
A Word from Our Pastor

She was a graduate student at Marshall University who arrived in West Virginia on a cold January night after a long flight from her native Kenya. One of the first things she did was find a church home; we had the privilege of ministering to and with her over several years, and of learning from her. I especially loved tales of her home church. It was a normal part of her church's rhythm to spend an entire night together in prayer! These all-night prayer vigils were especially emphasized in moments of discernment for the church.

Don't worry, I'm not suggesting a similar all-night prayer pattern for us as we discern God's new Oakmont idea! But our friend and her home church point us to a crucial element of discernment: an ongoing rhythm of intentional prayer and listening to God.

Paul points to a daily rhythm in Romans 12:2 when he says, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind so that you may discern what is the will of God — what is good and acceptable and perfect." The first half of the verse indicates a daily pursuit, not a one-time thing. Resisting being conformed to the world never ends in this life, and renewal/transformation will not be complete until we're with Jesus. So, each day we rely on the Spirit to resist being conformed to the world and we open ourselves to the Spirit's transforming, renewing work.

We do this daily work for many reasons, one of which is "so that" we may discern God's will. Which means a crucial component of our congregational discernment journey involves all of us giving renewed and increased attention to our own walk with God. The more our minds are renewed as individuals, the deeper our capacity for






We meet September 17 at 4:00 to identify specific areas in the life of our church where intentional discernment is needed. Facilities usage, mission opportunities, ministry to children and young families and young adults are some areas that have come to my mind. Others may emerge in our conversation. The vision steering team from our Deacons will listen and prayerfully review what's discussed on the 17th, report back to the church the areas for discernment that emerge, and then form teams of interested church members to practice discernment in each of the areas.

Our Kenyan friend saw her own walk with Jesus as inseparable from her church's walk with Jesus. She embraced the truth of the passage we will look at this Sunday: "we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another" (Rom 12:5). She knew that her prayers with her sisters and brothers were essential to the church's discernment journey. May it be so for us, as we discern God's will together.

Rev. Alicia Porterfield Called as Minister of Missions!

Following the worship service on August 20, Personnel Chair Joe Edwards announced the calling of the Rev. Alicia Davis Porterfield to serve as our Minister of Missions. Alicia was the Associate Pastor at Fifth Avenue Baptist Church of Huntington, WV, for six and a half years. Her duties included leading the church's partnerships with a local elementary school, a food/clothing distribution ministry, and a residential facility for men struggling with addiction. She also organized the church's annual mission days, similar to Oakmont's Operation In-As-Much events. In addition

to her ministry in Huntington, Alicia has served as a hospital chaplain, an interim pastor, and continues to write Sunday School literature for Smyth and Helwys.

In late spring a church member recommended Alicia to the Personnel Committee. The committee interviewed Alicia and unanimously recommended her for the position to our deacons. Before meeting with the deacons, Alicia met with our Missions Team and they endorsed Personnel's recommendation. At their meeting on August 6, the deacons unanimously approved Personnel's recommendation. Because this is a part-time position, it does not require a church vote. Because Alicia is ordained, her title will be Minister of Missions.

Alicia begins her service with Oakmont on Tuesday, September 5. Welcome, Alicia!

An adult makes about 35,000 choices every single day, but adults are not the only ones with choices to make. Children have their fair share of choices too- about 3,500 of them. Every. Single. Day. Should I eat this snack or that snack? Should I play with this toy or that toy? Should I do this and share or do that and keep it all for myself? Because our children's 3,500 daily choices will one day turn into 35,000 daily choices, we want to teach them that when they have a choice between This or That, they can trust that God knows what's best for them.

that it was not good for them. However, one day Adam and Eve did not listen to God, and they ate from the plant that God told them not to. As a result, God got mad at Adam and Eve, and they had to leave the garden of Eden. God was upset with them because God knew the plant was not good for them. God knew that the choice that Adam and Eve made was not going to be helpful for their lives. God knew what was best for Adam and Eve and God was trying to protect them from getting hurt.

There may have been times in your own life where your parents or grandparents, or teachers, or some other adult has told you not to do something because they knew what was best for you. But maybe you chose not to listen to them and as a result something bad might have happened. Your parents and other adults care for you and want to make sure that you are making choices that will keep you safe and happy. Sometimes you just have to trust what they say and remember that they know best and are looking out for you.

The same is true with God. Sometimes God might tell us not to do something, even if we really want to do it! We just have to learn to trust that God knows what's best for our lives and to make choices that honor God. This week, as you are making different choices, remember to listen to your parents and to listen to God, because they love you and only want what's best for you!
