SERVING OUR RISEN KING

This year, April begins with a bang! I don't mean the weather (though maybe), or the Pirates baseball season (doubtfully), or fireworks celebrating tranquility in political life (come on, seriously?). No, this month begins with the "bang" of Holy Week, one of the most important times of the year. In addition to our Sunday Easter worship services, we will also gather for Maundy Thursday (with communion) and our Good Friday worship. We will be celebrating, remembering and praising the events leading up to and including the death and resurrection of our Lord, Savior, and King, Jesus Christ.

As we spend this time in worship, we will hear over and over of our Lord's ministry and service to His people how at His last supper Jesus served His disciples; on the cross He ministered to our greatest need; resurrected, He shares that grace with us. This week will be dominated by an emphasis on the service Jesus gave to His people—a service Christians both benefit from and seek to follow in their own lives.

This past year we have stressed

"Worship + 2" at Hebron as our focus in making disciples—

- through our worship: Loving the Lord together
- through +1 our nurture: Learning the Word of God together
- through +2 our service: Serving our King together

Service in God's Kingdom is a natural responsibility to our citizenship there. Our Savior-King has ministered and served us, and so we also minister and serve Him. As we do so, not only do we please our Lord, not only do we assist others to know Him more, but we also grow ourselves—ministering to others impacts our own lives in tremendous ways. Anyone who has given to others in grace knows of the transformative influence that has on our own walk with Christ.

So, our idea here is that every disciple would continue to grow as a disciple in part through our outreach to others. As we minister, so we grow. Part of our work here at Hebron is to ensure that

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- June, mentoring, teaching, loving on the kids.

STEWARDS OF THE GOSPEL

...guard the deposit entrusted to you... (1 Timothy 6:20; 2 Timothy 1:14)

Lent is a good time to consider Paul's charge to maintain the purity of true doctrine and avoid godless ideas.

While some consider what to "give up" for Lent, the essence of the Gospel is what we "receive." To paraphrase Paul, what the Father planned, the Son purchased and the Spirit preserves (Ephesians 1:3-14). The Gospel calls us to "turn from darkness to light and from the power of Satan to God" (Acts 26:18). "Repent and believe" is an invitation to an entirely different Kingdom with entirely different values and under an entirely different authority. No longer do we need to languish in guilt and shame, but joyfully embrace our redemption and new life in Christ Jesus.

Paul's concern was false teachers leading Christians astray with claims of superior "knowledge" and people being more interested in listening to what suits their deceitful hearts. Hello 2023! Hedonism abounds and distorts the Gospel by mocking God's created order, the Lordship of Christ Jesus and the power of the Spirit to bring our lives in line with holiness.

Paul's prescription was "preach the Word" (2 Timothy 4:2). The great Puritan Matthew Henry stated, "The Christian doctrine is a trust committed to us...It is committed to us to be preserved pure and entire,

and to be transmitted to those who shall come after us, and we must keep it, and not contribute anything to the corrupting of its purity, the weakening of its power, or the diminishing of its perfection." You can't sever orthodoxy from ethics.

The Gospel rests on what God has accomplished for us. After all, is that not why Good Friday is good?

One way in which Hebron is serving the global Church of Christ is by sending the Knapps in late May to the Central African Republic to teach, encourage, and spend time with Wycliffe missionaries in a spiritual retreat setting. Obviously, this will require a lot of prayer support from the congregation, so please keep us in mind. More information will be coming from the Mission and Outreach Team in the weeks ahead. **During Sunday school**, since we have come back in 2023, we have been learning about the Life of Jesus and so far we have covered:

Session 1: Jesus was born–Why it was important that He came the way that He did

Session 2: Jesus was dedicated-He was set apart so that all of the rest might be done

Session 3: Jesus was baptized–He was affirmed as being God the Son

Session 4: Jesus was tempted–He experienced what it was like to be like us

Session 5: Jesus called His disciples-He called people who were unlikely

We will continue to focus on the life and ministry of Jesus throughout the spring as well.

During Youth Group we have spent time learning and working through the following:

A 4-week series about resilience – what it takes to follow God when times get tough.

Series Bottom Line: How hope changes everything - placing our hope in Jesus

WEEK 1: Resilience helps us never give up – Examples from the life of Paul WEEK 2: Never give up on God – In this world there will be trouble, but God has overcome the world WEEK 3: Never give up on others – Walking their lives of faith with others WEEK 4: Never give up on you – Even when you fall, God is there

Students spent time sharing with one another about the challenges they face and committed to supporting one another when hard times come.

And

A 3-week series about prayer

Series Bottom Line: The right way to pray - How Jesus taught us to pray

WEEK 1: Prayer connects you to God – His promise is that He is near to us WEEK 2: Prayer isn't about the words you say, but the way you pray – Not big fluffy prayers, but real ones that come from a humble place.

WEEK 3: Ash Wednesday - The Experience: 6 Different Prayer exercises that help us connect with God

Students spent time sharing with one another about the difficulties they encounter when they try to pray and looked inwards as they did the prayer exercises on Ash Wednesday.



- Jesus Restores Peter—John 21:1-19

> Bottom Line: Put others first by making things right.

Emily Shrader is one of the mission workers we support here at Hebron. She works for and through a mission agency known as Serge. She and her husband, Dave, who is now a chaplain in the USAF have been with Serge for a number of years. Previously they served in 2 different North African countries where they shared the Gospel of Jesus Christ with people in those cultures. They also mentored other Christians to help prepare them to go into the mission field. After Dave felt a calling to come back to the States to train to be a chaplain, Emily chose to continue working for Serge but in a slightly different capacity.

Emily now recruits and mentors people who God is calling to go into the mission field. She has recently traveled to Germany and The Czech Republic to meet with and mentor a woman who will serve in The Czech Republic. Emily also participated in "Sonship Weekend" training and renewal seminar while in Germany. She is also mentoring a couple who is planning to serve in the medical mission field in Southeast Asia, and there are several others with whom she is currently meeting.

Emily also helped to lead a "Gospel Centered Life" weekend conference here in the Pittsburgh area just last month. Emily is the daughter of Tim and Shirley DeBeau, who attend Hebron. She and Dave have 3 children and currently reside in North Carolina.
