

Here are some of the things we are doing:


- We are replacing the carpet with a durable and repairable carpet that will look fresh for decades;

- We are creating a "history nook" where members can see our historical items and research our church records.







Lessons Learned Along the Way

Each FPC team commissioned to service in Guatemala has dedicated four months of preparations to our relational mission with Juntos GT. In the beginning teams utilized the "Helping Without Hurting: In Short-Term Missions" curriculum adapted from Steve Corbett and Brian Fikkert's book, "When Helping Hurts." In 2022, "Freeing Congregational Mission," by Hunter Farrell and Bala Khyllep was added as a guiding resource for the PCUSA congregations seeking healthy cross-cultural mission. Following are a selection of takeaway lessons that have been learned, experienced, and adopted along the way.

- Paternalism is poison. It perpetuates a superior and inferior roles. It soothes uncomfortable feelings about wealth disparity for the material resourced (rich) while inadvertently robbing the dignity of the "recipient."
- Savior-complex: We are not "saving" anyone. Christ has already
 handled that work. We have a much better chance of participating in
 God's work when we humbly respect that God is already present and
 moving in the communities we visit. When we assume that our ways
 and our perspectives are better, more advanced, more "efficient," we
 miss out opportunities to interrupt the legacy of colonialism and
 break its underlying message of white superiority. We miss out on the
 gifts that are revealed in collaboration and companionship.
- Selfie Mission, those "likeable" and "shareable" activities, primarily meant to frame up individuals and groups in benevolent postures to market our "help of the less fortunate." Whose mission is it, anyway? Charitable activities centered around the activity and devoid of mutually healing and restoring relationships is antithetical to the self-giving mission of Jesus Christ that constantly points to God.







A Mission Reforming: Companionship - Cultural Humility - Co-Development

- Companionship acknowledges Jesus' mission was built on human relationships and
 consisted of mutual accompaniment, shared vulnerability, a centeredness on the sending
 God, and mission from the margins: the presence, perspective, and leadership of those forced
 to live in the margins of society.
- Cultural Humility requires us to continually engage in a process of self-reflection and selfcritique, to assess and adjust to power imbalances, as a reflective, life-long learning practice.
- Co-Development, affirming that things are more complex and nuanced than what meets an
 unfamiliar eye, rejects the sense of power in "giver" and "receiver" dynamics and invites
 companions into a mutual process of bringing the gifts has entrusted to them to the circle to
 share with their mission companions.

- How does Coco learn about himself and his family from the other side of the bridge?











PASTOR'S POST

Can we **think, question, grow, and serve**, not only as part of our church's mission and vision statement, but also about tough topics? I ask because the school year is in full swing and there is a lot of hope and anticipation about all that this year to come will bring. But with the start of another school year, so too will many parents and family of both students, faculty and staff worry about school shootings.



Sadly, **gun violence**, is an all-too-common concern. Even if you don't have school-age children at home, our awareness of actual shootings and even the threat of mass-shootings plagues the world in which we live. As both a parent of a newly hired High School History teacher and a pastor to several school-aged children and youth; this time of year, marks both a time of excitement and dread. Hopefully our community never has to face the horror of being the subject of "breaking news", but I wonder, can we talk about gun violence as a congregation?

While I have only on rare occasions, the Sunday following the tragedy at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Connecticut among them, have broached such a provocative subject in the pulpit I do see value as followers of Jesus practicing conversations

about challenging issues. And as a congregation who desires to be led by Christ, together in faith and love, as we joyfully think, question, grow, and serve, it is my hope that you will consider joining me on Sundays in September and early October making use of articles from the November 2023 Special Issue of the Presbyterian Outlook, titled "Gun Violence: How people of faith can stop this uniquely American epidemic".

"One of the greatest sins a church can commit," writes Christopher B. Hays, "is being boring and irrelevant—because doing so makes a lie out of a Gospel that is anything but boring and irrelevant. To represent the Gospel," Hays contends, "the church has to recognize and take a stand on the ethical issues of its times." I hope you will join me as we think, question, grow, and serve Christ together; even as we discuss as challenging an issue as Gun Violence.

Each Sunday, before (9 a.m.) and after (11:15 a.m.) worship, in the Conference Room by the south entrance I will offer an opportunity to discuss a different

article from that Special Issue. Copies of the articles will be placed on the table across from the Pastor's Study, or if you prefer, I will email you a pdf copy to read on whatever device you prefer. Listed below are the dates and articles to be discussed:



- September 7th "Gun Culture and the End of American Christianity" –
 Christopher Hays ponders where we can find hope in a worsening
 situation.
- September 14th "Enough Already" Otis Moss III wonders when we will love enough to recognize everyone's right to live.





- September 21st "Do Not Destroy the One for Whom Christ Died" –
 David Lincicum makes a Christian case for repealing the Second
 Amendment.
- October 5th "Presbyterian Gun Owners Address the Complexities" –
 For gun-owning Presbyterians, control is—and isn't—a cut-and-dried
 issue.





October 12th "From Despair to Hope: Mobilizing Your Church to End Gun Violence" – Gun violence prevention minister Deanna Hollas unmasks the powers behind the gun violence epidemic in the United States and provides proven actions we can take to help save lives.



SESSION AUG 18, 2025 MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

- Received reports from the Clerk and standing committees including a financial report from the Treasurer. The annual financial review for 2024 will be presented at the September meeting.
- The Building & Grounds committee requests that a "Blessing of the Renovated Parlor" be scheduled at the completion of the work. Equipment to help improve lighting of the pulpit and lectern in the chancel area has been obtained. Bids for the work have been sought.
- Plans are underway for an all-church picnic this fall at a local pumpkin patch. Educational programing for the fall is scheduled.
- Annual staff reviews were conducted during July. The pastor's review will occur this fall.
- A coat drive will occur during September. Long time mission partners from Guatemala will visit in early November. A \$5000 Kansas Health Foundation grant will allow FPC to purchase local meat and produce for serving at Salina Grace. It also funded the purchase of a freezer for storage of the food.
- A task force will be appointed to consider types of decoration that will be needed in the Sanctuary for Advent and Christmas. The existing decorations are in varied condition and some may need replacement.
