

Above: An oak arborglyph, thought to be a Chumash rendering of a neophyte kneeling before a Spanish priest, dated to the early 1800s. Photographed in Tajiguas Canyon (former site of the Chumash village of taxiwa), northwest of Santa Barbara, 1974, it represents a haunting—a trace of the painful history and legacy of colonization.

The BKI is a space—though virtual this year due to the pandemic—for building capacity in, for and with the radical discipleship movement. We are people who strive to "see and follow the Way of Jesus."

We seek to curate a learning community that is ecumenical and interfaith, intergenerational and multicultural, and **intersectional** between seminary and sanctuary, streets and soil, *soma* and psyche. This year we again tackle, for a 3rd consecutive year, the personal and political challenges of "decolonizing discipleship." We will explore settler "response-abilities" to past and present Indigenous justice issues, and what this means for voluntary and involuntary immigrant communities of color. Our speakers and a diverse array of musicians and artists will empower all of us to deepen our commitment to, and capacity for, restorative solidarity.
