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The destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem 70 A.D:

"The days will come when there will not be left a stone upon another stone that will not be thrown down."



End of an Era: Jesus came to usher in a New World Order.

To help us understand something of the mindset of Jesus' audience in today's Gospel when they hear him speak about the destruction of the Temple, you need to 'fast-forward' to the 21st century to the U.S. and know how we felt on the morning of "9/11" with the destruction of the Twin Towers. We were numbed as we watched the Twin Towers and the Pentagon hit by passenger planes, with another plane crashing as it attempted to turn back toward Washington, perhaps to be used as a missile on the White House.

9/11 signaled the end of an era in the U.S. The unthinkable had happened. The Twin Towers represented the heart of the financial

world in U.S. The Pentagon represented the heart of the strongest and greatest military power in the world. The White House represented the heart of one of the greatest democracies in the world. The American mainland had never been attacked by a foreign power in its history and on 9/11 we witnessed the destruction of two of the 3 great symbols of American power. It was the end of an era in the U.S. America would never be the same again.

It was this kind of experience which Jesus describes in this morning's Gospel when he speaks about the destruction of Jerusalem and especially when he speaks about the destruction of the Temple. Like the Twin Towers, which was a symbol of the city of New York, the Temple was a symbol of the city of Jerusalem. Jesus' followers could not think of Jerusalem without the Temple.

When Jesus speaks about the destruction of Jerusalem and, about the destruction of the Temple, he is not speaking about the end of *the* world, but an end of *a* world, an end of an era - an old-world order was giving way to a new one.

Jesus came to introduce a new kingdom, the kingdom of God. This kingdom would not be built in a Temple building but, be built in the minds and hearts of people. Jesus announced that this new world order would be ushered in by "earthquakes" and "famines."




An "earthquake" shakes the very foundations on which we stand. When the kingdom of God comes, it will shake the very foundations on which our lives are built – our ego, money, power – all will be shaken to their very roots when Christ, the Messiah, comes.

What is the significance of "famines"? It raises the question: what feeds us? What sustains us? What influences, what "voices" "feed" us on a daily basis? — TV, iPods, peers, computers, technology, radio etc. — We will have to deny ourselves listening to these influences only if we are to allow the Word of Jesus and his message to influence the way we live in this new world order. We will have to experience a "famine" of these influences in our daily lives. Instead of indulging ourselves with these influences, we will have to "deny ourselves" so that with St. Paul we can say, "I live, now not I, but Christ lives in me." This is a new world order that Jesus came to usher in.

Scripture scholars *interpret* the Scriptures for us; Christians are called to *live* the Scriptures.

St. Francis sums it up this way: "Preach and, if you must, use words."



Help a 'searcher' to find life's purpose

Invite a family member, friend, or, a workmate, to attend the Order of Christian Initiation for Adults (OCIA), on Monday evenings, at 7 P.M. in the Religious Education Bldg. Or, better, come with them to a first session.

Ours is a restless, anxious era; restless, inside; searching on the outside. For what? Like the Samaritan Woman at Jacob's Well (John 4), we are "thirsty," not always satisfying that "thirst," because we are drinking from the wrong "wells." She discovered the right "Well" when she met and listened to Jesus at the Well. She finally discovered what she was searching for.

In offering an introduction and overview of what Catholics believe and practice, it also affords the seeker and searcher to ask their own unique questions, which are unique to their search and, in doing so, enrich the search of others attending the session.



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
