# PARENT'S GUIDE: MINISTRY TRANSITIONS



Transitions can be difficult for all of us. This is especially true when we feel like we are losing something or losing someone. Moving, changing schools, starting a new job, grieving a death, and saying "see you later" to friends, family, and mentors are difficult.

When a pastor/minister transitions to a new place of ministry it can be difficult for those who have been impacted by their life and teaching. This guide is intended to help you, as a parental figure in a child's life, lead your child through a ministry transition.

## THE STORY STICK TO THE FACTS

Whenever there is a transition in ministry, it is important that you stick with the facts. It's really easy to make up your own story or interpretation of events. But what is most helpful is to simply speak about what you know to be true. As you help your child learn about the upcoming departure of a minister share with them what you know are facts.

## ASKING QUESTIONS TALK AND LISTEN TO YOUR KIDS

Ask your kids how they feel. Listen to them as they share their emotions. Pray with them about their questions.
