Born in Italy, **Pietro Yon** (1886-1943) came to the U.S. at age 21 after serving as assistant organist at St. Peter's in the Vatican. He went on to be the organist and director of music of St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York and a famed teacher and composer. He was a consultant for both the St. Patrick's and for Carnegie Hall when they were seeking new organs. Among his pupils was Cole Porter, as well as many noted organists and classical composers.

Originally written in Italian in 1917, Gesu Bambino was brilliantly adapted into English by Frederick H. Martens. Its melody has an ethereal quality that transcends time and place. Its chorus, a harmonious blend of melody and lyrics, draws inspiration from the classic carol "Adeste Fideles" (O Come All Ye Faithful), weaving a tapestry of musical heritage and tradition. This fusion of melodies creates a piece that is both familiar and fresh, evoking a sense of time-honored tradition while offering a unique auditory experience. Music historian Salvatore Basile notes that the song achieved "the near-impossible feat of surviving in the standard holiday repertoire, with important performances, innumerable recordings, and every kind of vocal and instrumental arrangement."

In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, "Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you." But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. The angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David. GENEROSITY MOMENT

The doubled lines in each stanza of this reflection on Christ's birth and death echo his saying (Luke 19:40) that creation will praise him if people are silent. Reverend Dr. Paul Hooker writes about this carol below:

I love it because of its central image, "and every stone shall cry." The stanzas are vignettes from the Christ story, woven together in a single narrative by the image of the stones in the central two lines. The image is repeated verbatim, but each time it functions differently. In the first, the stones share the joy of creation—the "stars shall bend their voices"—at the news of Christ's birth. In the second, they form the silent roadway ("heavy, dull, and dumb") on which Christ rides into Jerusalem at the beginning of Holy Week. In the third, they weep for the tragedy of the crucifixion and in their stoniness reflect "hearts made hard by sin." Then, in the final stanza, they shout in triumphant "praises of the child / by whose descent among us the worlds are reconciled." Indeed, the stones—pieces of the bedrock of creation—serve as the common denominator between "the worlds" of God and humankind. Echoing the first stanza, once again "the stars shall bend their voices," bringing the story to a sort of mythic completion.

But I think I love this hymn most because it resolutely refuses to remain "A Christmas Hymn." In the image of the crying stones, Wilbur forces us out of the soft glow of the stable-lamps of the nativity and into the footlight-glare of the drama of human sin. The stones—the very ones that, in Luke, Jesus declares would "cry out" if the Palm Sunday crowds fell silent—draw us like a magnet through the Christ-story—indeed, through the whole story of creation and redemption—insisting that we cannot understand the meaning of the beginning of the story until we have seen it through to its end. That, it seems to me, is the real message of Advent.

A stable lamp is lighted whose glow shall wake the sky; The stars shall bend their voices and every stone shall cry. And every stone shall cry and straw like gold shall shine; A barn shall harbor heaven, a stall become a shrine.


This child through David's city shall ride in triumph by; The palm shall strew its branches and every stone shall cry; And every stone shall cry, though heavy, dull, and dumb, And lie within the roadway to pave his kingdom come.

God's blood upon the spearhead, God's love refused again.



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GOING DEEPER

December 1st to December 6th Scripture Reading(s) for the week: Luke 1:26-38; Matthew 1:18ff; Isaiah 3:1-41a

I recently had an adventure with my father-in-law. His driver's license was near its expiration and he needed to get it renewed. By the way, my father-in-law is 9I years old. He does not drive anymore partly because he can't escape their residence without one of us. Still the state renewed his license. I wonder why it is that we feel powerless to say "no." The state did not tell him "no." His daughters did not tell him "no" either (as if any of them could anyway.) Sometimes we feel powerless to say "no" to others. We may even feel that way about ourselves. But "no" isn't the only answer we can give to circumstances. There are some circumstances we should say "yes" to but maybe we don't.

I think about Mary and her surprise visit with one of God's angels. I can imagine that she was shocked first by the angel's presence and second by the announcement. Mary, a young virgin, had found favor with God and she would become the bearer of God's son. She is told how this would happen and even what name she would give the boy. I can also imagine some of the objections Mary might have felt or thought, but didn't say. "Excuse me . . . how can this be?" "Are you sure? I'm a virgin!" or "How, since I am a virgin?" She could have made excuses for why she should say "no" to God's emissary. But she didn't. Maybe instead, she reflected upon the history of her people and how God had opened the womb of women who longed for a child. Sarai, Rachel, Hannah, and even her cousin, Elizabeth. All things were possible with God, even pregnancy by the Holy Spirit. And so Mary had a different reply "Here I am, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." Actually, if I were to boil this down to a sixword memoir for her, I think her summation would be "All I could say was 'yes!"

As a community of faith, we say "yes" to a lot of opportunities to serve. We are invested in two distinct and powerful ministries for people who are marginalized. There are dedicated people who diligently serve these missional ministries, but it seems to be consistently the same people. One area of growth for us as a church is inviting others to join us and to expand the depth of involvement across a larger swath of the church. It is part of every disciple's journey, serving others.

Jesus has some powerful words of command and warning in the gospels. On one occasion he tells his disciples that they are the ones to feed the hungry crowd. On another occasion he told them that the ones welcomed into God's kingdom will be the ones who served Jesus. They did this when they fed, clothed, gave drink to, visited when sick and in prison, the least of Jesus' brothers and sisters. In other words, our welcome into the kingdom is tied to how we serve Jesus by serving those who are distressed and in need today. As we listen more intently to God's call maybe we will realize like Mary that "all we could say was 'yes!"

GOING DEEPER

I invite you to take time and read each of the scriptures above followed by reflection on the questions below. Discern how God is calling you and how you can say "yes." Lastly, I pray that God bless the reading of God's Word and the meditations of your heart.

Questions to Consider this week:

- Monday: Who was the last stranger you helped?
- Tuesday: What did you do for the stranger who was in need?
- Wednesday: How did helping the stranger make you feel?
- Thursday: How is God calling you to serve on a routine basis?
- **Friday:** Who is God calling you to serve next?
- **Saturday:** Do you know how St. John's is serving the least and lost of Kansas City? If not, will you go on a journey to find out?

Actions for the Week:

- **Head:** Consider your understanding of what it means to say "yes" to God.
- **Heart:** Search your heart and soul to see if God is tugging and nudging you to deeper and more meaningful service.
- **Hand:** Find a particular ministry or project that aligns with serving the least in our community and volunteer to help this week.

Prayer: Merciful Lord, your story reminds us of how you choose to use ordinary people to do extraordinary things. Abraham, Moses, Solomon, Elijah, and more dominate the story of faith. But it also includes Sarah, Ruth, Esther, and more – women who also served as your instruments. Of all these, the angel said to Mary, "you are highly favored" and she was chosen by you to bear your Son, Jesus. I imagine she might have wanted to say "no" but she didn't. She said "yes;" all she could say was "yes." In the ways in which you are calling each of us to serve the hurting world, we ask that your Spirit empower us to say "yes" because it is literally all that we can say. Use us each day to be your ministers of grace and healing. We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.
