Why Marriage is Good for People, Kids, and Society

 Marriage is a <u>forgotten secret</u> to most people today. 	clusive, sexual, and comprehensive union of lives, creating a new family unit, with mutual dedication and commitment to each other and to any children born from their sexual union.

	The only definition of marriage that is <u>not arbitrary</u> is that of one man and one woman—because only that combination is intrinsically linked to the public good of the procreation of children.
	 Because marriage is a God-given institution for all humanity, there are <u>"public" purposes</u> which are for the good of all society.
 Marriage was designed by God for the good of all mankind. (Genesis 1:26-28; 2:18-25; Matthew 19:4-6) 	Children: Marriage keeps mothers <u>and fathers</u> together so that children grow up with their mother and father together in a committed family.
Q. Is marriage a Christian institution or a human institution? A. It is a human institution, given by God. -It is not a human invention, but it is for all humanity.	Women: Marriage (and a strong marriage-culture in general) <u>protects</u> women from irresponsible or predatory men who would have sex with them without a permanent commitment to them or the children that might be conceived.

"...children raised in single-parent families are more than four times as likely to be poor than their peers raised in stably married homes."

Marriage decreases the chances that a child will live in poverty by 82%

In fatherless homes children are:

- 2 times more likely to be arrested for juvenile crimes.
- 2 times more likely to be treated for emotional and behavioral problems.
- 2 times more likely to be suspended or expelled from school.
- 33% more likely to drop out of school.
- 3 times more likely to end up in iail by age 30.

Compared to a married mother and father:

- Children living with an unmarried mother and a (unmarried) biological father are 4 times more likely to be sexually, physically or emotionally abused.
- Children living with their mother and her boyfriend are 11 times more likely to be sexually, physically, or emotionally abused.
- Children living with their mother and an unmarried male are also 3 to 6 times more likely to be physically, emotionally, or educationally neglected.

The effects of marriage breakdown on children continue into adulthood:

Compared to intact families, children raised by single parents are 50% more likely to suffer poverty as adults.

Compared to intact families, girls raised by single parents are 2 times more likely to have a child outside of marriage.
