

STATION OBJECTIVES

Children will

- * become familiar with the stories of Priscilla, Lydia, and Dorcas;
- * understand that women had an important role in the spreading of the gospel;
- * understand that these women used their skills and resources in service to God;
- * discover that these women can be role models for everyone;
- * discover that it was revolutionary for women to have a significant role in the life of faith;
- * come to know other women as spiritual leaders.

STATION SETUP

Decorate your classroom to reflect what a home in Bible times might have looked like. Place simple jars and pottery around the room. Find woven baskets to include in the room. Bring woven mats or rugs for the children to sit on. Set up a table that is low enough for students to

simple jars and pottery woven baskets woven mats or rugs optional: kente cloth spider



sit around on the floor in biblical fashion, on pillows rather than on chairs. If a low table is not available, collapse the legs of a regular-height table and lay it on the floor. Cover the table with a purple table cloth.

Set the table with a variety of purple snacks, such as a basket of purple grapes and plums, a pitcher of grape beverage, a basket of pita bread cut into small pieces to be spread with grape or plum jelly, cookies with purple frosting, and so forth.

Prepare

Invite a woman to portray Lydia. Provide a Bible-times costume. Make sure part of the costume is purple.

With the Children

Have Lydia greet the children as they come in the door.

Ydia: You may be wondering about all this purple. I do go a bit overboard. But purple is my life. I'm a seller of purple cloth. Purple dye comes from very expensive shellfish, so only the wealthy can afford to dress in purple. I want to share it with you today. I understand that you are all believers, which makes



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you even more welcome in my home. Did you know that the apostle Paul himself baptized me and my servants and children? Listening to him talk about Jesus was almost like having Jesus himself here! Paul and his companion Silas stayed with me while they were in Philippi. They ate at this very table. I'm so glad you're here! It's wonderful to be able to remember Paul's visit. Most Jewish men would never have joined a group of women for prayer at the riverside. But Paul didn't seem to be bothered by the lack of men in our group. In his eyes, we were just as important, just as Christian, as the men. Jews, Greeks, slaves, free, men, women, young, old—to Paul we were simply Christians! You, too! Eat! Enjoy!

Encourage the children to enjoy the snacks.

Lydia: You are learning about other women besides me. One of those women is Dorcas. Dorcas was a disciple of Jesus. She worked making clothing for others. Another woman is Priscilla. Priscilla worked with her husband and with Paul to make tents and tell others about Jesus.

Ask younger children:

How are Dorcas and Lydia alike? (They all worked with cloth. They both served others and followed Jesus.)

How can we be like Dorcas, Priscilla, and Lydia? (We can share our special talents to help others and share God's love.)

Ask older children:

Do you want people to remember you thousands of years from now? Why, or why not?

What would you want people to remember about you? What can you do today so that people will remember how you were faithful to God, like Priscilla, Dorcas, and Lydia?

ACTIVITY OPTIONS

(45-50 minutes)

Choose from the suggested activities as your time and the children's interest allow.



Supplies soft, purple cloth

For Younger Children

Place a purple cloth on the floor. Have the children sit around the cloth and then follow the instructions in the story.

Sdy: Today our Bible story is about a woman named Lydia. Lydia sold purple cloth. She learned about Jesus.

Lydia (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair.) sold purple cloth. Touch the purple cloth. Feel how soft it is? (Have the children touch the purple cloth.) Lydia (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair.) liked the color purple. It was a special color. Only people who were rich could afford to buy purple cloth. Lydia (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair.) was a rich and important person in the city of Philippi.

Lydia (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair.) loved God. She prayed to God every day. Fold your hands as if you are saying a prayer. (Have the children fold their hands in prayer.) Lydia (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair.) knew some other women who also loved God. They had no place to go to in the city to pray to God, so Lydia (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair.) and her friends met outside the city beside the river.

One day Lydia (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair.) and her friends were sitting beside the river when a man named Paul came over to them. He told them all about Jesus. Lydia (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair.) listened very carefully. Show me how you listen carefully. (Cup your hand around one ear.)

Lydia (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair.) was happy to learn about Jesus. Show me how you look when you are happy. (Have the children make a happy face.) Paul baptized Lydia (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair.) in the river, and she became a follower of Jesus. Lydia (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair) wanted her whole family to learn about Jesus. She invited Paul to stay at her house. Paul told Lydia's (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair.) family about Jesus. Everyone at Lydia's (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair.) house became a follower of Jesus.

Lydia (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair.) still sold purple cloth. Touch the purple cloth again. (Have the children touch the purple cloth.) But now Lydia (Have the children pretend to fluff their hair.) also helped others learn about Jesus.

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STORYTELLING

For Younger Children

Learning With Lydia

Have the children repeat the following list of things we can learn about Jesus. Hold up a finger for each item.

- 1. Christmas is Jesus' birthday.
- 2. Jesus was God's son.
- 3. Jesus loved the children.
- 4. Jesus loves me and everyone.
- 5. Jesus is my friend.

Say: Lydia learned about Jesus. Let's pretend to be Lydia and think about what we have learned about Jesus.

Ask a volunteer to stand up in front of the other children. Wrap the purple cloth over the child's head or shoulders.

Say: Lydia, Lydia, dressed in purple, what have you learned about Jesus?

Have the child say something about Jesus. Give suggestions from the list, if necessary. Continue until every child has a turn to be Lydia. Expect that the children may say the same thing each time.

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For Older Children

Lydia

Prepare

Photocopy the story "Lydia" (page 80) for each child.

Provide fifteen unlit candles (purple if possible).

With the Children

Invite the older children to read the story aloud. Have an adult light one candle at the end of each paragraph, until all fifteen are lit.

Play "Women of the Bible" (Three Women of Faith CD). Blow out the candles.

Ask: Who was Lydia? (She was a cloth merchant)

Why was she at the river that day? (She and some friends gathered at the river to worship.)

Who did she meet? (Paul)

What did he tell her? (He told her about Jesus.)

What happened next? (She invited Paul to baptize her and her whole household.)

How is this spreading the good news of Jesus? (Paul heard the news and told Lydia, who told others.)

For Older Children

Sweet Clara and the Freedom Quilt

You will need:

one 8-by 8-inch square of white construction paper for each child. one-inch and three-inch squares of a variety of colored papers

Women in our Bible stories used different kinds of fabric to make a living. Throughout time women have used the art of quilting to tell the stories of their faith, their family, and their creativity. As you listen to this story, look for ways Clara used her gifts to tell her story.

Read Sweet Clara and the Freedom Quilt.

ASK: How did Clara use what she had learned about quilting to help her family and friends? What symbols did Clara use in her quilt to help the people make their way to freedom?

To make a paper quilt

Ask the children to think of a significant event in their own lives or the life of the church. Each child should think of a separate event.

Instruct them to use the small pieces of colored paper to create a picture or symbol of their event. (For example: a bowl or pitcher for baptism. a rainbow for the Noah story, a lakeside scene for a camping experience) Do this without gluing anything.

Once the picture has been created, glue the pieces to the white paper.

After all the pieces have been glued down, invite the children to tell the story of their quilt pieces.

ASK: Quilts are larger expressions of small pieces or events. They are similar to a puzzle. How might we put these small quilt blocks together to create a Faith Quilt?

Have the children try different combinations of layout until they are pleased with the product. Once they are satisfied with the order, glue the 8- by 8-inch quilt squares onto the larger colored butcher paper to create a paper Faith Quilt. Display the quilt in the Storytelling Station or in a hallway.



STORYTELLING

For All Ages

Show the children how to find the Book of Acts.

Sdy: The Bible story tells us about a woman named Tabitha, whose Greek name was Dorcas. Tabitha was a follower of Jesus. We don't know if she ever met Jesus, but we do know she heard the stories and believed. Because she believed, she turned her faith into doing good.

Teach the children the moves that go with the story poem "Dorcas Dance" (page 79). They will use this movement between the story stanzas.

Hold right thumb in hitchhike position. Put left hand on the hips. As you move the thumb to the right, step two steps to the right in rhythm to the words.

Good works! Good works! (Thumb to the right, step two steps to the right in rhythm to the words.)

It's all about good works! (Reverse the moves above.) It doesn't count if you don't turn. (Put hands on the hips and swivel hips to the right and then to the left. Repeat.)

Your faith into good works. (Pat left shoulder with right hand; leaving right hand on left shoulder, pat right shoulder with left hand; lean forward and pat knee with right hand; while leaving right hand on left knee, pat right knee with left hand; stand upright; put right hand on back side of right hip; put left hand on back side of left hip.)

Practice reading the story poem until you can read it in the rhythm.

CLOSING (5 minutes)

Ask: How did these women use their gifts?

Which one did you admire the most? Why?

What gift could you use this week to do something special for someone?

Close with a prayer thanking God for giving each person special gifts.

Lydia

My name is Lydia. I lived in the city of Philippi—a long, long time ago. And there I met a man named Paul. This man Paul changed my life forever. Let me tell you the story.

I am a merchant. I sell cloth. Not just any cloth, but purple cloth. Purple cloth is very expensive. Only the most important people can afford to buy my cloth. For that reason, I am a very important person too.

As they do to all important people, everyone looks up to me. I must be very careful what I do.

Philippi is a Roman city, ruled by Roman law. People there worship the Roman gods.

But I believe in the one true God. There are other people in Philippi who believe as I do. We don't want to get arrested, so we worship in a very private place so that the Roman officials cannot find us and arrest us. We are going to worship God no matter what the law says.
