What's going on this February?

ASH WEDNESDAY—FEBRUARY 26

Ash Wednesday, the day that begins the season of Lent—a time for reflection, repentance, and a refocusing on the cross—is February 26. The imposition of ashes will be available in the sanctuary from 7:00 a.m.—10:00 a.m. and from 4:30 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. If, as well as having ashes imposed, you would like to attend a short worship service to lead you into the process of reflection/repentance/refocusing, plan to be in the sanctuary at 12:00 noon or 6:00 p.m.

While Ash Wednesday and Lent do not arrive until the end of the month, it's not too early to think of how we will observe the season. Lent is often known as a time of giving something up in order to make room in our lives for spiritual pursuits. Rather than just "giving up" in Lent this season, the scriptures ask us to consider all that Jesus is "up to" and all that he asks us to be "up to" in his name. What pursuits are we "up to" in our lives that call us to be our best selves, and our best selves as the church? Our first sermon, on February 23, to begin the Lenten season will be "Store up" — Matthew 6:1-6. Our Jubilation! choir will provide special music and skits.

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FOCUS ON FAITH

Dear Friends,

We move into the church season of Lent on February 26, Ash Wednesday. Lent is certainly significant as it draws us closer to Jerusalem where Jesus confronts the powers and principalities of this world; it's meaningful as we are compelled toward Holy Week with its heart-rending drama of farewell, Last Supper, and crucifixion. It's one of my favorite seasons – not because I'm maudlin or morose, but because it makes me mull over many things. Lent is, for me, a spiritual comma, a space to both breathe

and then move forward.

One thing that I do during Lent is to consider how my faith has changed or grown. We are not static believers – we are life-long learners, journeying forward in faithfulness. The theological term is "sanctification" – becoming more Christ-like as we live, learn, and serve. Certainly it isn't a straight line; sometimes our path takes us a step back before we again move forward. Yet we are always called

CHURCH SCHOOL LENTEN CHALLENGE—WALK HIS WAYS!

Each year, our Church School learns about Lent and Holy Week from their classroom lessons. This year we will challenge each student to travel in a 40-day walk with Jesus. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday (February 26) and ends on Easter Sunday (April 12). It's a 40-day journey (not counting Sundays!) to focus on God and prepare to remember and celebrate Jesus' sacrifice on the cross to save each of us and his rising from the tomb to give us eternal life.


PRAYER CHAIN

to grow in wisdom and grace.

So how has my faith changed? What do I believe now that I didn't ten years ago? I know that I'm less sure of God's mind. I used to be more willing to declare what God meant or how God worked. But as I'm less sure of God's modus operandi, I'm more sure of God's overarching love. I'm grateful for *The Story* and how the biblical history reminds me that though the day-by-day and year-by-year can be challenging, God is yet at work. I don't know how God will make all things right, but I'm convicted that it will become so.

I'm also more aware than ever of the deep wounded-ness that people carry, and I am more dependent on prayer. I've also become more attuned to how scripture is radically inclusive. Though many might seem to use the words of the Bible to exclude people who are gay, or to limit the gifts of women, or to think that an immigrant is a "less than" – I see how wide the circle of grace is drawn and how it is not up to us to decide who is in or out of acceptability; rather, our job is to love one another. And love is love is love. God loves people. No labels—except that we are all sinners saved by grace.

May this be for you as well a time to reflect and consider, "how has my faith changed and deepened?" Following Christ is certainly an adventure!

events where parents and children can connect with other members of the community. We are historically a cooperative nursery school with parents assisting in the classroom. We continue to encourage parent helpers but recognize that there is an increase in employment of both parents and a decrease in the availability of extended family to "baby-sit" siblings. Teacher assistants are therefore employed by the school and are scheduled in a classroom as a helper to stand in lieu of a parent. The cost is included in the "non-cooperative" nursery school tuition. For the younger child (starting at about 2-1/2 years old), we offer a half-day Playgroup program which is an introduction to a nurturing, yet structured, environment without the parent. For the 3- to 5-year-old child, we offer a traditional half-day preschool program, and a full-day program for the 4/5-year-old. We offer a transitional kindergarten program for 4- to 5-year-olds whose families feel they will benefit from one more year of our small-class environment before entering the public school system, those who are a "young five" with birthdays from June through November, and those who don't meet the age requirement for kindergarten enrollment in their districts.
