






# PASTOR'S POSTS



#### **VISUALIZING "OUR MONEY STORY"**

The best stories captivate and transform us—they change how we live. Through October we have reflected on stewardship through both Holy Scripture and four "R" words: remember, release, reimagine, and restore. We have set forth on this journey to begin thinking about how God wants us to relate to money.

We have not only listened for God's Word, we have also worked through a spiritual practice of creating a mandala mosaic. In Sanskrit "mandala" simply means "circle." Mandalas are used in Buddhist and Hindu traditions for meditation and prayer.



As our completed mandala mosaic resides in our church's narthex and parlor please look at it as an opportunity to pray and reflect on how we continue to live into the money story God hopes we embody at First Presbyterian Church, Salina. To help further reflection on this group art-project consider some explanations for the imagery found within its four rings.

The inner most ring is inspired by Luke 22:1-23 (the Last Supper and Judas' betrayal) and Exodus 16:1-18 (manna in the desert). The tear drops represent the sadness of Judas' betrayal that leads to Jesus' death, as well as the struggle of the Israelites as they wander the wilderness. The circles represent both the silver coins Judas receives as payment to betray Jesus, and the manna that was Israel's food in the wilderness



The next ring of open hands is inspired by Matthew 19:16-22 (a wealthy man seeking eternal life) and Deuteronomy 15:1-11 (the year of canceled debts). The open hands represent how Jesus invited the rich man to let go of all he owned, as well as our release of debts.



The next ring out is inspired by Mark 12:38-44 (the widow's mite). The seeds represent the coins the widow offered to the Temple treasury. In this ring, we are encouraged to avoid creating systems that impoverish and leave the vulnerable without the resources and support they need to thrive.




Finally, the outer ring of the mandala is inspired by John 21:1-19 (Jesus' final post-resurrection appearance to the disciples) and Genesis 33:1-17 (Esau forgives Jacob). The hands clasped represent the reconciliation of Esau and Jacob—brothers who lived like enemies. The fish represent the abundant feast Jesus offered the disciples after his resurrection. In this final ring of the mandala, we are reminded of words through which we experience God's restoration: how our broken hopes and fractured relationships are made whole.



Throughout the month of November please consider how your money story intersects with God's money story represented in our collaboratively created art-project. As you remember, release, reimagine, and restore your own perceptions of time, abilities, and financial resources within God's story of generosity, abundance, and love please consider how all of our gifts will serve God's purpose at First Presbyterian Church, Salina in 2024 as we are led by Christ, together in faith and love, to joyfully think, question, grow, and serve as the Spirit leads.

"In 1870 the congregation of a few more than 50 members started the construction of a Church on 8th Street. With the help of the Board of Church Erection it was finished and dedicated April 2, 1871. This church was a frame building with a seating capacity of 200 and costing about \$4,000. In 1872 the ladies of the congregation bought a bell which was transferred to the two later buildings and for approximately sixty years rang out, calling the faithful to worship."
