
## FAITH FORMATION

### WHAT DO YOU FEAR?

This Advent theme, which will guide our worship and prayer throughout December is "What do you fear: insisting on hope this Advent". The creators of the art that will line the southentry hall and the liturgy that will lead us to the manger remind us that Luke's Gospel begins the story of Jesus with this opening line: "In the time of Herod...." While this detail may seem minor, it reveals layers of information about the fearful world Jesus entered, one filled with oppression, uncertainty, and instability. A world not unlike our own. And yet, throughout the stories of Christ's birth, the whispers of angels deliver a surprising message: "Do not fear."



The creators and contributors of our Advent theme also remind us that fear can divide and paralyze us. But what if we formed a different relationship with fear? Can we acknowledge fear without letting it rule us? Might we catalyze our fears into love and action? What if naming our fears helps us see more clearly how God is breaking into our lives and where God is at work?

There is much about our world that can make us afraid, both at a macro scale (nationally and internationally) and at the micro level (personal, familial, and spiritual concerns). But our faith and the one born for us continually tells us that we are led by Christ together in faith and love. One way we become resilient in the face of fear is gathering as a community of faith to think, question, grow, and serve.

Throughout this month's newsletter you will find numerous ways that we will gather throughout the month of December: The Ladies Annual Christmas Gathering, the Annual Choral Cantata, dedicating the remodeled Parlor, a Children's Pageant, Church Staff and Youth Parties, recognizing the retirement of our Sunday Custodian, Christmas Eve Candlelight worship, and a mission-minded service in the Chapel on the Sunday after Christmas; all are opportunities help us insist on hope, no matter the fears that linger.

Every Advent, we light candles, sing carols, and pray for Christ's coming because we believe God enters a frightened world to bring good news. We hold onto hope because we believe that Christ did come—that is the promise of this season. Our hope is not flimsy or fleeting. Our hope is gritty, resilient: hope endures—no matter what we fear or face!

## **SESSION AUG 18, 2025 MEETING HIGHLIGHTS**

- Received reports from the Clerk and standing committees including a financial report from the Treasurer.
- The nominating committee was thanked for their work.
- The parlor renovation is nearing completion. The lighting of the pulpit and lectern in the sanctuary has been tabled until more information can be considered. The Building & Grounds committee is considering plans and projects for 2026.
- Sunday custodian, Regina Miller will retire at the end of the year. There will be recognition for her at the December 21 service.
- Gave approval for a special offering to be held on Sunday, December 28. This will be a diaper drive with the items donated to several local childcare centers.
- Advent and Christmas decorating will occur on November 30 following the service.
- The bake sales in October raised at least \$1,577 to help with costs of the 2026 Heartland Day Camp.
- A task force was appointed to review strategic planning options to be considered in January.
- Approved conducting the three denomination wide special offerings during 2026.
- A gathering for potential new members was scheduled for Saturday morning, January 24.
