WELCOME TO THE PARTY

Dear Leaders,

Thank you so much for your willingness to lead a "Welcome To The Party" Small Group! We are excited to see how this series can help us all to see generosity as a joy and as a way to extend God's party invitation to those around us. Along the way God will use this to transform those practicing generosity!

As you know, "Welcome to the Party" is Lancaster Vineyard's Fall 2020 campaign. It actually is comprised of a sermon series broken into two major parts. The first three weeks, "Welcome to the Party," celebrates how God created the world for us to enjoy. Unfortunately, we've spoiled the party with sin, but even so He still invites us to enjoy the party He created. At the end of September, we begin a series of sermons and small group discussions around the idea of how God uses our generosity and stewardship (our time, talents and treasures) to actually extend His party to those around us! You, as a leader, have the opportunity to help those in your Small Group apply these practices to their lives – as you guide them and, most importantly, as you set the example by doing the exercises and the homework yourself. That will make all the difference!

Here are a few helpful thoughts for you to consider as you lead your Small Group.

IN GENERAL:

- Be sure to catch the Sunday sermon each week Each week's Small Group material is meant to work in conjunction with the previous Sunday's sermon. If you (or anyone in your Group) missed it, the podcast is typically available by Sunday afternoon and the video available by Tuesday.
- Review the week before Take some time to talk about the exercises and homework from the previous week. How did it go? Where did people win? Where did they struggle? Remember lead from example. Share how you're doing with all of these things as well!
- Help everyone think "big picture" These ideas shouldn't be processed in a vacuum. Help everyone to see how they all relate, work together and build off of each other.
- Try to get most people to participate There is usually someone that wants to "over talk." Ask
 questions like: "Is there anyone else that would like to add something?" "What do you think
 about what they said?" And don't be afraid to ask those who haven't talked a simple question
 like: "What stood out to you in this discussion?"
- Strongly leverage your time/space together as a Group Be sure to incorporate the other elements of a typical Small Group (worship, ministry time, social time, etc.) because those are the real reasons people are really coming to your Group. They can get the content; leverage the social/community time together.

- If having a Zoom small group, then pull the video up on your screen, click on Share Screen in Zoom, pick the window with the video on it, make sure "Share audio" is picked, hit share and then play the video.
- · It would be best to have your host test these options before group night.

OVERVIEW OF THE CURRICULUM

- · There are seven components included in each week's notes:
 - Key Concept theme of the week
 - Watch link to that week's video joinparty.lancastervineyard.org
 - **Read** key verse(s) for that week
 - Notes from the video exactly what it sounds like...with blanks to fill in
 - Consider a few paragraphs that complement the theme
 - Apply great questions for them to process on their own and for you to use for your discussion time together
 - This Week one key thing (related to that week's topic) for them to do over the course of the upcoming week
- Don't feel like you have to cover every aspect of the curriculum at every meeting.
 But, do be sure to watch the video, process it a bit and encourage everyone to do the "This Week" homework.
- We suggest taking time each week to discuss how everyone did with the previous week's "This Week" homework. In general, the homework will either be a reflection (holding aspects of their life in front of God for Him to inspect) or a practical (tracking expenses, doing a budget, etc.). Don't forget, you're not only leading, but also setting an example for how to process and practice each week's assignment.
- We encourage you to have your group watch the videos on their own and process the information before coming to your meeting. Then, together, watch the video again and give everyone a chance to respond to what they have been processing.

GREAT QUESTIONS TO ASK DURING YOUR MEETING

- In addition to the application questions included in each week's material, here are some great general questions you can use to stimulate conversation and discussion.
- · How was this for you?
- · What did you learn about yourself this week?
- In the application questions, you were asked ______. Let's each share our answers out loud together.
- In what ways are we sharing similar thoughts/responses? In what ways are we sharing different thoughts/responses?
- Did you find last week's assigned homework difficult or easy? Why/why not?
- · What is one take-away for you from this week's discussion?
- As you consider the things we've discussed today, how can we be praying for you?
 How can we pray for you now?

Consider this:

Scripture tells us that God delegated to us authority over all his creation (Genesis 1:28). "You made humanity ruler over the works of your hands; you put everything under his feet: all flocks and herds and the beasts of the field" (Psalms 8:6-7). God expects us to use all the resources he gives us to best carry out our responsibilities. A steward's primary goal is to be found faithful by his master as the steward uses the master's resources to accomplish the tasks delegated to him (1 Corinthians 4:2).

Stewardship isn't a subcategory of the Christian life. Stewardship is the Christian life. After all, what is stewardship except that God has entrusted to us life, time, talents, money, possessions, family and his grace? In each case, He evaluates how we regard what He has entrusted to us - and what we do with it.

"Honor the Lord with your wealth, with the firstfruits of all your crops" (Proverbs 3:9). Three times a year the children of Israel were to bring an offering of firstfruits before the Lord. God said, "No one is to appear before me empty handed." (Exodus 23:15). The firstfruits offering included the first production of a vineyard (Leviticus 19:23-25) and the first annual production of grain, wine, olive oil and sheared wool (Exodus 23:16; 34:22; Deuteronomy 18:4)...a significant portion of the firstfruits went to the religious leaders and their ministry (Numbers 18:12).

The giving of firstfruits made an important statement: "We give of our first and our best to you Lord because we recognize all good things come from you. In doing so, we recognize our responsibility to sustain the spiritual leadership provided for us."

Tithe denoted the amount of the offering, firstfruits the nature of the offering. In Israel, tangible goods were the natural things to tithe. The same principle applied to money. The first ten percent of God's provision was returned to the Lord. God was regarded as the provider of the harvest. The firstfruits offering reminded people of God's ownership. They saw God as the source of all life and blessing. Parents hoped that their children, by witnessing this regular, systematic giving of wealth to the Lord, would grow up understanding their infinite debt to God, and their need to continuously honor Him by their worshipful giving.

The firstfruits offering also said, "We trust you, God, to help us harvest the rest"

Application:

- 1. How does the practice of giving firstfruits develop our relationship with God? What does the practice of firstfruits communicate about our relationship with God?
- 2. Tithes (like the one described in Deuteronomy 14:22-23) were used not only to fund ministry, but also to throw a party (sometimes seven day long parties!). How does knowing God used people's generosity to throw a party affect your view of generosity? How should this affect how churches use tithes?
- 3. What is the biggest hurdle for you to give firstfruits, to tithe or to give beyond the tithe?

- 1. Start your day by committing to put God first with your time, talent and treasure each day.
- 2. End your day with a time of examen before God. Ask Him to reveal to you anytime throughout the day you did not make Him first.
- 3. In terms of treasure, put God first by making your giving a Priority (firstfruits), a Percentage (tithing 10% or donating a percentage) and Progressive (working towards a tithe or giving beyond a tithe).
- 4. Look for an opportunity to use your generosity to "throw a party" for someone this week. Ideas to spur your creativity: Invite someone over for dinner and make it special; Take snacks or a gift to a coworker or classmate; Surprise a neighbor with a party in a box (cookies, gift card, favorite beverage, etc.).

You take out what you did not put in and reap what you did not sow.' 22 "His master replied, 'I will judge you by your own words, you wicked servant! You knew, did you, that I am a hard man, taking out what I did not put in, and reaping what I did not sow? 23 Why then didn't you put my money on deposit, so that when I came back, I could have collected it with interest?' 24 "Then he said to those standing by, 'Take his mina away from him and give it to the one who has ten minas.' 25 "'Sir,' they said, 'he already has ten!' 26 "He replied, 'I tell you that to everyone who has, more will be given, but as for the one who has nothing, even what they have will be taken away. 27 But those enemies of mine who did not want me to be king over them—bring them here and kill them in front of me.'"

You are a steward of what God has given and you will be rewarded based on how you manage His resources.

One of Jesus' most significant parables regarding work is set in the context of investments (Matt. 25:14-30). A rich man delegates the management of his wealth to his servants, much as investors in today's markets do. He gives five talents (a large unit of money)[1] to the first servant, two talents to the second, and one talent to the third. Two of the servants earn 100 percent returns by trading with the funds, but the third servant hides the money in the ground and earns nothing. The rich man returns, rewards the two who made money, but severely punishes the servant who did nothing.

The meaning of the parable extends far beyond financial investments. God has given each person a wide variety of gifts and he expects us to employ those gifts in his service. It is not acceptable merely to put those gifts on a closet shelf and ignore them. Like the three servants, we do not have gifts of the same degree. The return God expects of us is commensurate with the gifts we have been given. The servant who received one talent was not condemned for failing to reach the five-talent goal; he was condemned because he did nothing with what he was given. The gifts we receive from God include skills, abilities, family connections, social positions, education, experiences and more. The point of the parable is that we are to use whatever we have been given for God's purposes. The severe consequences to the unproductive servant, far beyond anything triggered by mere business mediocrity, tell us that we are to invest our lives, not waste them.

Yet the particular talent invested in the parable is money, on the order of a million U.S. dollars in today's world. In modern English, this fact is obscured because the word talent has come to refer mainly to skills or abilities. But this parable concerns money. It depicts investing, not hoarding, as a godly thing to do if it accomplishes godly purposes in a godly manner. In the end, the master praises the two trustworthy servants with the words, "Well done, good and trustworthy slave!" (Matthew 25:23). In these words, we see that the master cares about the results ("well done"), the methods ("good"), and the motivation ("trustworthy").

More pointedly for the workplace, it commends putting capital at risk in pursuit of earning a return. Sometimes Christians speak as if growth, productivity and return on investments were unholy to God. But, this parable overturns that notion. We should invest our skills and abilities, but also our wealth and the resources made available to us at work, all for the affairs of God's kingdom. This includes the production of needed goods and services. The volunteer who teaches Sunday school is fulfilling this parable. So are the entrepreneur who starts a new business and gives jobs to others, the health service administrator who initiates an AIDS-awareness campaign and the machine operator who develops a process innovation.

God does not endow people with identical or necessarily equal gifts. If you do as well as you can with the gifts given to you by God, you will hear his "Well done." Not only the gifts, but also the people have equal worth. At the same time, the parable ends with the talent taken from the third servant being given to the one with ten talents. Equal worth does not necessarily mean equal compensation. Some positions require more skill or ability and thus are compensated accordingly. The two servants who did well are rewarded in different amounts. But they are both praised identically. The implication of the parable is that we are to use whatever talents we've been given to the best of our ability for God's glory, and when we have done that, we are on an equal playing field with other faithful, trustworthy servants of God. - 5. How does it make you feel knowing that God has called you to steward His good and generous party on earth?

Consider this:

In his book "The Ragamuffin Gospel," Brennan Manning writes, "My deepest awareness of myself is that I am deeply loved by Jesus Christ and I have done nothing to earn it or deserve it." As we apprehend this truth for ourselves, our daily lives will be transformed in a radical way.

Consider this (continued):

It is vital that we grasp this truth first before we can conform to Paul's statement in Ephesians 2:10 declaring, "For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do." Paul isn't saying to pursue good works apart from your identity, but to be who you are by walking around in this true identity and demonstrating it to the world around you.

God has prepared opportunities for us to live out of this new identity. Here are a few small actions with big impact that we shouldn't overlook:

Say "Thank you." Those two words can have a lot of impact if they're expressed from a place of deep gratitude. Keep your eyes and ears open for opportunities to say thank you, especially to those who may feel under-appreciated. Since we already know we're made significant in Jesus, we can make much of others without it threatening our own value.

Give generously. Choosing generosity towards others will remind you that your value doesn't rest in what you have, but in who you are in Christ. Remembering God's kindness towards you in Christ can equip you to extend the same kind of joyful generosity towards others, the local church and other organizations.

As Jesus clearly suggests in today's verse, Mammon tries to take the very place of God. Pastor Jimmy Evans, founder of MarriageToday and a Gateway apostolic elder, once said, "Mammon promises us those things that only God can give—security, significance, identity, independence, power, and freedom. Mammon tells us it can insulate us from life's problems and that money is the answer to every situation."

Consider this (continued):

Clearly, this stands in direct opposition to the Spirit of God. For example, Mammon says to buy and sell; God says to sow and reap. Mammon says to cheat and steal; God says to give and receive. Mammon tells you that if you had more money, people would listen to you, your relationship problems would go away and life would be sweet. The differences between these two spirits seem very cut and dry; however, it's possible for believers to become influenced by the spirit of Mammon without realizing it.

Mammon wants you to think, if I just had more money, I could really start helping people and giving more to the kingdom. Keep in mind, Jesus never told anyone the answer was more money. Money is not the answer to problems—God is. Now, don't get the wrong idea—money and Mammon are not synonymous. Money is not inherently evil.

Consider this:

The fact that we do not hear does not mean that God is not speaking to us. We know that messages from radio and television programs are passing through our bodies and brains at all hours of the day: messages that an appropriately tuned receiver could pluck from the very air we breathe. We are not attuned to God's voice. We have not been taught how to hear it sounding out in nature — for as we read in Psalm 19, "The heavens announce the glory of God" — Or, in a special communication directed by God to the individual, some use their ears to sift out only what they want to hear... [Jesus] urged his hearers to make great effort to hear, assuring them that what they received would be proportional to their desire and effort (Mark 4:23-24).

Hearing God — as a reliable, day-to-day reality for people with good sense — is for those who are devoted to the glory of God and the advancement of His kingdom. It is for the disciple of Jesus Christ who has no higher preference than to be like him.

Recognizing God's voice is something that [we] must learn to do through [our] own personal experience and experimentation.

The leader should write that name on the back of the piece of paper they just pulled so individuals can find out who they were unknowingly praying for after the exercise.

	· The heart of gratitude breaks <u>discontentment</u> and <u>frustration</u> in your life.

It seems like the more we have, the less we would want. Ahhh, but that's not the way of appetites. Several years ago Sandra and I were doing a financial study with the small group that meets in our home. Part of our homework one week was to sit down as a couple and identify the season in our marriage when we were most content. Then we would report our findings the next time we met.

Everyone in our group came to the same conclusion. We all agreed that we experienced the most contentment in the early years of marriage when we had significantly less. Which doesn't make a bit of sense, does it? How could we have more contentment and less stuff? Doesn't the acquisition of stuff scratch the discontentment itch? Apparently not. Actually the opposite is true.

But why is that? How can less stuff result in greater contentment? The answer is found in one final observation regarding the nature of appetites: If you feed an appetite, it grows. Satisfying an appetite does not diminish it. It expands it. To diminish an appetite, you have to starve it. So, in the early days of marriage, when none of us in our group had a lot of extra money to do extra things, we didn't do extra things. And we were content. We were forced to starve that appetite. But once our incomes and our purchasing power began to increase, we started feeding that ugly beast. It doing so, we gave up a slice of contentment. And so it goes.

Paul understood this. In fact he took the principle to a logical, but uncomfortable extreme. He writes: 7 For we brought nothing into the world, and we can take nothing out of it. 8 But if we have food and clothing, we will be content with that. (1 Timothy 6:7-8)

Generosity was nothing short of the hallmark of the first century church. It was all they had. And it proved to be more influential than any amount of money or political sway. As time went on, several plagues ripped through the cities of that region. Each time, the people would flee to the country to escape death. Whenever they did, the sick were left with no one to care for them. However, historians tell us, the Christians didn't flee. Intead, they risked their own health to stay and meet the needs of the ones who couldn't help themselves. Many of these Christians died in the process. But, they weren't afraid of death. As they nursed the sick back to health, word of their generosity spread like wildfire.

The entire perspective of the Christians stood in stark contrast to the pagans around them. The pagan priests were the first to leave town in those situations. They were some of the wealthiest people around and they had a lot to lose. Not to mention the fact that they were afraid of death. So they thought nothing of leaving their sick loved ones behind in order to save themselves. Meanwhile, the Christians would even take care of the pagans. And, as the pagans' health returned, they often abandoned their idolatrous ways and turned to Christianity. Not because of theology. Not because of a miracle. But because of the generosity and compassion of the Christians in their communities.

If we have failed by then [Christ's return] to use our money, possessions, time and energy for eternity, then we have failed - period. "But we'll be in heaven and that's all that matters." On the contrary, Paul spoke of the loss of reward as a great and terrible loss. The fact that we're still saved is a clarification, not a consolation - "if it is burned up, he will suffer loss; he himself will be saved, but only as one escaping through the flames." Receiving reward from Christ is unspeakable gain with eternal implications. Forfeiting reward is a terrible loss with equally eternal implications. How dare we say that being in heaven is all that matters to us, when so much else matters to God?

What we do in this life is of eternal importance. You and I will never have another chance to move the hand of God through prayer to heal a hurting soul, share Christ with one who can be saved from hell, care for the sick, give a cup of water to the thirsty, comfort the dying, invest money to help the helpless, rescue the unborn, further God's Kingdom, open our homes and share our clothes and food with the poor and needy.

What you do with your resources in this life is your autobiography....Martin Luther said that on his calendar there were only two days: "today" and "that day." May we invest our money and possessions today in light of that day.

Gratitude can be learned. Researchers Robert Emmons and Mike McCullough randomly assigned people to keep a daily diary for two weeks, either of happenings they were grateful for, of hassles or simply of life events. Joy, happiness and life satisfaction all rocketed up for the gratitude group.

The format they used is simple. Keep a pen and a journal or piece of paper by your bed. At night, before you go to sleep, take a few minutes to reflect on five events during the day that prompted gratitude. It could be as simple as waking up in the morning, seeing the face of someone you care for, eating a great taco, hearing words of affection from a friend, or completing a challenging assignment at work.

As you write down these events remember that each of them came to you from the hand of God. Use them to reflect on how good God must be to give such gifts. Recognize that each of them is an expression of His love to you. Whisper to Him how grateful you are for His gifts.
