Karl Barth wrote, "What other time or season can or will the Church ever have but that of Advent?" Our Christian life is a long practice in waiting—waiting for God to meet us, to grow us, to save us. And, ultimately, waiting for Jesus to set all things right.

Doris and I have been emersed in the Netflix series "Call the Midwife". It has been a truly emotionally educational drama for me as a male. With its twelve seasons and multiple episodes I have been invited into the emotional and physical process of pregnancy and child birth. I have witnessed the deep mystery of birth and the struggles of those giving birth into families and communities with so much hope and disappointment.

It may have prepared me for Advent and Christmas as a profoundly human experience of the presence of God in our world, As Tish Harrison notes;

"Pregnancy is another apt metaphor for Advent. The growth of a child in the womb always involves waiting. When a woman is pregnant, she dwells in a daily mystery. She embodies both anticipation and surrender. Her body is an active part of gestation, of course. Yet ask any woman who's been pregnant and she'll tell you that, in many ways, she was just along for the ride. There is something larger than us that we simply participate in—something that calls all the shots. There's wonder beyond what we can name, measure, predict, or control.

Carrying this beloved child was a process of waiting, not knowing what would come. And we as a church were waiting together for the one to whom we prayed, the one who came as an infant, whose work continues in the world even now. We were waiting with the whole church,

In all that time of waiting for labor, a child was being formed, quietly growing within me. And in our times of waiting, as individuals and as a church, what might God be growing?"

Advent is not merely a collection of themes, scriptures, practices, and prayers but a daily immersion in mystery, a lesson in grace learned through how we rub against time. It asks us to accept the ache of being in suspense and incomplete.

Yet Advent—and the waiting it represents—is not an end in itself. The whole point of this season is to prepare for the feasts ahead—the celebration of Christmas, the joy of God surprising us in the present, and the hushed awe when every knee finally bows before the coming king.

Someday all of our Advents will end. The wait will be over. The Lord will come. Yet all of our waiting—our struggles and sorrows, our doubts and fears, our days and weeks—will be a vital part of the story. It will be part of the "hallelujah" that echoes from a creation that once groaned.


It will be part of the restoration of all things. It will be part of what is being born. Until then we live each minute of our lives between Jesus' first advent in the nativity and his final advent. Until then we dwell in liminality, in the meantime. As we both enjoy and endure this meantime, with all its beauty and suffering, with its bright sadness,

Advent, like so many other spiritual practices, is merely a tool. It is meant to teach us how to live in hope and to trust and love the object of our hope. It is merely a tool, but it is one that has proven useful across many generations and many lives. May it prove useful in ours as well. Blessed Advent to you. And remember: our king is coming.


