolt*, a rebellion to overthrow the God of Heaven and Earth. One of two things happened in the heart of our enemy: [i] he became unwilling to rule a perfect primeval Earth as a subordinate of God, as a prince to his King {falling prey to his own beauty and intelligence}; or [ii] he decided that *this world* was not enough. **He wanted to rule it all, the entire Universe, and displace God in the process.** 

**I want you to note once and for all that sin was born in the heart of Satan.** Contrary to popular belief, misguided I might add, God is not the Author of sin. But this is precisely what Satan would love us to believe: it's *God*'s fault there's so much sin and suffering in this world. Suffering is a result of sin just like physical death is the result of spiritual death.

When Lucifer set his will in opposition to God's will, this was treason! *There* is the *origin* of sin. And it all started where? In the *heart*— the seat of Satan's understanding and freedom. Get this down. Mental sins are among the most evil because *everything* we say and do is a *result* of what we think. Hatred, arrogance, vindictiveness, self-righteousness, self-pity, bitterness, jealousy, rage and revenge: this is the root behind every evil thing man's ever done.

Isaiah recorded how he said within his heart, "I will ascend to Heaven [the dwelling place of the Almighty]. I will raise my throne above the Stars of God ['Stars of God' is a metaphor in both Testaments for the angelic realm. He's saying, 'I will rule the angels ... and take from God their worship, honor and praise.']. I will sit enthroned on the Mount of Assembly, on the utmost heights of the Sacred Mountain...." This last phrase is from tsaphon in Hebrew, their term for 'true North.' In nearly all ancient mythology the farthest point north was thought to be the abode of the gods, like Mt. Olympus for the Greeks, and Mt. Hermon for the Canaanite and Amorites. In the *Myth of Attar*, a Phoenician text from ancient Ugarit, Mt. Hermon is referred to as 'tsaphon,' where the palace and throne of Ba'al, the storm-god, are located, and where the seventy 'Sons of El' would meet in assembly. Isaiah's revelation shows us Satan / Lucifer / Ba'al's desire to rule the Earth. Another way we could state it is, his desire to rule the Divine "Assembly" of Yahweh, the "Sons / Stars of God"seventy of whom will ultimately be assigned to the nations in Deuteronomy 32:8-9from his own "Sacred Mountain," one other than Zion. My question concerns the possibility of a pre-historic revolt against Yahweh: Man hasn't even been created yet, so why this focus on the Earth? Was this Lucifer's realm to rule over initially? If not, then why the Earth?

Moving on he say's, **"I will <u>ascend</u> above the heights of the clouds** ['Clouds' are a picture of the presence and the glory of God. Remember the *Shekinah* of Israel, the wilderness, the Tabernacle and Temple? He seeks the honor and the glory which belong to God and God alone.]. I will <u>make myself</u> like [*Damah* means- '*be* like, *resemble*' in the Hithpael stem, which is intensive reflexive. I.e., 'I will make myself, by my own intellect and ingenuity, like:'] the Most High [*Elyon* is both a proper name for God and a title signifying 'Possessor of Heaven and Earth.']." Isaiah also give us the inevitable result of this creature's open contempt of his Creator: "But you are brought down to the Grave [*Sheol*], to the depths of the pit" {14:12-15}.

You see what's driving him? *This* is what he wants. He wants to possess as his own all of Heaven and Earth. I'll paraphrase it for you: "I will put myself on par with the Most High, equal to Him. And we'll have a showdown, one god to another, to see who rules forevermore." Only Satan forgot one little thing in the insanity of his arrogance:

there *is* a God, and he's not Him. The creature could no more defeat his Creator than a three-month old child could feed and clothe and house him or herself, then defeat you in hand to hand combat!

The very moment he chose to follow his own will, this attitude of arrogance, he fell. That's the nature and origin of sin. The moment he sought to influence others to his plan and purpose of opposition to God he brought the principle of evil into the Universe. That's the nature and origin of evil. **Evil is any plan, any purpose, or any system {like all religions} which seeks to accomplish its objectives either** *apart* **from Christ or in** *opposition* **to Christ!** So, after his trial is held and the sentence of "eternal fire …for the devil and his angels" is declared {Matt. 25:41}, with the Accuser given the opportunity to appeal, what does God do? He gives us Beginning number three.

#### Open War.

Act III is the time of Open War, when the Battle rages. **This is where we are now!** At War. Christianity is a Love Affair in the midst of a life and death Battle. The real reason most believers have never walked in the freedom Christ offers, never lived the Life Christ promised {Jn. 10:10}, is that they *won't* fight for it. Or even worse, they've been told *not* to. My sheep, hear me on this one. We reside in the very heart of a brutal Battle, at the centre of a vicious War against an enemy who knows his time is short—Revelation 12:12. **Open war is upon us, whether we would risk it or not.** 

The third Beginning comes in Act III: Angels, Universe, and Man. **G.A.U.M.** {the M being for Mankind}. Man was placed in the midst of this prehistoric contest with a similar soul, and the exact same freedom of choice and decision which Lucifer and his angels had in Eternity past. He is a lower creature in every way, shape and form, and the question is: 'What will he do with his God given freedom?' And on an even more personal plane, 'What will *you* do with your God-given volition, with your freedom to choose for Christ or against Him?' Cause with our freedom comes the greatest gift of all – the capacity to love. God enables us to love by giving us the most tremendous treasure in all of Creation— He puts a heart at the centre of our soul. Why? **Because love, not battle, is the point of this Story; as the Romans used to say,** *Amor Est Vitae Essentia:* 'Love is the Essence of Life.' And if you long for a world where love is real you must give each person the freedom to choose. True love can only be chosen; it cannot be coerced. And what about Act IV?

#### A Final Restoration.

Act IV is the Restoration Of All Things— A Perfect Place of Perfect Peace— Revelation 21-22. This is what's coming one Day, one day on the eve of Eternity. But not yet, not yet. For the moment, for the duration of Act III, we live in the 'now and the not yet.'

#### Finale.

There are five steps leading to either success or failure in the Conflict of Christ. We can illustrate them by the lives of Moses and Elijah, considered by ancient rabbis to be the two greatest prophets in the history of Israel. For Moses, by his seven decisions of faith and humility in Hebrews 11:23-29; and by Elijah when he set a single choice before the People of God saying, **"How long {will} you hesitate between two opinions? If the LORD is God, follow Him; but if Baal, follow him,"** 1 Kings 18:21b. In essence, he drew a line in the sand and said, "The Lord or Baal, who's it going to be?"

- I. **Attitude** {Jms. 4:6; 1 Pet. 5:5}. There are two basic attitudes in life: arrogance and humility. The former is self-centered; the latter is Jesus-centered. You and I will approach life from one of these two perspectives every day.
- II. Priorities. This is our scale of values, what's most important to us in life. They're either going to be temporal or eternal, but they won't be both. Jesus in Matthew 6:33 said, "But seek first <u>His</u> Kingdom and <u>His</u> righteousness," and everything else you need will be provided to you. The main thing in life is to keep the main thing the main thing! And the Main Thing is Jesus Christ.

Listen to the words of this ancient hero of faith. It was Joshua who set before the elders of Israel a crucial challenge in Joshua 24:15. He said, "If it is disagreeable in your sight to serve the LORD, choose for yourselves today [*this* day] whom you will serve: whether the gods which your fathers served which were beyond the River [Euphrates], or the gods of the <u>Amorites</u> in whose land you are living; but as for <u>me</u> and <u>my house</u> we will serve the LORD." Now this was a man in the eyes of the Lord ...a man of character, of conviction, of courage, a warrior among warriors, one of only *two* men in the OT who were said to have "followed the LORD fully:" Caleb the son of Jephunneh and Joshua the son of Nun.

**"Followed the Lord fully"** is a Hebrew phrase found only five times in Scripture, three of those in the Book of Joshua. Of these two men God said to Moses in Numbers 32:11-12, **"None of the men who came up from Egypt, from twenty years old and upward, shall see the land which I swore to Abraham, to Isaac and to Jacob; for they did not follow Me fully, except Caleb the son of Jephunneh the Kenizzite and Joshua the son of Nun...."** They did not stray from the Course of the Conflict; they exercised incredible endurance on the trail that leads from the Cross to the Crown.

III. **Decisions.** Our attitude determines our priorities; our priorities determine our decisions. Good or evil, the consequence of a decision we make will always be consistent with the decision itself! Call it the Universal Law, if you like {Gal. 6:7}. Those decisions can be spiritual or carnal, sacrificial or selfish; it's your choice.

E.E. Cummings wrote, "To be nobody but yourself {i.e., who God designed you to be,

who Christ created you to be}— in a world which is doing its best, night and day, to make you everybody else— means to fight the hardest battle which any human being can fight; and never stop fighting." {Parenthesis and additional comment mine}

- IV. Actions. The natural outcome of our decisions is our actions. The actions of our lives reveal the attitude of our hearts. We can boil action down to right or wrong. How's that for simplicity? Action, not always motivation, for only God knows all the circumstances that surround *why* we do what we do.
- V. Consequences. Remember this. To every action belongs a result; to every decision a consequence— Hosea 8:7b. Our actions bring either blessing or cursing for ourselves and those around us. No one is an isolated island, unrelated to the rest of the world. You cannot change cursing into blessing until you humble yourself in the presence of God. And that is *all* in the attitude.

With the stage set then, we see *Adam* and *Iyshah* in the Garden in Genesis 3. By the way, the Battle in the Garden is not between good and evil but between perfect Man and evil Being, between a state of *perfection* and a state of *deception*. On this issue the whole Conflict hinges: What will this perfect creature do when given the freedom to choose for or against the will of His Creator?

The Conflict raging in your life and mine still centers around this one crucial issue: **God or** *evil* ...**what's it going to be?** Every moment of every day our decisions determine our destiny. They demonstrate to the Universe which path we've chosen, and ultimately, what is of utmost importance to us in life. The fact is you're going to make decisions which are compatible with your priorities, with what is most important on your scale of values. And our priorities are determined by our attitude. Arrogance or humility, but the choice is up to you.
