KANSAS HEALTH FOUNDATION GRANT



It all started with a tip about a grant available from the Kansas Health Foundation. And then, as it happens, a speck of an idea was formed.

This May, members of the Social Justice and Mission committee submitted a \$5000 grant application for Hunger Free Kansas' inaugural round of grants. This grant would be used to create connections among local food producers and Salina Grace. By purchasing locally grown and raised food, FPC would be spending grant money to serve fresh, local, healthy food at our weekly lunch meal at Salina Grace.

In June, we were notified that there were 160 applications submitted, and FPC was one of the 80 selected! A few weeks later, Amanda Littell began working to introduce FPC and Salina Grace to several local growers. It was interesting to learn that these producers were unaware of Salina Grace and the work they are doing with our homeless and hungry neighbors.

Amanda and Chandra Cooper began discussing the various ways we could serve and preserve the abundance of beautiful fresh produce that we are fortunate to have access to. BLT wraps were added to the menu. Roasted corn on the cob will be served this week. Fresh, ripe cantaloupe was enjoyed. But, there's so much more! Grant dollars were also used to purchase a new large-capacity upright freezer to keep all of this bounty fresh for use all year long.

On Saturday, 7/19, SJM hosted a small but mighty group of folks to help process corn and **cherries** for our Salina Grace Wednesday meals. Betsy Scholten pitted almost **20** pounds of cherries (24 cups!) from <u>The Fruit Truck</u> for yummy desserts this fall. We also froze **72** ounces of fresh blackberries.










Amanda Littell and Cheri Parr cut corn off of **216** ears of sweet corn from <u>Jirak Bros.</u> The corn was par cooked, cooled and then frozen, ready for use in soups, stews, creamed corn and other yummy meals this winter.

Then, FPC has purchased over 100 pounds of tomatoes from <u>Salt and Light Homestead</u> and members of the congregation have processed those into pizza sauce, marinara, salsa and tomato soup. In addition, 30 pounds of potatoes are being stored. We have also bought

Colorado peaches to serve and preserve, and we look forward to the additional late-summer and fall crops that will become available. We can't wait to continue to share the stories of the farmers we will be supporting and to get to share time with you in the kitchen. You may even learn a new tip or trick for how to de-seed tomatoes, or find a pizza sauce recipe that you will add to your dinner rotation!! We are blessed to have the kitchen full of commercial equipment to do this work together.

However, this is not only a project for SJM. We need your help! The tomato crop has been amazing this year, and we need to continue preserving. We will have lots of zucchini, squash and pumpkin to process and freeze. Be on the lookout for pop-up opportunities to come to Blair Hall and put on your apron...or answer the call when a member invites you to join. SUMMER ADULT EDUCATION SUNDAY'S, 9:00 & 11:15

Those interested in Adult Education are invited to view TheoEd talks throughout August. TheoEd is a faith-based speaker series that brings together leading thinkers in the church and the academy to give the talk of their lives in 20 minutes or less. Its speakers deliver neither sermons nor traditional lectures. Rather they offer highly polished, no-notes, TED-style talks that seek to spark conversations about God, religion, and the power of faith to change lives and communities.

August 3rd - Josh Scott: Re-wilding the Church

In the context of re-wilding, Scott calls for a church that is less about programs and more about cultivating deep, organic relationships. He challenges traditional structures and encourages a faith that breathes new life into church practices—focused on true discipleship, deep listening, and a radical love that moves beyond the walls of the sanctuary into everyday life.

August 10th - Moshe Szyf: Inheriting Trauma

Dr. Szyf delves into the fascinating science of epigenetics and its profound implications for understanding intergenerational trauma. Epigenetics refers to how environmental factors—such as stress, trauma, and life experiences—can influence gene expression without changing the DNA sequence itself. This talk explains how trauma experienced by one generation can leave biological marks on the genes, which may then be passed down to subsequent generations.

August 17th - Reginald Sharpe: The Fourth Temptation

Rev. Sharpe explores the challenge of overcoming the pressure to please others and the inner conflict that arises when the desire to gain approval occasionally wins. He acknowledges that the need for external validation is a natural part of the human experience, but it emphasizes the importance of not allowing that desire to dictate one's life decisions or self-worth.

REVISITING OUR PARTNERSHIP, JUNTOS GUATEMALA

The Relationships: Mirna Pérez and Walter Hernandez

The 2012 pilot team was invited to visit *Próximos Pasos*, a nonprofit, missionary-operated, primary school for girls in Santa Maria de Jesus. The school's mission was to provide education for young girls from families with economic need and domestic circumstances that often excluded them from enrollment in public school. It was here that we first met **Mirna Pérez**, the youngest daughter of Roduel and Hilda, the founding director of the school for Mission Impact.

That pilot team came back home enlivened and better informed of the potential opportunity this relational partnership could offer to our missional and spiritual growth, as well as our own community outreach. The following year, Morrie Soderberg, Carson Michaelis and Amanda Littell,

Richard Gibson, Kegan and Katy England, and Avery and Chandra Cooper prepared, fundraised, were commissioned and sent for service and back to Guatemala. The actual work was valuable as a vehicle for connection but in reality it was secondary to the fellowship, discipleship, and bonding that only happens with extended presence and proximity.

2013 was the trip we would first meet **Walter Hernández**. Walter is son-in law of Roduel and Hilda, and husband to Mirna Pérez. Alongside Gerber and David, Walter was learning the ropes on facilitating the project work with visiting teams, while also bridging the language gaps, fostering engagement and spreading camaraderie between the local members and our members. Walter's affable personality, ability to land jokes in English and Spanish and his intentionality in making sure the three youth in our group felt noticed, valued, and had fun while they worked and absorbed cultural opportunities alongside adults endeared and galvanized his role in our budding partnership.

A great deal of bonding was initiated during the 2013 experience; both, among groups members and our new relationships and emerging partners in Guatemala. Mirna and Morrie became acquainted at a time when she was preparing to present at the International Rotary Conference in Portugal. She

would share about *Próximos Pasos* and the new SoyCow that Rotary had provided the school. The SoyCow produced protein-rich, soy milk that was provided to students each day and was also made available to the surrounding neighborhood. Impressed by the school, Mirna's leadership, and the dedication to young girls, their families, and the community that surrounded them, Morrie became an allied supporter of her work.

Shortly after this time, Mirna went on to complete advanced studies and receive her licensure in psychology. At the time, Guatemala had very few mental and behavioral health counselors in the public school system. We were excited to be early supporters in Mirna's transition to her new role as public school psychologist in San Antonio Aguas Calientes.


Faithful Bible Investigators (FBI) is the name of our program for all children in grades kindergarten through fifth grade. FBI takes place each Wednesday from 4pm-5:15pm in the second floor classroom. Children are welcome to start arriving as early as 3:45pm. We enjoy after-school snacks, fun activities, making crafts, and learning about God.

FBI-In-Training is the name of our program for children ages 2- PreK. FBI-In-Training takes place in the nursery and second floor classroom. Children are welcome to start arriving as early as 3:45pm each Wednesday. The class session runs from 4pm-5:15pm. FBI-In-Training members enjoy after-school snacks, activities, crafts, Bible stories and playtime.





God Squad is the name of our 6th -8th grade program. God Squad usually meets two Wednesdays each month, during the school year, from 6:30pm-7:30pm. God Squad meets alternately in the church youth room, at a member's home, or a local restaurant; and dinner is always provided. Youth are encouraged to invite friends. Youth enjoy dinner, laughter, and faith discussions! Text reminders are provided weekly.

BY WHAT WORDS DO YOU LIVE BY?

By what words do you live by? For as long as I can remember my father has encouraged me to consider: "When your feet hit the floor a smile goes on your face!" as words to start the day; wise words, but ones that I have struggled to adopt. One mantra of my father's that I have lived by, however, is "think before you speak." While some biblical words to live by are "As for me and my household, we will serve the LORD" (Joshua 24:15) words that literally hang on the wall in our dining room.

Recently our Sunday morning adult class listened to Suzanne Stabile's TheoEd Talk about four mantras, or words she tries to live by. They come from the Basque people who are an indigenous European ethnic group found in a region straddling the border between northeastern Spain and southwestern France. The four mantras Suzanne Stable raised are: Show Up, Pay Attention, Tell the Truth, and Disengage from Results. She spoke about how these four mantras are meant to offer a roadmap for personal growth and effective relationships; consider them for yourselves.

<u>Show Up:</u> for us at Salina FPC, this means figuring out which areas of the congregation's life and ministry we feel led to get involved with while also considering what is not ours to be part of so that we can follow Jesus' wisdom from the Sermon on the Mount, "Let your word be 'Yes, Yes' or 'No, No' (Matt. 5:37). Where will you show up?

<u>Pay Attention:</u> these words to live by encourage us to try be fully present with those with whom we worship and serve alongside as we seek to form relationships, both with God in Jesus Christ and one another; ensuring that we try to get to know one another as we are known by God. To whom do you want to pay more attention to?

<u>Tell the Truth:</u> while everyone agrees with the importance of the truth, this can be easier said than done. But its through being honest with one another, that we find the courage to say and do what God sets before us both in the glorious building entrusted to us as well as out in the community of Salina where we are called to embody the Gospel. What truth do you need to tell?

<u>Disengage from Results:</u> this can be awfully difficult in the outcome-oriented world in which we live. But the purpose of this mantra is to remind us that if we get too close to managing results ourselves, we leave little room for God's Spirit to be at work leading us into the grace, hope, and love we are meant to live by. How will you disengage in a way that leaves room for God's Spirit to lead you?

Show Up, **Pay Attention**, **Tell the Truth**, **Disengage from Results**, all are words to live by that can help us to be Led by Christ, together in faith and love, as we joyfully think, question, grow and serve. SESSION JUNE 16, 2025 MEETING HIGHLIGHTS


- Received reports from the Clerk and standing committees including a financial report from the Treasurer.


