

The Rich Man and Lazarus:

There is a story told about a young boy, who lived in a small town, who heard that the Messiah had come. He became very excited. He ran from one house to another in the village square, announcing, with great enthusiasm, that the Messiah had come. The young boy rushed into the Rabbi's house, overlooking the village square, with the news, "The Messiah has come." Being a wise old Rabbi, he did not over-react. He, simply, went to the window; he peered down on the village square. With a tinge of sadness in his face, he turned to the young boy and, said, "No, son, the Messiah has not come; because if he did, things would be different in the market place."

Jesus, in today's Gospel, illustrate with a parable, what the Rabbi had just said to the young boy. Jesus, in the Gospel, was

speaking to the Pharisees; they were the religious authorities of his day. In the parable, he alludes to a rich man and, a poor man, Lazarus. The rich man, dressed in Calvin Klein clothes of his day, eat at the best restaurants and, likely, lived in a gated community, was not condemned for being rich. He worked hard and with great enterprise to make his wealth.

Why then was he condemned?

We refer to 2 different kinds of sin in the 'Confiteor' in the penitential rite at the beginning of Mass; sins of "Commission" and, sins of "Omission:" "I confess... that I have greatly sinned... in what I have done and what I have failed to do." The rich was condemned, not for what he did to the poor man, but what he didn't do to help him; he committed a sin of omission. The rich man insulated himself from the poor man, even to the point of failing to give him the scraps that the house animals would pick up which fell from his table. The irony was, the neighborhood dogs gave the poor man more attention than the rich man – at least, they licked his wounds and sores.

The rich man replicates what the wealthy people of God did in today's first reading from the prophet Amos. The prophet Amos, at God's direction, spoke to the wealthy people of his day for "lying on your beds of ivory... eating the best lamb and veal and washing it down with the most expensive wines..." while failing - omitting - to lift a finger to help their poor brothers and sisters in need – they, like the rich man in the Gospel, were guilty of a sin of omission. They were consumed with a standard of living and not with a standard of life. St Paul goes to the heart of the issue in today's 2nd reading, in his letter to Timothy when he "charges" Christians: "I charge you before God... to keep the commandments."

Mother (St) Teresa of Calcutta — was asked on ABC TV by Barbara Walters what she taught of Catholics being allowed to receive communion in the hand, thinking that she might find it somewhat disrespectful. Mother Teresa responded that she liked the change. She said, "I'm impressed with Catholics reaching out their hands with respect to touch the Body of Jesus in Holy Communion." She continued, "I haven't been as impressed with the same Catholics reaching out their hands with the same respect to touch the body of Jesus in the market place" — exactly, the comment the Rabbi made to the young boy who excitedly told him that the Messiah had come.

Question: How do you respond to the monthly appeal to assist the local **Church Service Center?** Or, to the **2025 CFA appeal** by the bishop to assist those in need around the Diocese of Venice? Do today's Mass readings "speak" to us? And, how do we respond?



Profile of typical new U.S. priests ordained in 2025

According to a 2025 survey by the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA) of Georgetown University and, the USCCB, the typical new U.S. priest ordained in 2025 is a 34-year-old cradle Catholic who regularly attended Eucharistic adoration and prayed the Rosary before entering the seminary.

The "Ordination Class of 2025" survey gathered data from 309 of the 405 men slated to be ordained in the U.S. this year. Key findings include:

Demographic profile

- Age: The average age at ordination is 34, with initial consideration of priesthood often occurring in the teenage years.
- Race/Ethnicity: The majority of new priests are Caucasian (69%), followed by Hispanic/Latino (12%), Asian/Pacific Islander/Native Hawaiian (12%), and African/African American/Black (6%).
- National origin: 26% are foreign-born, with Mexico, Vietnam, and the Philippines being the top countries of origin.
- Family background: Most were baptized Catholic as infants and raised by their biological parents, with a significant number having both parents who were Catholic. 31% reported having a relative who was or is a priest or religious.

Formation and education

- Priesthood type: 80% are being ordained for a diocese, while 20% are joining a religious institute.
- Seminary location: The largest number studied in the Midwest (37%).
- Prior education: 63% completed an undergraduate or graduate degree before seminary, with common fields including philosophy, engineering, business, science, and math. 15% were home-schooled at some point.
- Work experience: 66% had full-time work experience, and 6% served in the U.S. armed forces.

Vocational discernment

- Religious encouragement: 89% were encouraged to consider the priesthood by someone in their lives, typically a priest, friend, or parishioner.
- Religious practices: Regular participation in Eucharistic Adoration (78%) and praying the Rosary (72%) were common. 73% served as an altar server.
- Spiritual inspiration: One ordinand mentioned being inspired by a Justin Bieber song and hearing the call to priesthood during prayer.
- Discouragement: 43% faced discouragement, often from friends or family members.

Ideological perspective

- An analysis suggests that most new priests identify as conservative or very conservative, focusing on their priestly role rather than social activism.
- Please pray for newly ordained priests, that they persevere and, for all priests.


